Hyperion Analyzer consists of the following components:

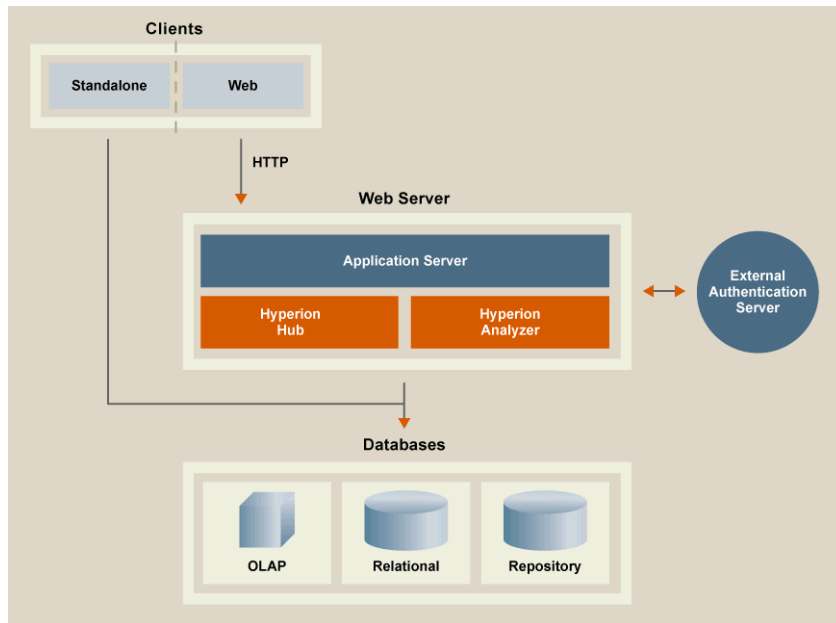
- **Repository** – A central storage location for Hyperion Analyzer system data, user IDs, user preferences, and report definitions in relational database tables.
- **Hyperion Analyzer Analysis Server** – A servlet-based Web application that resides within the J2EE application server. The Analysis Server facilitates the rendering of reports to either the HTML or Java clients and provides Web-based user management.
- **Hyperion Analyzer Administration Tools** – A client that provides a Java graphical interface for managing users, users groups, and database connections using a supported Web browser. It also provides access to several administration utilities.
- **Hyperion Analyzer Java Web Client** – A client that enables online analysis of data. You can design and format custom analysis applications without “coding.” Hyperion Analyzer is commonly used to conduct sales, key performance, and financial and forecasting analyses.
- **Hyperion Analyzer Windows Client** – A Java Web client interface and functionality delivered as a Java application for supported Microsoft Windows operating systems.
- **Hyperion Analyzer HTML Web Client** – An HTML thin client used by way of a supported Web browser. It is engineered for information consumers who do not require advanced design and content-creation capabilities.
- **Hyperion Analyzer API Toolkit** – A tool that developers can use to incorporate the Hyperion Analyzer Java Web Client look and feel and functionality into their own custom Web applications.

Architectural Overview

Hyperion Analyzer functionality is distributed across a multi-tiered architecture:

- Client layer
- Mid-tier layer
- Database server layer

Figure 1: Hyperion Analyzer Architecture



The client layer comprises the three Web browser clients and the API Toolkit. All clients communicate with the rest of the Hyperion Analyzer system using Hypertext Transfer Protocol (HTTP).

The mid-tier layer includes the following components:

- The Web server
- The J2EE application server
- The Hyperion Analyzer Analysis Server
- Drivers and protocols for communicating with the database server layer

The database server layer supports and shares both OLAP and relational databases, and the relational Hyperion Analyzer repository. Data source connectivity to Hyperion Financial Management and Hyperion Planning is also available.

A supported Web server is required to present the Web page from which Web clients are launched, to deliver files containing Java components, and to transport images generated at run time. After clients are established, the Web server manages all client mid-tier HTTP communication.

Hyperion Analyzer runs inside a J2EE application server. The supported J2EE application server shares Hyperion Analyzer business logic, network traffic, application security for large numbers of concurrent users, and provides load balancing and fault tolerance.

Through the installation process, Hyperion Analyzer is deployed into a J2EE application server, and Hyperion Analyzer tables are created on the RDBMS selected repository option. The system leverages a Web server to communicate with clients.

Deployment Options

Hyperion Analyzer provides a great deal of flexibility in the way you can configure the system. Configuration options are determined by several factors. Among other considerations, the following list includes some possible considerations for making deployment decisions:

- Current hardware and software
- Future hardware and software upgrades
- Quantity of data
- The balance between ease of configuration and performance

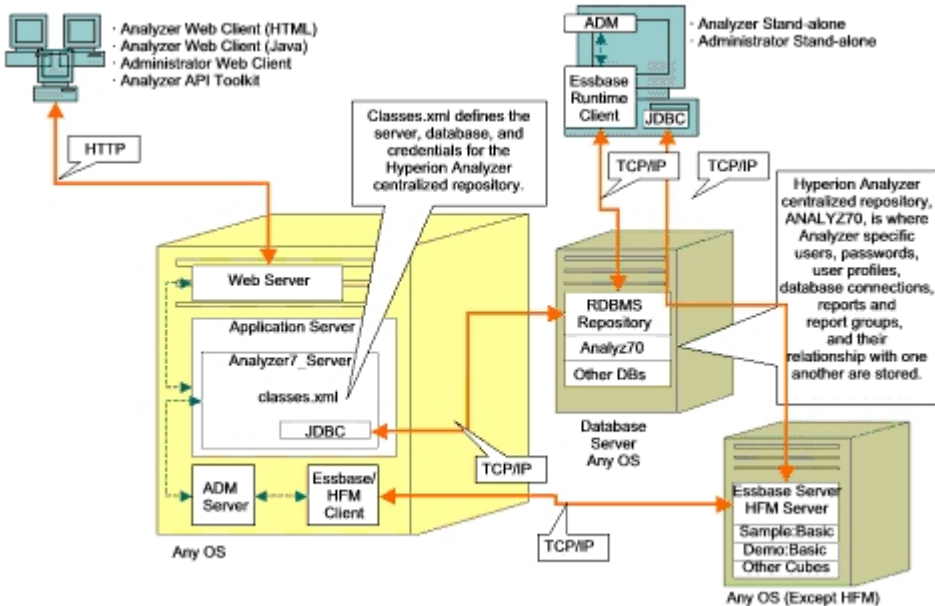

Deployment Option 1

The first deployment option supports medium to large configurations. In this instance, the Web server and application server are on the same computer and are separate from the RDBMS repository and data sources. This is the most typical and highly recommended configuration option. The separation of the components allows for high scalability, and you can upgrade each hardware component individually, as needed.

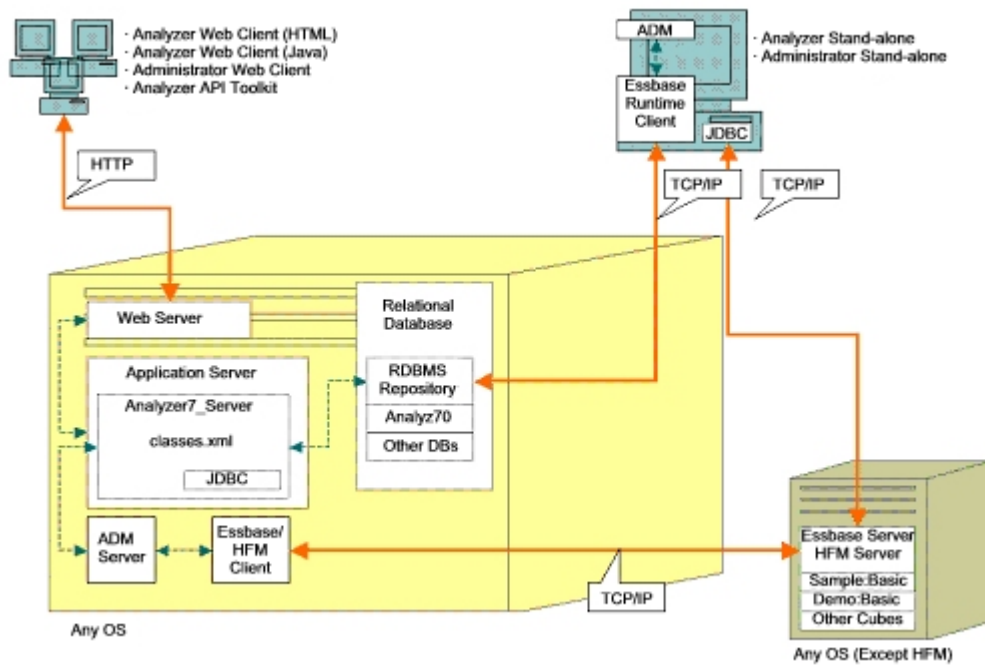
Figure 2: Hyperion Analyzer Deployment Option 1



Deployment Option 2

Deployment Option 2 establishes the Web server, application server, and RDBMS repository on same computer and separate from the data sources. This configuration option is used for medium-size deployments.

