

## About this book

IBM<sup>®</sup> DB2 Universal Database<sup>™</sup> Data Warehouse Edition (DWE) is a suite of products that combines the strength of DB2 Universal Database (DB2 UDB) with the powerful business intelligence infrastructure from IBM. DWE provides a comprehensive business intelligence platform with the tools your enterprise and partners need to deploy and build next generation analytic solutions. By using DWE, you can build a complete data warehousing solution that includes a highly scalable relational database, data access capabilities, business intelligence analytics, and front-end analysis tools.

Use this book to help you plan for the installation of the product components in any of the three editions:

- DB2 Data Warehouse Base Edition
- DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition
- DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition

These editions are hereafter referred to as DWE. For a list of product components that are included with each edition, see Chapter 2, "DWE product components," on page 5.

Before you install DWE, read this book. Then, read the prerequisite installation requirements for each product component that you want to install. Each product component in the DWE suite includes its own documentation.

**Note:** All document CDs are contained in the set of CDs labeled *Documentation*.

#### Who should read this book

This book is for system administrators who install and configure DB2 Data Warehouse Edition. You should be familiar with each product component that you want to install. You should also understand databases, client and server architectures, connectivity, and networking.

This section is a quick start to installing DB2 Data Warehouse Editions (DWE). It contains:

- An overview of the hardware and software requirements that you need to install DWE.
- Brief directions on installing DWE.

For detailed hardware and software requirements, see Chapter 3, "Specific hardware and software requirements," on page 11. For thorough instructions on installing DWE, see Chapter 5, "Installing DB2 Data Warehouse Editions," on page 15.

# Overview of hardware and software requirements

This section describes the minimum hardware and software requirements that you need to install DWE.

DWE is supported on the following operating systems:

- · Server Platforms
  - AIX<sup>®</sup> 5 (32-bit and 64-bit)
  - Red Hat Enterprise Linux<sup>™</sup> (v.3 Standard for x86) (32-bit) complete product line, including Red Hat Enterprise Linux AS, Red Hat Enterprise Linux ES, and Red Hat Enterprise Linux WS
  - SUSE LINUX Enterprise Server 8 (SLES 8)
  - Solaris versions 8 and 9 (32-bit)
  - Windows 2000 Server, Advanced Server and Datacenter Server (32-bit)
  - Windows Server 2003 Standard Edition, Enterprise Edition and Datacenter Edition (32-bit)
- · Client Platforms
  - Windows XP Professional Edition (32-bit)
  - Windows 2000 Professional Edition (32-bit)

#### Notes:

- 1. The operating system requirements for DB2 Warehouse Manager apply to the warehouse agent. DB2 Warehouse Manager only executes in 32-bit emulation mode in a 64-bit environment.
- 2. For SUSE Linux Enterprise Server operating systems on x86 and IA64 processors, DB2 Intelligent Miner V8.2 only supports SLES 9, not SLES 8. For more information, see the system requirements page at www.ibm.com/software/data/iminer/sysreqs.html.
- 3. DB2 Alphablox supports Red Hat Enterprise Linux v3, but not SLES 8. Additionally, DB2 Alphablox supports Windows 2000 32-bit and Windows 2003 32-bit, but not Windows XP.

## Starting the installation

To install DWE:

- 1. Close all programs that are running.
- 2. Insert the DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD into your CD drive.

Linux only: Before you insert the *DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition - Integrated Install* CD into your CD drive, you must make a temporary directory and enable your operating system to unmount the CD drive. To start the installation process on Linux, follow these steps:

- a. Open a terminal window.
- b. To make a temporary directory, issue the following command: mkdir /dwe
- c. Insert the DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD into your CD drive.
- d. Issue the following commands in this order:

umount /mnt/cdrom

mount -t iso9660 /dev/cdrom /dwe

/dwe/setup.sh

e. When the DWE installer prompts you to insert the next CD to continue the installation process, unmount the CD drive by issuing the following command:

umount /dwe

If you cannot mount the CD drive, wait until one of the DWE windows closes and issue this command again.

f. Insert the next CD, and click **OK**.

- g. Continue following the installation instructions.
- 3. Go to the drive that contains the CD to locate the installation setup file for your operating system.
  - Windows only: Double-click **setup.bat** to open the Launchpad window.
  - UNIX only: Open the DWE Launchpad by typing the following at a command prompt:

/cd-location/setup.sh

where *cd-location* is the name of the directory where you mounted the CD.

