

PREFACE

This year's bike bibliography contains 1,102 references from around the world. Of special note to practicing cyclists is Section III that lists 104 Current Mail Order Catalogs. Of particular use to bikeway engineers, safety officials and teachers is Section V that holds 175 bikeway studies, accident reports, local tour guides, bike laws and instructional items. While 299 journal articles give broad exposure to medical, transportation, history, legal, and industrial topics in Section II, the reader may be equally surprised to see 125 miscellaneous foreign documents, conference proceedings, dissertations, and reports of professional societies in Section VI.

This new compilation of bike literature was made possible by additions and suggestions received from around the world. Special thanks to William Henry Stokes, Asst. Prof., Graduate School of Librarianship, Univ. of Denver, for his continued enthusiasm and criticism. Previous manuscripts were critiqued by Judy Houk, Library Reports & Research Service, Westminster, CO. Touring Cyclists of Boulder takes pride in an inventory personally tested by management. Other suppliers offer volume without comment. Some give service and advice while others ignore all inquires. An occasional supplier may be in business to sell catalogs, not merchandise.

In a rapidly changing market place, suppliers may fall victim to the Christmas rush, production shortages in Europe, or rising postal rates. Delays and substitutions can occur. A catalog item may be dropped from the available list overnite. Therefore, it is difficult to judge the worth of a catalog by it size, price or quantity of items listed.

To overcome these problems, you may want to order ahead of time, write legibly, date all correspondence and keep a copy. Patience helps, too.

As recreational and commuter bike facilities expand across USA, the technicians are trying to document its specific characteristics.