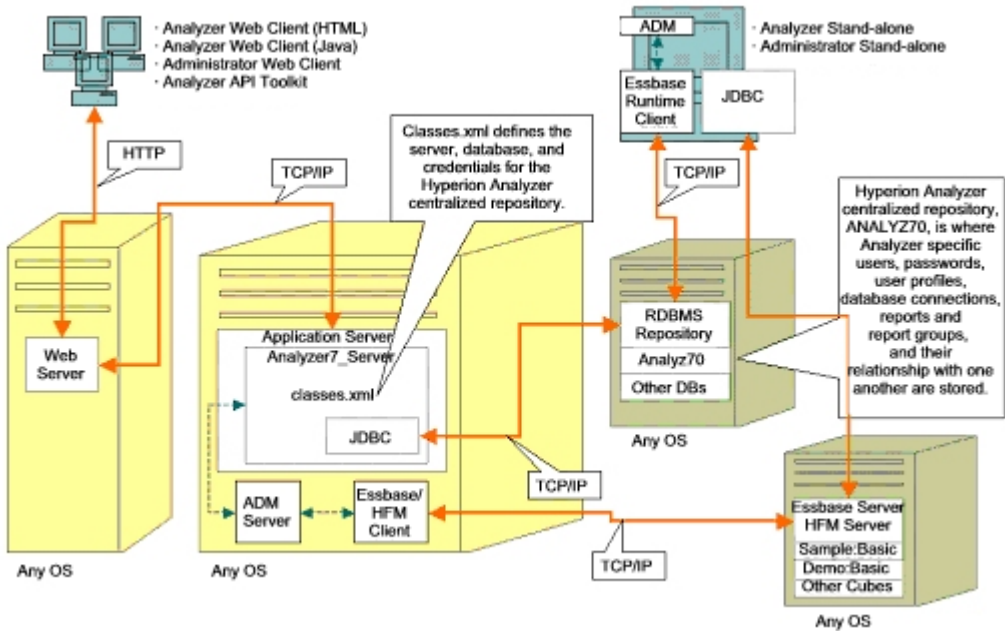
Figure 3: Hyperion Analyzer Deployment Option 2



Deployment Option 3

The third deployment option is intended to support a large enterprise system with an existing systemic structure that Hyperion Analyzer can integrate into and leverage. The Web server and application server are on separate computers, as are the RDBMS repository and data sources. This is the typical configuration option for an enterprise with a centralized Web server. However, this configuration requires more in depth knowledge of Web server and application server configuration.

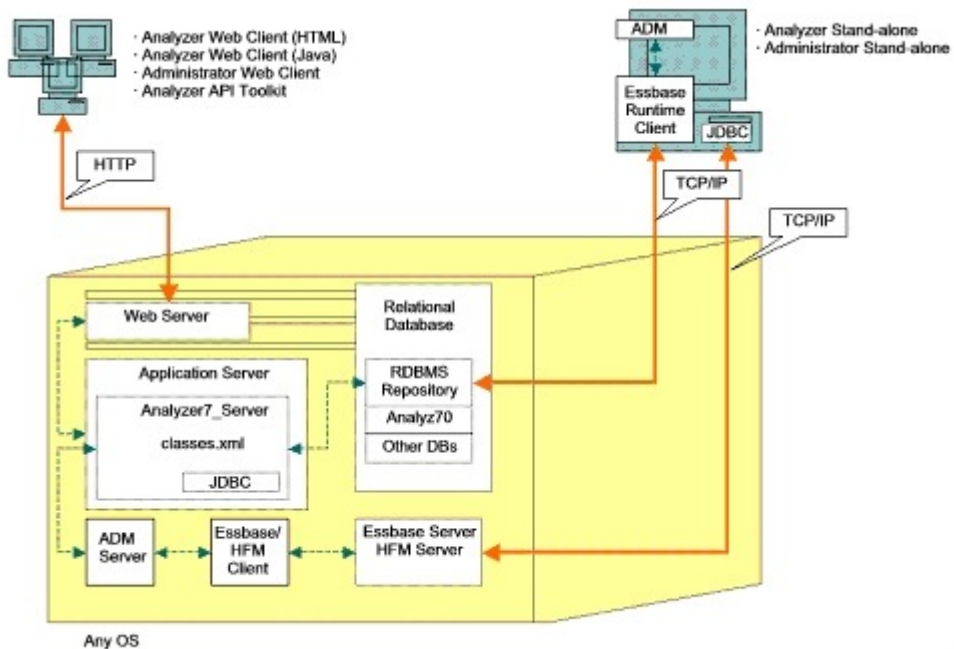
Figure 4: Hyperion Analyzer Deployment Option 3



Deployment Option 4

The fourth deployment option is best utilized for a small deployment, testing and prototype situations. The Web server, application server, Essbase/Hyperion Financial Management and RDBMS Repository are all on the same server. This option is not recommended for high concurrent usage, unless the servers have multiple CPUs and maximized availability of RAM.

Windows Stand-Alone Client Option

The Windows Stand-Alone Client option is included in each of the deployment options previously described. This option implements a stand-alone client in the Windows operating environment. It provides TCP/IP connectivity to the Hyperion Analyzer repository, RDBMS, and OLAP data sources without the use of Web and application servers. The drawback to this option is the required JDBC drivers and Hyperion Essbase client. This adds to the complexity of the deployment over the simpler, html-based thin client and java applet.

Installation Options

You can install Hyperion Analyzer using any of the following procedures:

- **Microsoft Windows Installation** – Use the `HyperionAnalyzerSuite7_0_0.exe` installation file to install Hyperion Analyzer on Microsoft Windows operating systems. You have the option of installing to the Apache Tomcat application server installed during the Hyperion Analyzer installation, an existing Apache Tomcat, IBM WebSphere, or BEA WebLogic application server. See [Chapter 2, “Installing Hyperion Analyzer on Microsoft Windows,”](#) for more information.
- **UNIX operating system** – Use the `HyperionAnalyzerAix.bin`, `HyperionAnalyzerHP11.bin`, and `HyperionAnalyzerSolaris.bin` executables to install the Hyperion Analyzer Analysis Server on either the IBM AIX, HP-UX, or Sun Solaris UNIX operating systems. Depending on the operating system you are using, you have the option of installing to the Apache Tomcat application server, an existing Apache Tomcat, IBM WebSphere, or BEA WebLogic application server. See the *Hyperion Analyzer Installation Guide for UNIX* for more information.

- **Manual deployments to application servers** – You can deploy Hyperion Analyzer manually to several application servers if you prefer not to use the provided application server. The following options are available:
 - **IBM WebSphere installation** – You must manually deploy Hyperion Analyzer onto a previously installed application server. See [Chapter 4, “Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into IBM WebSphere,”](#) for more information.
 - **BEA WebLogic installation** – You must manually deploy Hyperion Analyzer onto a previously installed application server. See [Chapter 5, “Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into BEA WebLogic,”](#) for more information.

System Requirements

Before you install Hyperion Analyzer on Microsoft Windows, it is important to understand the system requirements.

Platform Support Matrix

Hyperion Analyzer is supported on the platform software specified in the following tables. Subsequent maintenance releases and service packs may be used where the vendor asserts backward compatibility. Please be aware, however, that while these assertions are made in good faith, certain incompatibilities may exist. In the event that an incompatibility is identified, Hyperion may experience a delay in reproducing and fixing resultant issues for the affected versions.

Because the Apache Tomcat Application Server software is not intended to support large user communities in production environments, it is recommended that it is deployed with Hyperion Analyzer in test or demonstration environments where a controlled number of individuals will access and use the software.

Preinstallation Checklist

Before you install Hyperion Analyzer, complete the following tasks that apply to your installation situation:

- Ensure that the user logged on to the server is an Administrator with unrestricted privileges.
- Review the system requirements for your configuration and ensure compliance.
- If there is a previous release of Hyperion Analyzer on the system, create a backup of the Hyperion Analyzer repository. For more information see, [“Backing Up an Existing Repository” on page 33](#).
- Verify the server names and path names. Do not use the name “localhost” to identify servers.
- Ensure the availability of user names and passwords for your Hyperion Essbase OLAP server and your RDBMS.