You must issue the setup.sh command from outside of the CD directory so that you can change CDs during the installation process. If you do not issue the setup.sh command from outside of the CD directory, the DWE program cannot unmount the CD drive.

The Launchpad window opens.

#### 4. Click Install.

• Windows only: If the Windows Autorun feature is enabled on your system, the Autorun Disablement window opens. In order for the DWE installation program to work, you must turn off this feature. Select the Check this box to turn off Autorun check box. Click Next, and then click Finish. Your system will shut down and restart. Repeat steps 3 and 4. You can re-enable the Autorun feature at the end of DWE installation.

The Software License Agreement window opens.

- 5. Accept the Software License Agreement, and click Next.
- 6. Complete the remaining windows by indicating the product components that you want to install, the location of the install media, and the location where you want the product components installed.
- 7. Optional: DB2 Alphablox is not part of the integrated installation program. If you want to install DB2 Alphablox, you must install it after installing the rest of DWE.

IBM recommends DB2 Alphablox over DB2 Office Connect, but if you prefer to install DB2 Office Connect instead, please note that it is not part of the integrated installation program and must be installed after the rest of DWE.

The following sections provide a general overview of the products that are included in the Enterprise and Standard editions of DWE.

## **IBM DB2 Universal Database**

DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition is included with the DWE Base Edition and the DWE Enterprise Edition, while the DB2 UDB Workgroup Server Unlimited Edition is included with DWE Standard Edition.

## **DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition**

DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition, Version 8.2 (DB2 UDB ESE) with the Database Partitioning Feature is a highly scalable, multi-user relational database management system that can manage data warehousing, online analytical processing (OLAP), online transaction processing (OLTP), and data mining. You can also create and manage partitioned database environments. Partitioned database systems can manage high volumes of data with near-linear scalability while providing benefits such as increased performance and high availability. Other features of DB2 UDB ESE include:

- DB2 Connect<sup>™</sup> functionality for accessing data stored on midrange and mainframe database systems such as DB2 UDB for iSeries<sup>™</sup> or DB2 UDB for z/OS<sup>®</sup>. DB2 UDB ESE provides support for both local and remote DB2 UDB clients.
- Satellite administration capabilities enabling DB2 UDB ESE to remotely administer DB2 UDB database servers that are configured as satellites.

## **DB2 UDB Workgroup Server Unlimited Edition**

DB2 UDB Workgroup Server Unlimited Edition, Version 8.2 (DB2 UDB WSUE) is a full function Web-enabled client and server relational database management system. You can deploy DB2 UDB WSUE over wide area networks (WAN) or local area networks (LAN). It includes data warehousing capabilities, and it can be administered remotely from a satellite control database.

DB2 UDB WSUE provides an entry-level server that is intended primarily for small business and departmental computing. It is functionally equivalent to DB2 UDB ESE with the exception that there is no integrated zSeries<sup>®</sup> server connectivity (through the DB2 Connect component) and limited extensibility (for example, DB2 UDB WSUE does not support 64-bit computing or DB2 Data Links File Manager). Also, DB2 UDB WSUE does not have a Database Partitioning Feature.

# **DB2 Warehouse Manager (ETL component)**

DB2 Warehouse Manager (the ETL component) contains components that enhance the warehousing extract, transform, and load (ETL) capabilities that are provided by the DB2 Data Warehouse Center, which is contained within DB2.

The DB2 Warehouse Manager, which is included with DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition, includes the following Data Warehouse ETL tools:

- · Warehouse transformers
- Warehouse ETL agents

#### Warehouse transformers

Warehouse transformers are stored procedures and user-defined functions that you can use to transform data in a warehouse step. In the DB2 Data Warehouse Center, you use steps to create and maintain a warehouse. Steps control how data is transformed into meaningful business information. You can use warehouse transformers in a step to clean, invert, and pivot data, generate primary keys and period tables, and calculate various statistics.

# Warehouse ETL agents

Warehouse ETL agents manage the flow of data between the data sources and the target warehouses by transferring data from the source database to the target warehouse. Agents (for AIX, iSeries, Linux, Solaris, and Windows) use open

database connectivity (ODBC) drivers or DB2 CLI (call-level interface) to communicate with different databases. Optimized connectivity to heterogeneous relational database sources is provided through DB2 Information Integrator relational wrappers. Remote agents provide a flexible way to distribute ETL processing optimally among servers for the data source or target warehouse, or even a standalone ETL hub.