Note: The name “System” cannot be used for logon accounts. Duplicate logons and passwords cannot be used. Ensure that your unique logons do not exceed eight (8) characters in length.

- If Hyperion Financial Management is the OLAP server of choice for your installation, ensure that the Hyperion Financial Management client is installed on the same computer as the application server.
- Ensure that the correct JDBC drivers are available for the RDBMS repository you are using.
- If you plan to use a preinstalled Apache Tomcat application server, ensure that it is stopped.
- If you plan to use a preinstalled RDBMS system, ensure that the service is started.

RDBMS Considerations

IBM DB2 Version 7.2

When using IBM DB2 7.2 as the relational repository for Hyperion Analyzer, you must configure DB2 to use JDBC 2.0 drivers and ensure that the following repository types comply as required:

- Enterprise Personal Edition
- Enterprise Server Edition

IBM DB2 7.2 users must perform additional steps after completing the installation. For more information, see “[Configuring IBM DB2 JDBC 2.0 Drivers](#)” on page 52.

Enterprise Server and Personal Edition

- Enter the case-sensitive database server name when specifying locations and paths. “Localhost” is not a recommended server name.
- User names are restricted to eight (8) characters or less.

IBM DB2 Enterprise Server Edition Only

- Ensure that user names are granted connection privileges to the database.
- Ensure the database and user name are created prior to installation to create the RDBMS repository.

Microsoft SQL Server 2000

- You must download the correct JDBC drivers from <http://msdn.microsoft.com/downloads/> before installing Hyperion Analyzer. You are prompted during installation to locate the JDBC drivers.
- Do not create the database or the logon prior to installation. The installation creates the logon inside the database during installation.

Oracle

- A Root logon is required to create a tablespace in Oracle.
- Use the case-sensitive tablespace server name when specifying locations and paths. “Localhost” is not a recommended server name.
- Do not create the tablespace or the user name prior to installation. The installer creates the both inside the database.

Backing Up an Existing Repository

The database tables in the Hyperion Analyzer 7.0 repository have been reorganized. During the installation, the tables are migrated to the new structure. Before beginning the installation, you must back up your existing repository. As a result of the table changes, previous releases of Hyperion Analyzer repository do not work with Hyperion Analyzer 7.0.

Installation Summary

To install Hyperion Analyzer successfully, you must complete the following tasks:

- Select the Hyperion Home directory.
- Select a usage mode and setup type.
- Review the terms of the license agreement.
- Select a location to install Hyperion Analyzer.
- Select and configure the application server.
- Select and configure the RDBMS.
- Configure Hyperion Analyzer.
- Review the summary of the installation.
- Complete the installation.
- Configure the software for your system.

Installing Hyperion Analyzer

The following procedures guide you through the process of installing Hyperion Analyzer.

Note: During the installation of Hyperion Analyzer, progress through the windows by clicking the Next button. To cancel the installation, click the Cancel button.

► To install Hyperion Analyzer:

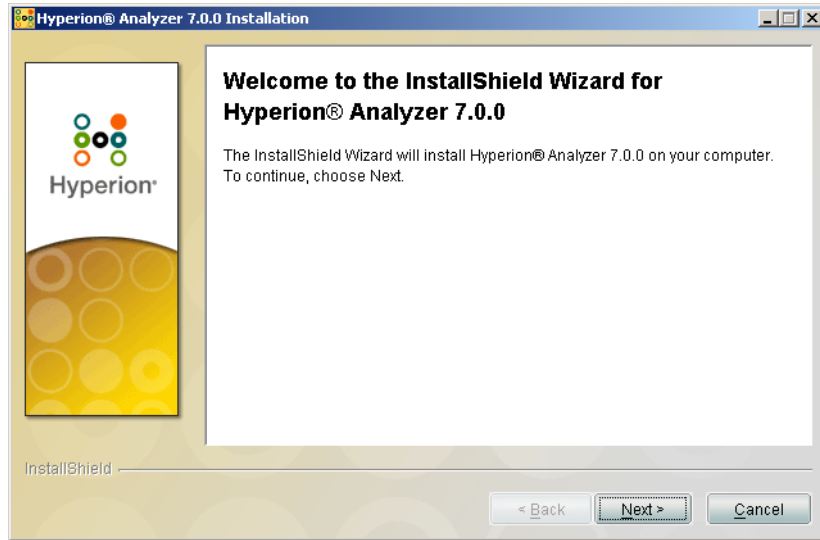
1. Perform one of the following tasks:

- If you have the Hyperion Analyzer CD, insert the CD in your CD-ROM drive.
- If you downloaded the Hyperion Analyzer software from an FTP site or the Hyperion Download Center, perform one of the following tasks:
 - Navigate to the directory where you downloaded the installation application and double-click **setup.exe**.

On the Windows desktop, click **Start > Run** and type the **<drive>:\<path>\HyperionAnalyzerSuite7_0_0.exe**, then click **OK**. Where the *<drive>* and *<path>* is the location of the Hyperion Analyzer installation application.

The Welcome window is displayed.

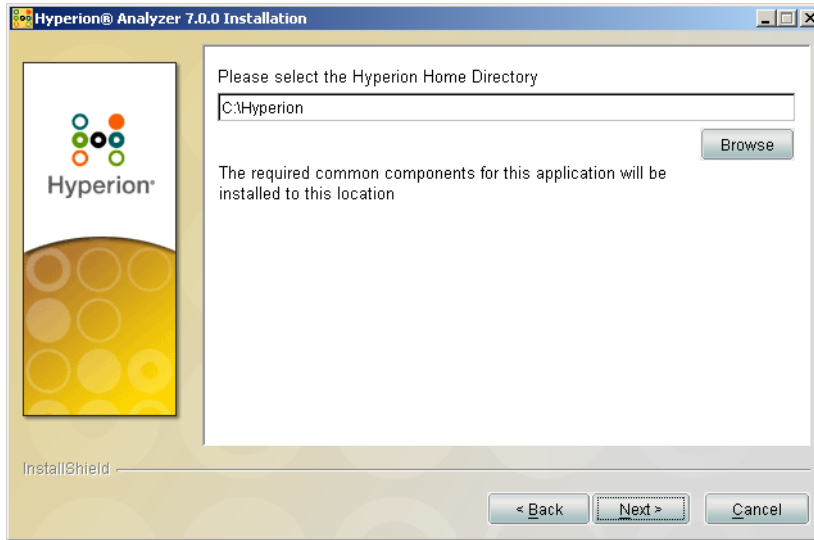
Figure 6: Installation Welcome



2. Click **Next**.

Figure 7: Select Hyperion Home

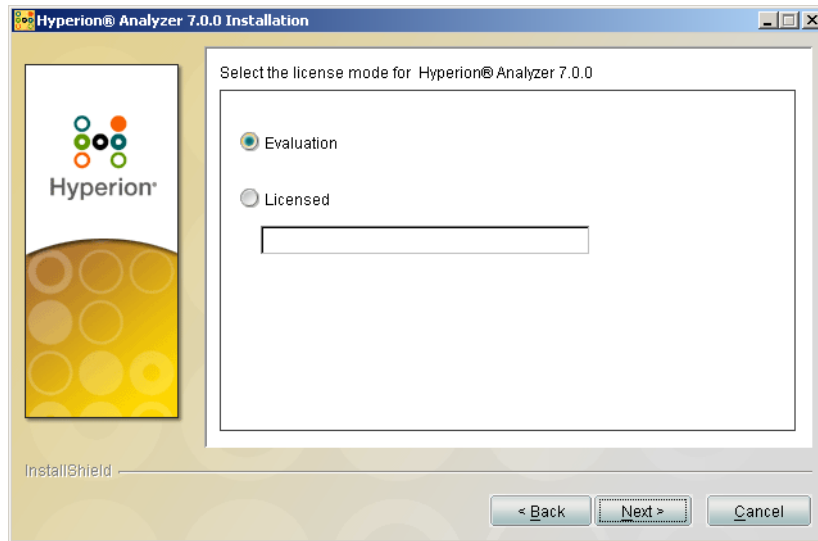


The first time you run the Hyperion Analyzer installer on a machine, you are prompted to select the Hyperion Home directory. The default path is `C:\Hyperion`. You can type or click **Browse** to change the Hyperion Home directory. Once defined, all required common components for Hyperion applications are stored in the Hyperion Home directory. For additional information on the files and folders stored in the Hyperion Home directory, see [Chapter 3, “What’s Installed?”](#).