## **DB2 Information Integrator**

DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition includes a limited-use license of DB2 Information Integrator Standard Edition which enables DB2 Information Integrator relational wrappers to be used to access heterogeneous RDBMS sources with the DB2 Warehouse Manager ETL tool. These ETL sources include Oracle, Microsoft SQL Server, Teradata, and Sybase.

## Relational wrappers

DB2 Information Integrator Standard Edition contains relational wrappers. Wrappers are mechanisms by which the federated server interacts with data sources. The federated server uses routines stored in a library called a wrapper module to implement a wrapper. These routines allow the federated server to perform operations such as connecting to a data source and retrieving data from it iteratively. The relational wrappers are a component of DB2 Information Integrator that is used with DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition.

In DB2 Information Integrator, Version 8.2, relational wrappers are required for enhanced access to data that is stored in Microsoft SQL Server, Oracle, Sybase, and Teradata data sources. Access to data that is stored in IBM databases (DB2 UDB and Informix<sup>®</sup>) is built into DB2 UDB for Linux, UNIX, and Windows.

#### **DB2 Cube Views**

DB2 Data Warehouse Edition includes features that are designed specifically to improve the usability and performance of business partner business intelligence products. Data warehouse administrators can build optimal structures in DB2 UDB based on the recommendations of the DB2 Cube Views Optimization Advisor, which improves the performance of OLAP queries that are generated by partner tools. By using these business analysis tools with DB2 UDB-managed tools, you receive more consistent query results. Designers can easily import cube views metadata and mappings from DB2 UDB rather than define the same metadata separately in other partner tools that might be used in the same enterprise.

DB2 Cube Views, Version 8.2 benefits business intelligence users throughout an enterprise by decreasing the development time that is required to define shared OLAP models across multiple tools. With new metadata objects and tooling, you can define cube structures after the metadata is imported to the DB2 UDB catalog. This metadata can be used in other business intelligence tools. Because the shared common metadata includes aggregation formulas and calculations, you can benefit from greater consistency of analytical results across your enterprise.

## **DB2 Query Patroller**

DB2 Query Patroller leverages the predictive query costing of the DB2 optimizer to help manage the warehouse workload. DB2 Query Patroller matches projected resource costs to predefined user profiles, system thresholds and queue criteria, and dynamically routes queries accordingly. You can use DB2 Query Patroller to dynamically control the flow of queries to your DB2 UDB database. You can:

- Define separate query classes for queries of different sizes to better share system resources among queries and to prevent smaller queries from being stalled behind larger ones
- Give high priority to queries that are submitted by certain users so that these queries run sooner
- Automatically hold large queries so that they can be canceled or scheduled to run during off-peak hours
- Track and cancel errant queries

With DB2 Query Patroller, you can regulate the query workload of your database so that small queries and high-priority queries can run promptly, and you can ensure that your system resources are used efficiently. In addition, you can collect and analyze information about completed queries to determine trends across queries, heavy users, and frequently used tables and indexes.

## **DB2 Intelligent Miner**

DB2 Intelligent Miner<sup>™</sup>, Version 8.2 is a set of the following products:

- · Intelligent Miner Modeling
- Intelligent Miner Scoring
- Intelligent Miner Visualization

These products provide rapid enablement of Intelligent Miner analytics that are embedded in Business Intelligence (BI), eCommerce, or traditional Online Transaction Processing (OLTP) application programs.

# **DB2 Intelligent Miner Modeling**

Intelligent Miner Modeling provides Intelligent Miner Modeling technology as DB2 extenders. It enables SQL application programs (SQL API) to call Associations discovery, Clustering, Classification, and Transform Regression operations to develop analytic models based on data accessed by DB2 Universal Database Version 8.2 or Version 8 SQL. Using the SQL API, you can build Associations, Distribution-based Clustering, Tree Classification, and Transform Regression PMML models that are stored in DB2 tables. They can be visualized by Intelligent Miner Visualization or scored byIntelligent Miner Scoring.

## **DB2 Intelligent Miner Scoring**

Intelligent Miner Scoring provides scoring technology as DB2 extenders. It enables application programs to apply Predictive Model Markup Language (PMML) models to large databases, subsets of databases, or single rows or cases. Application programs use the SQL API, which consists of user-defined functions (UDFs) and user-defined methods (UDMs), to perform the scoring operation. The PMML models might have been created by one of the Intelligent Miner products or by other applications and tools that support PMML models.

**Note:** Mining models that are applied by the SQL API of Intelligent Miner Scoring must be contained in database tables.

Intelligent Miner Scoring includes Intelligent Miner Scoring Java Beans, which enables you to score a single data record in a Java<sup>™</sup> application given a PMML model. This can be used to integrate scoring in e-business applications, for example, for real-time scoring in customer relationship management (CRM) systems.

## **DB2 Intelligent Miner Visualization**

Intelligent Miner Visualization provides the following Java visualizers to present data modeling results for analysis:

- · Associations Visualizer
- · Classification Visualizer
- Clustering Visualizer
- · Regression Visualizer

You can use the Intelligent Miner Visualizers to visualize PMML-conforming mining models. Applications can call these visualizers to present model results, or you can deploy the visualizers as applets in a Web browser for ready dissemination. The models might have been developed by using Intelligent Miner Modeling or other applications and tools that support interoperability through the use of PMML models.

In Intelligent Miner Scoring, you can directly visualize the mining model from the database by using Intelligent Miner Visualization in stand-alone mode or as a Web applet.

The focus of the PMML standard is interoperability for scoring. You can achieve the best results with Intelligent Miner Visualization if the PMML models contain Intelligent Miner Visualization extensions such as distribution statistics or quality information as produced by Intelligent Miner Modeling.

# **DB2 Alphablox**

DB2 Alphablox provides the ability to rapidly create custom, web-based applications that fit into the corporate infrastructure and have the ability to reach a wide range of users, both inside and outside the corporate firewall. Applications built with DB2 Alphablox run in standard web browsers, allowing real-time, highly customizable multidimensional analysis in a web browser. DB2 Alphablox integrates into a wide variety of enterprise infrastructure components, including application servers such as IBM WebSphere Application Server.

With DB2 Alphablox, you can:

- Access and interact with data from DB2 Universal Database, DB2 Cube Views, and DB2 Information Integrator.
- Create structured reports sourced from relational databases.
- Choose from a wide variety of charts to display data.
- Allow users to interactively display the exact view of their relational data that they want, using functions such as filters and drill-down.
- · Give end users access an intuitive user interface making analysis of the data easy and powerful.
- Enable a single application to access multiple data sources.

DB2 Alphablox provides a wide variety of application programmer interfaces (APIs) so developers can create custom applications. The DB2 Alphablox APIs are written in the Java programming language, and application developers can access them using Java that is executed on the server or via JavaScript that is interpreted in the browser.

Note: The version of DB2 Alphablox that comes with DWE is restricted to be used only with Alphablox relational cubing as a multidimensional data source. Relational cubing does not allow applications to write back to the database.

DB2 Alphablox contains some functional overlap with DB2 Office Connect. You can install either or both components, but IBM recommends DB2 Alphablox as the preferred reporting and analytical front-end to DWE.

### **DB2 Office Connect**

DB2 Office Connect provides a managed reporting environment with global control of security, administration and database connectivity. DB2 Office Connect functions as a simple Excel-based report authoring and distribution tool, allowing users to develop database queries and formatted spreadsheets which can be shared with others through a common repository.

DB2 Office Connect also enables you to:

- · Create on demand reports that change as the data in the data warehouse changes
- Perform customized queries of the warehouse
- Share data analysis across your enterprise by enabling Excel users to write-back analysis results to the data warehouse

DB2 Office Connect is available in two editions:

- DB2 Office Connect Enterprise Web Edition, which is included with DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition
- DB2 Office Connect Professional Web Edition, which is included with DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition

Both editions of DB2 Office Connect contain the same functions. However, they are licensed differently.

# Chapter 3. Specific hardware and software requirements

This section describes the specific system requirements for DB2 Data Warehouse Edition.

If your system meets the installation requirements for DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition, Version 8.2, then your system likely meets the system requirements for installing all of the product components in the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition. Similarly, if your system meets the installation requirements for DB2 UDB Workgroup Server Unlimited Edition, Version 8.2, then your system likely meets the system requirements for installing all of the product components in the DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition.