3. Type or click **Browse** to choose the location of your Hyperion Home directory. If you have not created a Hyperion Home directory, one is created for you based on the path name you enter. If a Hyperion Home directory is detected, you cannot select a new directory. Later in the installation process you have the option to install Analyzer in the Home directory or a different location.
4. Click **Next**.

Figure 8: License Mode



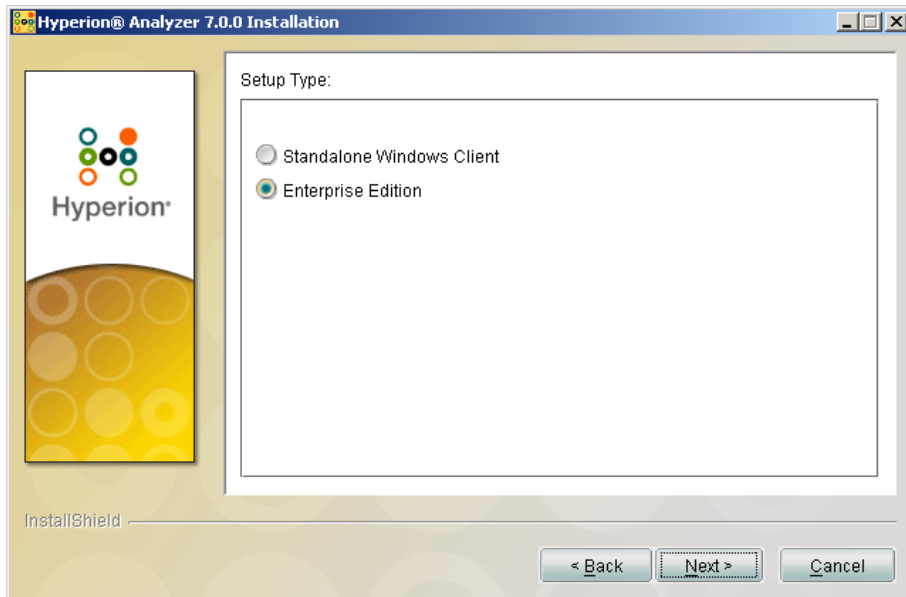
5. Select one of the following usage types:
 - To install a trial version of Hyperion Analyzer, select **Evaluation**.
 - To install a licensed version of Hyperion Analyzer, select **Licensed** and then enter a valid license key.

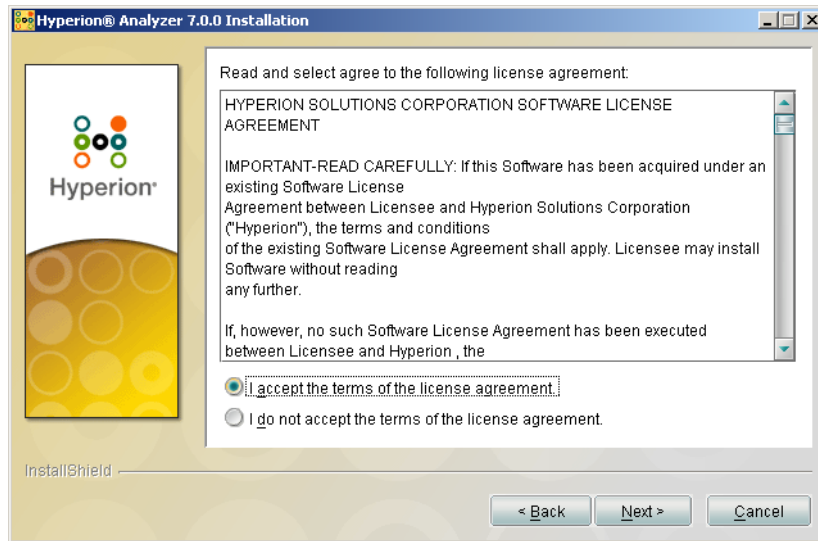
Figure 9: Installation Setup Type



7. Select one of the following setup types:
 - To install the Windows Stand-alone Client, select **Standalone Windows Client**. This installs the files necessary to access Hyperion Analyzer server installed on another computer via TCP/IP only.
 - To install both the client and the server software, click **Enterprise Edition**. This installs Hyperion Analyzer within an application server for access via HTTP and TCP/IP.
8. Click **Next**.

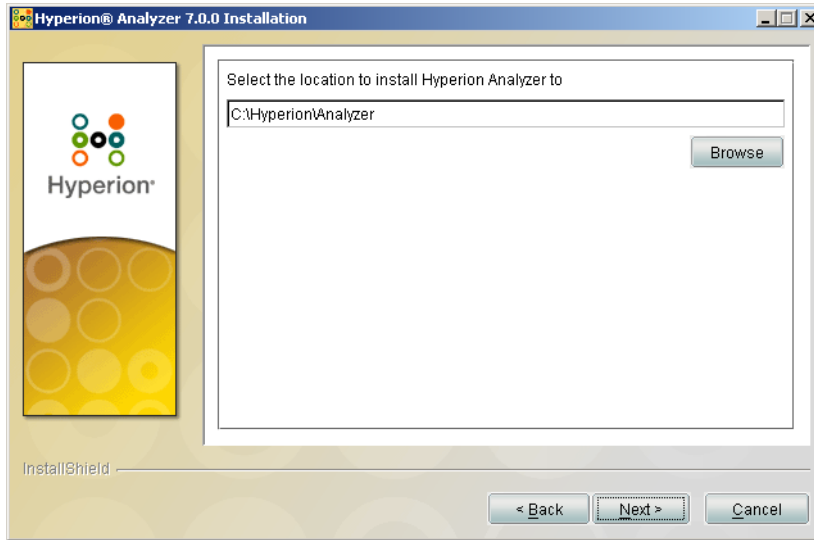
Figure 10: Installation License Agreement

Figure 11: Select Location

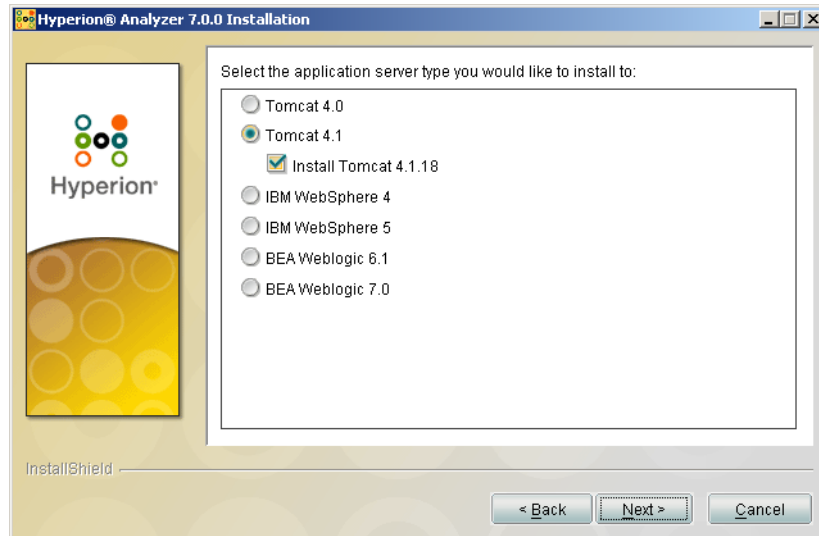

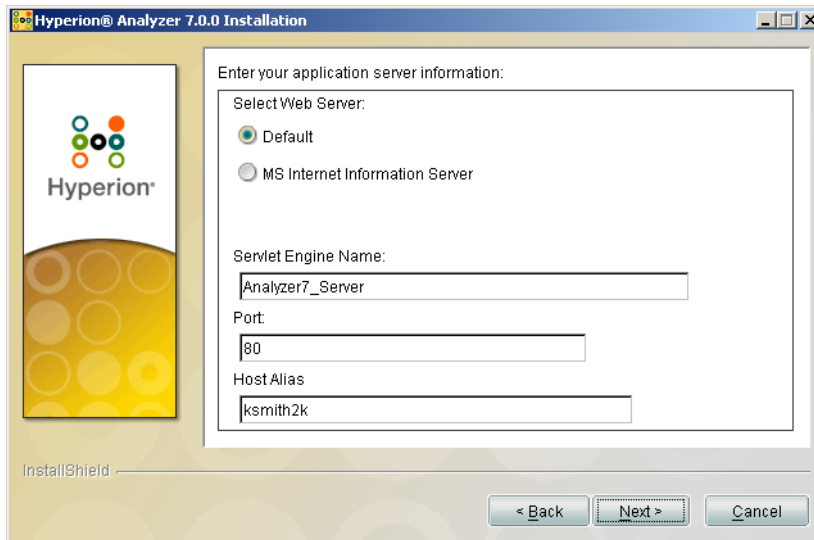

 - **Optional:** Select to **Install Tomcat 4.1.18**. If you do not yet have an application server installed, Apache Tomcat 4.1.18 and Hyperion Analyzer are installed as part of the “batteries included” option.
- **IBM WebSphere 4** – Installs Hyperion Analyzer on an IBM WebSphere 4.0.5 application server.
- **IBM WebSphere 5** – Installs Hyperion Analyzer on an IBM WebSphere 5 application server.
- **WebLogic 6.1** – Installs Hyperion Analyzer on a BEA WebLogic 6.1 application server.

- **WebLogic 7.0** – Installs Hyperion Analyzer on a BEA WebLogic 7.0 application server.

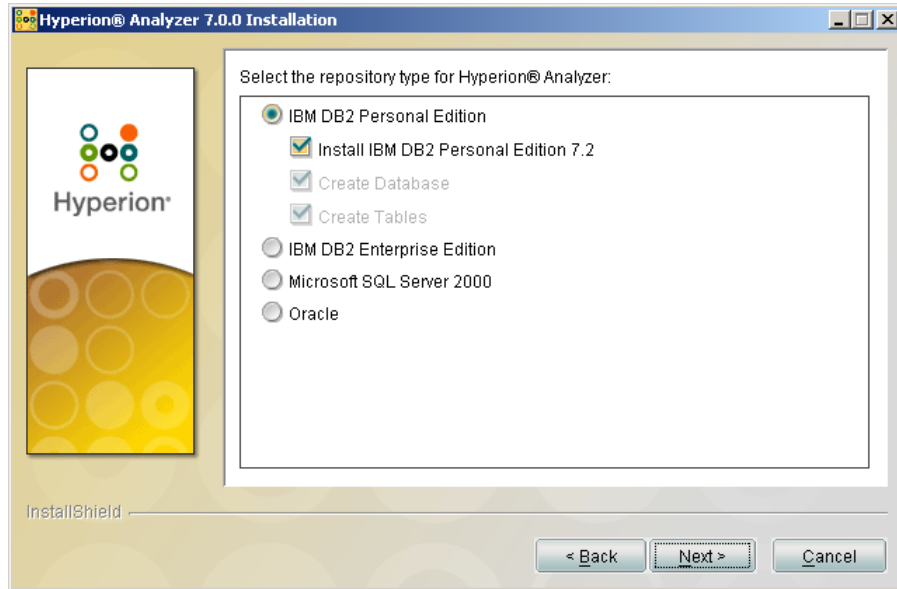

Based on [Table 5](#), you can make a decision from the following examples:

- For a first time installation, select the “batteries included” option, or Create Database/Tablespace and Create Repository.
- If you have already created the database, select Create Repository.
- If you are upgrading, deselect all options. The installer upgrades your repository automatically.

16. Click Next.

In addition, you must provide an Analyzer user name, which the Hyperion Analyzer Server uses to communicate to the Hyperion Analyzer repository.

Tip: You can click Test Connection to verify that there are no connectivity issues with the repository. If the connection to the repository is successful, you can continue with the installation. If the repository connection fails, you should verify your DBA user name and password and troubleshoot the problem within your database software.

At this point in the installation process you can specify the JDBC drivers for an RDBMS type to establish a drill-through connection with another, existing database. This second set of RDBMS type and JDBC driver selections that supports relational drill-through and relational connections (Virtual Cubes) functionality is optional.

20. Perform one of the following tasks:

- If a drill-through or relational (Virtual Cubes) connections are not required, proceed to [step 22](#).

- If a drill-through or relational (Virtual Cubes) connections are required, select an available RDBMS type:
 - DB2 Enterprise
 - MS SQL Server
 - Oracle
 - Teradata

A corresponding JDBC driver path field is displayed.

21. Enter or browse to the path name of the JDBC driver. For example, the JDBC driver file name for Oracle is `classes12.zip`.

22. Click **Next**.

The Installation Summary window is displayed. The summary provides a list of your configuration selections.

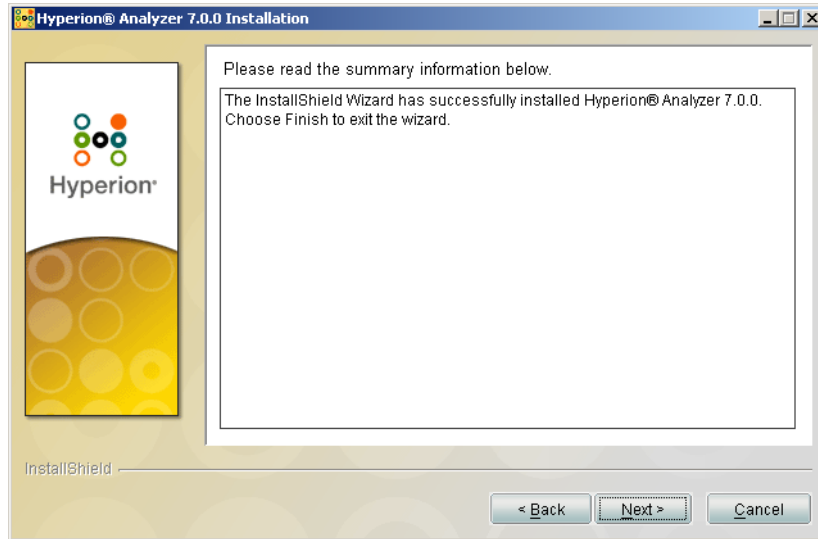
Note: Please be patient, it may take slightly longer for the Summary window to appear.

23. Review the summary and perform one of the following tasks:

- To make corrections in the installation configuration, click **Back**.
- If the configuration is correct, click **Next**.

Note: The default user and password are *Administrator* and *password* respectively. You can use the installation log file to troubleshoot installation problems. You can find the log file in `<Hyperion Home>/Analyzer_Install.log`. The Hyperion Home directory is the directory you specified on the second window of the Hyperion Analyzer installation.

24. Click **Finish**.

The Setup Complete window closes and the installation of Hyperion Analyzer for Windows is complete.

25. Reboot the computer for IBM WebSphere application server installations only.

Configuring IBM DB2 JDBC 2.0 Drivers

► To configure the DB2 RDBMS to use JDBC 2.0 drivers:

1. Stop all database services.
2. Run `usejdbc2.bat` in the `sql1lib\java12` subdirectory.

Note: When configuring the JDBC drivers for IBM DB2 8.1, ensure that the `db2jcc.jar` file is in the same directory as the `db2java.zip` file.

3. Restart all database services.

Note: When installing the Hyperion Analyzer repository into an existing DB2 database, you must provide a user name and the database information to complete the installation. The user name you provide must be assigned to the database.

Deciding System Variable Setting Methods

There is a great deal of flexibility in your Hyperion Analyzer installation choices. With that flexibility you are required to make certain configuration decisions. [Table 10](#) provides a matrix of how system variables are set and when this requires you to reboot the server prior to starting the application server and using Hyperion Analyzer.

Setting and Sourcing PATH Variables

The PATH variable needs to be set or sourced for your Windows system before starting the existing IBM WebSphere, Apache Tomcat or BEA Weblogic application server and using Hyperion Analyzer. You can set the PATH variable using one of the following:

- The System Properties dialog box
- A startup script

Setting the PATH variable in the System Properties dialog box sets the variable when the computer is started and requires rebooting the computer. Sourcing the variable with the application server startup script goes into affect only for the current application server session and does not require rebooting the computer. This provides flexibility in how you choose to set the PATH variable.

Sourcing Variables for Existing IBM WebSphere

- ▶ To source the Analyzer environment variables into WebSphere with the `startServer.bat` file:
 1. Open the `startServer.bat` file found in the `\WebSphere\appserver\bin` directory.
 2. Add the following call immediately after the line containing `SET LOCAL`:

```
call 'c:\hyperion\analyzer\analyzer_env.bat'
```

where the path represents the location of your Hyperion Analyzer 7.0 installation.
 3. Start or Restart IBM WebSphere.