For information about the software and hardware requirements for the product components in DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition and DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition, see the documentation for each product component.

Table 2 contains the system requirements for DB2 Data Warehouse Edition.

# Chapter 4. Business intelligence data flow scenario

The DB2 Data Warehouse Edition is a suite of tools that can help you gain insights from the data that you collect and analyze from your enterprise. DB2 UDB provides the foundation for your enterprise data. With DB2 Warehouse Manager, you can collect and transform your data so that it can be manipulated and analyzed by other business intelligence tools, such as IBM DB2 Intelligent Miner and DB2 Cube Views.

## Data flow scenario for DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition

The scenario in Table 3 describes a hypothetical flow of data through the product components of the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition. In this scenario, you start with source data in a DB2 or non-DB2 database. The goal is to organize and analyze the data from your enterprise so that you can make effective business decisions.



You can use DB2 Query Patroller throughout this data flow to manage relational queries. For example, for the data warehouse queries (ETL and OLAP), you can automatically adjust query priority according to user, application, or resource and improve performance through information that DB2 Query Patroller collects. With DB2 Query Patroller, you can also cache query results for reuse and analyze collected statistics to determine trends in query runs.

# Chapter 5. Installing DB2 Data Warehouse Editions

This section describes how to install DWE. Before you install the product components in DWE, read the hardware and software requirements and the documentation for each product component.

#### Notes:

- 1. Although you can install each product component separately, it is recommended that you use the DWE integrated installation program.
- 2. DB2 Data Warehouse Base Edition is not part of the integrated installation program. You must install the components of the Base Edition separately.

# **Upgrading DB2 Data Warehouse Editions**

If you installed versions of any of the DWE product components prior to DWE Version 8.2, you cannot use the installation CD for DWE Version 8.2 or DWE Version 8.2.1 to upgrade the product components. You must install each product component separately. To install each product component, go to the Web site for each of the installed product components and download the latest fix pack for each product component. Each product component must be at the same fix pack level.

If you have DB2 Universal Database, Version 6 or Version 7 installed on a Windows operating system, you must upgrade to DB2 UDB, Version 8.2 by using the installer for that product. Then, you can use the DWE installation program to install the remaining DWE product components. On UNIX and Linux operating systems, you can have multiple versions of the same software installed. Therefore, no action is necessary.

Depending on which level if DWE you are upgrading from, you might have to manually copy an ITLM signature file to your system.

# **Upgrading from DWE 8.2**

If you are upgrading DWE Version 8.2 to DWE Version 8.2.1, you do not have to copy any ITLM files. You can skip to "Before you install DWE" on page 16.

## **Upgrading from releases prior to DWE 8.2**

If you are upgrading to Version 8.2.1 from a release that is earlier than Version 8.2, you must copy the appropriate ITLM signature file to your system. To copy an ITLM signature file:

- 1. Create a directory called dwe at the same level as your DB2 install location.
  - For AIX: If your DB2 install location is /usr/opt/db2\_08\_01, your DWE directory would be /usr/opt/dwe.
  - For Linux and Solaris: If your DB2 install location is /opt/IBM/db2/V8.1, your DWE directory would be /opt/IBM/dwe.
  - For Windows: If your DB2 install location is c:\Program Files\SQLLIB, your DWE directory would be c:\Program Files\dwe.
- 2. Copy the appropriate license signature file to the DWE directory. The signature files are located on the DWE installation CD in the install/itlm directory. The file you must copy is based on which edition of DWE you have installed as well as which operating system you use.

The naming convention is db2*EditionPlatformVersion*.sys and uses the following values:

### **Edition**

- If you have Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition, substitute db2dwee.
- If you have Data Warehouse Standard Edition, substitute db2dwse.

DB2 Data Warehouse Base Edition is not part of the integrated installation program.

#### **Platform**

- For an AIX operating system, substitute x.
- For a Linux operating system, substitute *l*.
- For a Solaris operating system, substitute *s*.
- For a Windows operating system, substitute *w*.

#### Version

The version is 080201.

For example, if you installed Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition for AIX, you would copy the db2dweex080201.sys file.