Setting Variables for Existing Apache Tomcat

- ▶ To set the PATH variable using the System Properties dialog box:
 1. Right-click **My Computer** and choose **Properties** to open the **System Properties** dialog box.
 2. Click the **Advanced** tab.
 3. Click the **Environment Variables** button.
 4. Edit the PATH system variable to include the following paths with semi-colon delimiters:

```
%ANALYZER_INSTALL_ROOT%/adm/bin/nt  
%ANALYZER_INSTALL_ROOT%/common
```
 5. Click **OK** to close the Environment Variables dialog box.
 6. Click **OK** to close the System Properties dialog box.

7. Reboot the computer.

CAUTION: You must reboot the computer after setting PATH variables for the variables to take effect and Hyperion Analyzer to operate properly.

Sourcing Variables for Existing Apache Tomcat

- ▶ To source the PATH variables for Apache Tomcat with the application server startup script:
 1. Ensure that the application server is stopped.
 2. Locate the Hyperion Analyzer `startup.bat` file in your application server installation. For example, in the batteries included installation of Apache Tomcat, the path is:
`c:\hyperion\analyzer\appserver\bin`
 3. Edit the `startup.bat` file to include setting the PATH variable:
`"call %analyzerinstallroot%\analyzer_env.bat"`
 4. **Save** and **Close** the `startup.bat` file.
 5. Right-click on the shortcut to Hyperion Analyzer found at **Start > Hyperion Solutions > Hyperion Analyzer 7.0 > Start Analyzer Server**, and click **Properties**.
 6. Edit the **Target** path from `analyzer_startup.exe` to `startup.bat` without modifying any other part of the path.
 7. Click **OK**.

Setting the PATH Variables for BEA Weblogic

The PATH variable needs to be set for your Windows system before starting the application server and using Hyperion Analyzer. You can set the PATH variable using the System Properties dialog box. This sets the variable when the computer is started and requires rebooting the computer.

- ▶ To set the PATH variable for BEA Weblogic using the System Properties dialog box:
 1. Right-click **My Computer** and choose **Properties** to open the **System Properties** dialog box.
 2. Click the **Advanced** tab.
 3. Click the **Environment Variables** button.
 4. Edit the PATH system variable to include the following paths with semi-colon delimiters:

```
%ANALYZER_INSTALL_ROOT%/adm/bin/nt  
%ANALYZER_INSTALL_ROOT%/common
```
 5. Click **OK** to close the environment variables dialog.
 6. Click **OK** to close the System Properties dialog box.
 7. Reboot the computer.

CAUTION: You must reboot the computer after setting PATH variables for the variables to take effect and Hyperion Analyzer to operate properly.

Sourcing the PATH Variables for BEA WebLogic

If BEA WebLogic is used as your application server, you can source the PATH variables in the startup script. This is accomplished by editing the `startWebLogic.cmd` file. There are several tasks accomplished by doing this:

- Setting the CLASSPATH variables for BEA WebLogic
- Configuring the JAVAHOME variables
- Calling the `analyzer_env.bat` file

When `analyzer_env.bat` file is called it creates connections to the Hyperion Analyzer repository, other JDBC connections, and sets path variables required to enable Hyperion Essbase connections. The following procedure guides you through the task of sourcing the system variables.

- ▶ To source system variables for BEA WebLogic with the application server startup script:

1. Ensure that the application server is not running.
2. Locate the `startWebLogic.cmd` file by navigating to the following path:

```
<beainstall>\wlserver6.1\config\<domainname>\startWebLogic.cmd
```

3. Where `<beainstall>` is the path where BEA WebLogic is installed, and `<domainname>` is the name of the domain created in BEA WebLogic.

4. Edit the file to reflect the following changes:

```
"set CLASSPATH=.;.\lib\weblogic_sp.jar;.\lib\weblogic.jar;
%CLASSPATH%"
""%JAVA_HOME%\bin\java" -hotspot -ms128m -mx256m -classpath
"%CLASSPATH%"..."
"call %analyzerinstallroot%\analyzer_env.bat"
```

Where `%analyzerinstallroot%` is the root directory of where Hyperion Analyzer is installed. The default is `c:\Hyperion\Analyzer`

Note: The changes to the values `-ms` and `-mx` are the suggested minimum values.

5. **Save and Close** the `startWebLogic.cmd` file.

Manual Deployment of WebSphere and WebLogic

If you selected an existing installation of IBM WebSphere or BEA WebLogic as the application server to deploy Hyperion Analyzer into, you must execute some manual deployment configurations before continuing. The following chapters provide the procedures and information required to deploy manually to the application servers:

Configuring External and Application Security

After you install Hyperion Analyzer you have the option of implementing one of several security methods. Security can be broken down into external authentication and internal authorization. Hyperion Analyzer provides the following options for implementing security:

- Analyzer Security (default)
- Essbase Security
- External Authentication

The default Hyperion Analyzer security configuration is application security. Without a valid user name and password, which is contained in the Hyperion Analyzer repository, you are not authenticated as a user in Hyperion Analyzer.

Although not required for Hyperion Analyzer to operate, it is advisable to implement an external authentication method for integrating with other Hyperion products. This is provided by utilizing existing Hyperion Essbase security or configuring an existing authentication method such as the following:

- Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP)
- Microsoft Windows NT LAN Manager (NTLM)
- Microsoft Active Directory (MSAD)

For more information on these security options see Chapter 2 “Managing Security and Access” of the *Hyperion Analyzer Administrator’s Guide*.

Starting the Hyperion Essbase OLAP Server

- ▶ To start the Essbase OLAP server:
 1. From the Windows desktop, click **Start > Programs > Hyperion Solutions > Hyperion Essbase > Essbase OLAP Server**.
 2. Enter a valid password and press **Enter**.

Starting RDBMS Services

The following section describes how to start RDBMS services for IBM DB2.

Starting IBM DB2 Enterprise Personal Edition

If you selected and installed IBM DB2 Enterprise Personal Edition as your repository, ensure that the following services are started:

- DB2 – DB2
- DB2 – DB2DAS00
- DB2 JDBC Applet Server

Starting the Hyperion Analyzer Server

Follow the instructions in your application server documentation to start application servers other than Apache Tomcat. If you selected Apache Tomcat as your application server, the next section provides procedures to start and stop the server.

Starting and Stopping the Tomcat Application Server

If you selected the Apache Tomcat application server during the installation process, you must start the server before launching Hyperion Analyzer and stop the server when your work is complete.

- ▶ To start the Apache Tomcat application server click **Start > Programs > Hyperion Solutions > Hyperion Analyzer 7.0 > Start Analyzer Server**.
- ▶ To stop the Apache Tomcat application server click **Start > Programs > Hyperion Solutions > Hyperion Analyzer 7.0 > Stop Analyzer Server**.

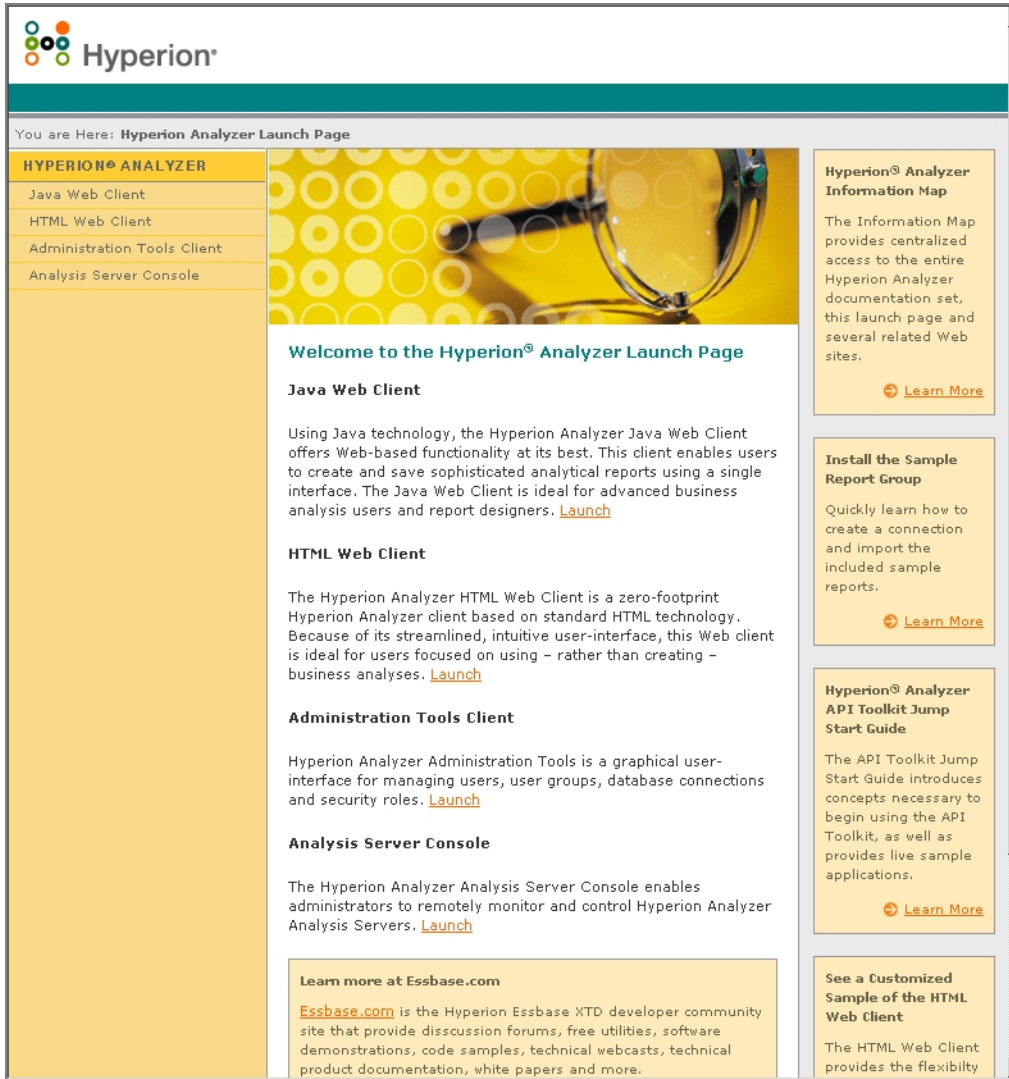

Configuring the Microsoft IIS Web Server

When employing Microsoft Internet Information Services (IIS) in conjunction with the Apache Tomcat 4.0.4 application server, you must manually configure the Microsoft IIS Web server.

- ▶ To configure Microsoft IIS for Apache Tomcat:
 1. Add a virtual directory called “jakarta” to the directory containing the `isapi_redirect.dll` (`hyperion/analyzer/appserver/bin`), and set permissions to read and execute.
 2. Add an ISAPI filter called “jakarta” to the same directory.
 3. Restart Microsoft IIS.

Manual Configuration Steps

- ▶ To add a virtual directory and set permissions:
 1. Run the Microsoft IIS Internet Service Manager, Click the **plus sign (+)** to expand the **Web server name node**, then select the **Default Web site**.
 2. Right-click and select **Properties**.
The Default Web Site Properties dialog box is displayed.
 3. Click the **Directory Security** tab.
 4. In the Anonymous Access and Authentication Control section, click **Edit**.
The Authentication Methods dialog box is displayed.
 5. Ensure that the Anonymous User is a valid Windows NT user with read, write or change privileges, then click **OK**.
 6. Right-click the **Default Web site** again, and select **New > Virtual Directory**.
The Virtual Directory Creation dialog box is displayed.
 7. Enter **Jakarta** as the virtual directory name, then click **Next**.
 8. Enter the path to the directory containing the `isapi_redirect.dll` (`hyperion/analyzer/appserver/bin`), then click **Next**.
 9. Ensure the **Allow Read Access** and **Allow Execute Access** checkboxes are selected, then click **Finish**.

The Virtual Directory is displayed in the tree below the Default Web Site.

10. Select the **Default Web Site**, then right-click and select **Properties**.

The Default Web Site Properties dialog box is displayed.

11. Click the **ISAPI Filters** tab, then click **Add**.

The Filter Properties dialog box is displayed.

12. Enter **Jakarta** as the filter name.

13. Enter the path to the directory containing the `isapi_redirect.dll` file (`hyperion/analyzer/appserver/bin`), then click **OK**.

14. Restart Microsoft IIS.

This chapter provides information on what is installed with Hyperion Analyzer and where it is located. Installation locations are based on the deployed application server. Typically, a Hyperion Analyzer installation is structured as described in the tables in the following sections.

Hyperion Analyzer Top-Level Directories

The following directories are installed inside your Hyperion Home directory, by default this is `<drive>:\Hyperion\`. For example, `C:\Hyperion\`.

Table 11: Hyperion Analyzer Top-Level Directories

Directory	Description
Analyzer	The directory containing configuration files, generated ear files and Analyzer 5 Migration Utilities.
common	The directory containing the common Hyperion components such as ADM, application servers, Common Security Services (CSS), Hyperion Pluggable Look and Feel, JDK, and loggers.

Note: If you installed Hyperion Analyzer to a different location, other than the Home directory, the `\Analyzer\` directory appears in the location you specified. For example, your Hyperion Home directory might be `C:\Analyzer\` and your Hyperion Analyzer installation directory might be on a different drive, such as `D:\Hyperion`.

Hyperion Analyzer Directories

If you installed Hyperion Analyzer on an existing Application server the directories are in the following directory path:

`\Hyperion\Analyzer\`

All of the Hyperion Analyzer files are contained in the `Analyzer.ear` file. See [Chapter 4, “Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into IBM WebSphere,”](#) or [Chapter 5, “Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into BEA WebLogic,”](#) for more information about deploying the EAR file. The `Analyzer` directory contains an `\Ear` subdirectory. This contains the contents of the EAR file. When changes are made to the deployment, they can be made to this directory. Then when it is time to redeploy the EAR file, you can rebuild it using the `\analyzer\utils\rebuild_ear.bat` file.

Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into IBM WebSphere

If you are using IBM WebSphere 4, you must manually deploy Hyperion Analyzer into a previously installed IBM WebSphere application server. It is assumed that you have met all system requirements and that you executed the Hyperion Analyzer installation, including the selection of IBM WebSphere as the application server.

Deploying to IBM WebSphere

Deploying to IBM WebSphere Advanced Edition

The following procedures apply to IBM WebSphere 4 Advanced Edition. If you are using IBM WebSphere 4 Advanced Edition Single Server, proceed to [“Deploying to Advanced Edition Single Server”](#) on page 72.

Installing the Web Application

- ▶ To install the Hyperion Analyzer Web application:
 1. Copy the `Analyzer70.ear` enterprise archive file from the `\Analyzer\` directory to the `WebSphere \Installable Apps\` directory.

CAUTION: Do not place the archive file in the `InstalledApps` directory or Hyperion Analyzer is unable to start.

2. Open the WebSphere Administration Server Console.

3. Right-click the **Enterprise Applications** node in the navigation window (on the left side of the console interface).
4. Select **Install Enterprise Application**.

Note: Leave the Application Name field blank on this window.

5. Click **Browse**, navigate to the `Analyzer70.ear` enterprise archive file located in the `Installable Apps` directory, and open it.
6. Click **Next**.

Setting Up WebSphere Security

During the deployment process, you are prompted to set up WebSphere system security by the Mapping Users to Roles dialog box.

► To set up WebSphere security and define user permissions:

1. Select **Everyone**, click the **Mapping Users to Roles** select button.
2. In the **Select Users/Groups – Everyone** dialog box, select the **Everyone (No authentication)** check box, then click **OK**.

WebSphere indicates that all Hyperion Analyzer users belong to a single security group, called Everyone. You can specify Hyperion Analyzer roles and permissions later, using Hyperion Analyzer Administration Tools.

3. Proceed through the next series of installation pages until you reach the **Selecting Application Servers** page.

This window enables IBM WebSphere Enterprise Server Edition to specify the application servers in the network cluster supporting Hyperion Analyzer.

Confirm the Following is the last page in the series.

4. Ensure that the node, port, and the fully qualified path name to the `InstalledApps` directory appear in the **Confirm the Following** page.

These descriptions must be correct and match the information you provided during the Hyperion Analyzer installation exactly. If they do not, you have the option of reinstalling or modifying the `web.xml` configuration file manually.

5. Click **Finish** to complete installation of the enterprise application.

Changing the IBM HTTP Server httpd.conf file

If you are installing Hyperion Analyzer on Windows, you must modify the `httpd.conf` file.