## Before you install DWE

When you install DWE, you must make key decisions about how some of the product components are installed and configured. Before starting the DWE installation, consider the following options:

- If you purchased the DB2 Data Warehouse Base Edition, you cannot use the integrated installation program. The components of the Base Edition must be installed separately.
- If you already installed DB2 UDB on your system, the DWE install program stops all DB2 processes in order to install the other product components. Verify that no one is using the databases on your server before starting the DWE installation.
- For DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition customers, DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition includes a partitioning feature. If you want to run DB2 on multiple partitions, install DB2 on all participating servers. See the *Quick Beginnings for DB2 Servers* book for details on installing partitions. After completing the installation, you can use the DWE install program to install the remaining product components on your instance-owning server. After the installation is complete, verify that all partition servers are at the same fix pack level.
- The DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition includes a limited-use license of DB2 Information Integrator Standard Edition that enables DB2 Information Integrator relational wrappers. Therefore, if you have a license for DB2 Information Integrator with relational wrappers that is different from the edition that is provided with the DWE license, you should use that license rather than the DWE license.
- You can run the DB2 Warehouse Manager Standard Edition on a 64-bit operating system under a 32-bit DB2 instance. In addition, you can use the DB2 Warehouse Manager to move data on a 64-bit DB2 instance, but only if you run all of the warehouse components, such as the warehouse server, warehouse control database, and warehouse agent, on a 32-bit DB2 instance. To run the DB2 Warehouse Manager on the same workstation as a 64-bit warehouse source and a 64-bit warehouse target, take the following steps:
  - 1. Define a 32-bit DB2 instance by entering the following command at a DB2 command line:

db2icrt

ı

For more information, see "Creating an instance using db2icrt" the *DB2 Installation and Configuration Supplement*. You can also find this topic in the DB2 Information Center.

- 2. Install the Warehouse Manager components that you want to use. For more information, refer to the DB2 Warehouse Manager Installation Guide, or the DB2 Information Center.
- 3. Verify that the IWH.environment file points to the 32-bit DB2 instance that you defined. Make sure that the warehouse server, warehouse agent, and warehouse control database reside on this 32-bit DB2 instance.
- 4. In the 32-bit instance that contains the warehouse components, catalog the 64-bit warehouse source database and the 64-bit warehouse target database by entering the following command from a DB2 command line: CATALOG TCPIP NODE node-name SERVER service-name REMOTE\_INSTANCE nstance-name CATALOG DB 64bitDB AT NODE node-name
- If you want to host the DB2 Information Center from a remote system and access DB2 documentation from this remote system, then you must change the values for the DB2\_DOCHOST and DB2\_DOCPORT variables. You can find instructions for changing these variables in the topic "Setting the location for accessing the DB2 Information Center" at the following URL:
  - http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/db2help/index.jsp?topic= /com.ibm.db2.udb.common.doc/common/settingdocloc.htm
- For DB2 Cube Views, if you want to view cube data in an Excel spreadsheet, IBM recommends that you install IBM DB2 Alphablox. Alternatively, you can install IBM DB2 Office Connect Analytics Edition, which is available from the DB2 Cube Views Web site. Neither DB2 Alphablox nor Office Connect Analytics Edition is part of the integrated installation program, so you must install and configure them separately.
- After installing all of the product components, you must download and install all available PTFs (program temporary fixes).

Refer to the readme.txt file on the DWE installation CD for more information.

**Note:** The DWE installer installs all of the product components except for DB2 Alphablox and DB2 Office Connect, which you can install separately after installing DWE. DWE includes installation CDs for DB2 Alphablox and DB2 Office Connect.

## Order of installation




Figure 2. Order of installation for the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition

The DWE suite of products differs depending on the version of DWE that you install. During the DWE installation setup, you are prompted for the install media for each product component except for DB2 Alphablox and Office Connect, one of which you can install separately after you complete the main DWE installation. Figure 2 on page 18 shows the products available in the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition. This figure also shows the order in which the product components are installed.

# Shortcut keys in DWE installation

In the DWE installation program, you can use the keyboard instead of the mouse for all actions. The shortcut keys and their actions are provided in the following table:

Table 4. Shortcut keys in the DWE installation program

Action	Key
Move to the next field on a window	Tab
Return to the previous field on a window	Shift+Tab
Exit	Alt+F4
Move to the next configuration step	Alt+N

On Windows, to display the mnemonics for the Install panel buttons, press the Alt key.