➤ To change the `httpd.conf` file:

1. Use a text editor to open the IBM HTTP Server `httpd.conf` file. The default location is `C:\IBM_HTTP_Server\Conf\httpd.conf`.
2. Search for the following information:

AfpaCache on  
AfpaLogFile "d:\IBM HTTP Server\logs\afpalog" V-ECLF
```

3. Comment out these three lines by entering a pound sign (#) at the beginning of each line, as follows:

Regenerating the Web Server Plug-in

➤ To regenerate the Web Server Plug-in:

1. Open the WebSphere 4 Administration Server Console.
2. Expand **Nodes** in the navigation window (at the left side of the console interface).
3. Right-click the server node where Hyperion Analyzer is installed.
4. Select **Regen Webserver Plug-in**.
5. Go to Microsoft Windows Services and stop and start the IBM HTTP Server.
6. Reboot the WebSphere server for the new environmental variables to take effect.

Start the Hyperion Analyzer Web Application

Before you start the Hyperion Analyzer Web Application, make sure you edited the `startServer.bat` file and added the call to the `analyzer_env.bat` file. For additional information, see [“Sourcing Variables for Existing IBM WebSphere” on page 54](#).

- ▶ To start the Hyperion Analyzer Web application:
 1. Open the WebSphere Administration Server Console.
 2. Expand the **Enterprise Application** node in the navigation window (on the left side of the console interface).
 3. Right-click the **Hyperion Analyzer** application.
 4. Select **Start**.
 5. Open a Web browser and enter the URL provided in the last window of the Hyperion Analyzer installation. The default URL is `http://<server-name>/Analyzer7_Server/index.html`.

The Hyperion Analyzer launch page is displayed, and you can begin multidimensional and relational analysis with the Hyperion Analyzer client of your choice.

Deploying to Advanced Edition Single Server

The following sections describe how to deploy Hyperion Analyzer to Advanced Edition single server.

Installing the Web Application

- ▶ To install the Hyperion Analyzer enterprise application:
 1. Copy the output `Analyzer70.ear` enterprise archive file from the `\analyzer\` directory to the `WebSphere Installable Apps` directory.

CAUTION: Do not place the archive file in the `InstalledApps` directory or Hyperion Analyzer will **not** start.

2. Open the WebSphere Administration Server Console.
3. Expand the **Nodes** node and the server node where you want to install Hyperion Analyzer, then select **Enterprise Application**.
4. Click the **Install** button.

Note: Leave the Application Name field blank on this window.

5. Use the **Browse** button to navigate to the enterprise archive file in the `Installable Apps` directory.
6. Click **Next**.

Set Up WebSphere Security

During the deployment process you are prompted to set up WebSphere system security. The WebSphere Application Installation Mapping Roles to Users page indicates that all Hyperion Analyzer users belong to a single security group, called Everyone.

- ▶ To set up WebSphere security and define user permissions:
 1. On the **Mapping Roles to Users** page, select the **Special Subjects Everyone** check box.

You can specify Hyperion Analyzer roles and permissions later, using Hyperion Analyzer Administration Tools.

Confirm the Following is the last page in the series.

2. Ensure that the node, port, and the fully-qualified path name to the `InstalledApps` directory appear on the **Confirm the Following** page.

These descriptions must be correct and match the information that you provided to the Hyperion Analyzer installation exactly. If they do not, you have the option of reinstalling or modifying the `web.xml` configuration file manually.

3. Click **Finish** to complete installation of the enterprise application.

Changing the IBM HTTP Server httpd.conf file

2. Expand the **Nodes** node and the server node where Hyperion Analyzer is installed. Expand the **Application Servers** node, then click **Default Server**.
3. Under the **Advanced Settings** banner, click **Web Server Plug-in Configuration**.
4. Click **Generate**.
5. Go to Microsoft Windows Services and stop and start the IBM HTTP Server.
6. Reboot the WebSphere server for the new environmental variables to take effect.

Starting the Hyperion Analyzer Web Application

Deploying Hyperion Analyzer into BEA WebLogic

Deploying to BEA WebLogic

You must manually deploy Hyperion Analyzer to a previously installed BEA WebLogic 7.0 application server.

- ▶ To manually deploy Hyperion Analyzer to a BEA WebLogic 7.0 application server:
 1. Start the BEA WebLogic Server.
 2. Start the WebLogic Server Console.
 3. Navigate to **Deployments > Applications**, then click **Configure a new Application**.
 4. Click the correct drive and navigate to the newly created enterprise archive (EAR) file.
 5. When the correct EAR file is displayed, click its corresponding [**select**] hyperlink.
 6. Step 3 of the deployment process prompts you to indicate the server to which the EAR file is deployed.
 7. Select an **Available Server**, and move it to the **Target Server** window using the arrow button control.
 8. Enter a name for the Application in the **Step 4** field, the default is “Analyzer70”.
 9. Click the **Configure and Display** control button.
 10. The WebLogic Server EAR file is configured and deployed.
 11. To continue with the installation, return to “[Configuring External and Application Security](#)” on page 58.

Creating Repositories with Scripts

Importing Sample Reports

The following sections describe how to create a database connection and import the sample reports.

Creating a Database Connection

It is necessary to create a database connection to the Hyperion Essbase cube before importing the sample reports.

► To import the sample report group and reports:

1. Start a supported Web browser.
2. Select **File > Open**.
3. Enter the URL of the Hyperion Analyzer launch page, and press **Enter**.
For example:
`http://<servername>/Analyzer7_Server/index.html`
4. On the Hyperion Analyzer Launch Page, click the **Java Web Client** link.
Hyperion Analyzer starts, and the Login dialog box is displayed.
5. Enter a valid user ID and password (Administrator/password) and click **OK**.
6. In Hyperion Analyzer, select **Tools > User Preferences** from the drop-down menu.
The User Preferences dialog box is displayed.
7. Click **Connections**.
The available connections display.
8. Click the **Add New** button.
The Select Database Type dialog box is displayed.
9. Select **Essbase** from the drop-down list and click **OK**.
The Hyperion Essbase Login dialog box is displayed.
10. Specify the Hyperion Essbase server, and a valid Hyperion Essbase user ID and password, then click **OK**.
The List Databases dialog box is displayed.

11. Select **Sample:Basic** from the **Available Databases** list and click the right-arrow (>) button.
Sample:Basic is added to the Selected Databases list.
12. Click **OK**.
Sample:Basic is added to the Connections User Preferences list.
13. Click **Apply**, then click **Close**.

Importing the Sample Report Group

It is necessary to import a report group by using the Java Web Client.

Note: You must be an Administrator or Power User and have write privileges to import a report group.

► To import a sample report group:

1. From the Java Web Client Menu Bar select **File > Import > Report Group**.

The Open dialog box is displayed.

2. Select the `Sample Reports.ARG` file located in the Hyperion Home directory. For example, if you are using Apache Tomcat the Hyperion Home directory is:

```
Hyperion\common\appServers\Tomcat\4.1.18\webapps\Analyzer7_
Server\samples
```

The Map Connections dialog box is displayed.

3. Select **localhost:Sample:Basic** from the **Exported Connection** list, then select the database connection that you just created in the Available Database Connections list.
4. Click the **Map It!** button.
5. Click **OK**.
6. Type **Sample Reports** for the report group name and click **OK**.

The report group is saved to the repository.

Importing the API Samples Report Group

- ▶ To import the API Samples report group:
1. From the Java Web Client Menu Bar select **File > Import > Report Group**.
The Open dialog box is displayed.
 2. Select the `api_samples.ARG` file located in the Hyperion Home directory.
For example, if you are using Apache Tomcat the Hyperion Home directory is:

```
Hyperion\common\appServers\Tomcat\4.1.18\webapps\Analyzer7_Server\samples
```


The Map Connections dialog box is displayed.
 3. Select **localhost:Sample:Basic** from the **Exported Connection** list, and then select the database connection you just created from the **Available Database Connections** list.
 4. Click the **Map It!** button.
 5. Click **OK**.
 6. Type **API Samples** for the report group name and click **OK**.
The API Samples report group is saved to the repository.

Uninstalling Hyperion Analyzer

Uninstalling Hyperion Analyzer from Windows

- ▶ To remove a Microsoft Windows installation of Hyperion Analyzer:
 1. If you installed IBM DB2, uninstall it by performing the following:
 - Click **Start > Settings > Control Panel > Administrative Tools > Services**.
 - Stop all DB2 services and return to the Control Panel.
 - In the Control Panel, choose **Add/Remove Programs**. If you installed IBM DB2 Personal Edition, for the purposes of the release, uninstall IBM DB2.
 2. To uninstall Hyperion Analyzer, in the Add/Remove Programs window, select **Hyperion Analyzer** and uninstall.
 3. After the uninstall completes, you can remove the `\Analyzer\` directory.
Hyperion Analyzer has been removed from your system.

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