## Starting the installation on Windows

To install DWE on Windows, follow these steps:

- 1. Close any programs that are running.
- 2. Insert the DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD into your CD drive.
- **3**. In the drive that contains the CD, double-click **setup.bat** to open the Launchpad window.

The Launchpad window opens.

4. Click Install.

If the Windows Autorun feature is enabled on your system, the Autorun Disablement window opens. In order for the DWE installation program to work, you must turn off this feature. Select the **Check this box to turn off Autorun** check box. Click **Next**, and then click **Finish**. Your system will shut down and restart. Repeat steps 2 and 3. You can re-enable the Autorun feature at the end of the DWE installation.

The Software License Agreement window opens.

5. After you read the product license, select I accept the terms in the license agreement, and click Next.

The Product installation and install type window opens.

- 6. Select whether you want to install the **Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition** or the **Data Warehouse Standard Edition**.
- 7. Select whether you want to install DWE on a **client** or on a **server**.

Note: The remaining steps assume that you are installing the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition. The installation windows in the DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition might differ. You can install the server or the client on both the Data Warehouse Enterprise and Standard Editions. Also, the installation windows might differ depending on your operating system.

- 8. Click Next. The Product components available for installation window opens.
- 9. By default, all of the product components are selected. If you do not want to install a product component, clear the corresponding check box.
- 10. Click Next. The Install media location window opens.
- 11. Perform one of the following steps:
  - If you want to install all of the installation media for the product components in one location, select **Set a single media location for all products** and specify the location.
  - If you want to specify a different location for each product component's installation media, select **Set media locations individually**, and enter the installation media location for each product component.

**Note:** This step only defines the media drive location. You can specify the install directory locations on the next window.

- 12. Click Next. The Product component installation location window opens.
- 13. Specify the location where you want to install the product components, and click **Next**.
  - If you are installing DB2 UDB, the DB2 Instance Owner Information window opens. Continue with step 14 on page 20.
  - If you are installing DWE on Windows and you are not installing DB2 UDB, the Summary window opens. Continue with step 18 on page 20.

- 14. If you are installing DB2 UDB, you must enter a user name and password in the DB2 Instance Owner Information window. For more information about specifying user names and passwords, see the *Quick Beginnings for DB2 Servers Guide*.
- 15. Click Next. The Port number window opens.
- **16**. In the **Instance Port Number** field, type the port number for the DB2 Information Center.

If you want to host the DB2 Information Center from a remote system and access DB2 documentation from this remote system, then you must change the values for the DB2\_DOCHOST and DB2\_DOCPORT variables. You can find instructions for changing these variables by searching for the topic "Setting the location for accessing the DB2 Information Center" at the following link: http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/db2help/index.jsp.

- 17. Click **Next**. The Summary window opens.
- 18. Review the Summary window. This window lists the DWE product components that you are about to install as well as their installation locations. To continue, click **Next**.

The DWE installer prompts you to insert product CDs as necessary. After the final product is installed, a window opens that states that the DWE installation is complete.

## Starting the installation on UNIX and Linux

To install DWE on UNIX or Linux operating systems, follow these steps:

- 1. Close any programs that are running.
- 2. Insert the DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD into your CD drive.

Linux only: Before you insert the *DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition - Integrated Install* CD into your CD drive, you must make a temporary directory and enable your operating system to unmount the CD drive. To start the installation process on Linux, follow these steps:

- a. Open a terminal window.
- b. To make a temporary directory, issue the following command: mkdir /dwe
- c. Insert the *DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD* into your CD drive.
- d. Issue the following commands in this order:

```
umount /mnt/cdrom
mount -t iso9660 /dev/cdrom /dwe
/dwe/setup.sh
```

e. When the DWE installer prompts you to insert the next CD to continue the installation process, unmount the CD drive by issuing the following command:

umount /dwe

If you cannot mount the CD drive, wait until one of the DWE windows closes and issue this command again.

- f. Insert the next CD, and click **OK**.
- g. Continue following the installation instructions.
- 3. Go to the drive that contains the installation CD and locate the installation setup file for your operating system.

Open the DWE Launchpad by issuing the following command at a command prompt:

/cd-location/setup.sh

where *cd-location* is the name of the directory where you mounted the CD.

You must issue the setup.sh command from outside of the CD directory so that you can change CDs during the installation process. If you do not issue the setup.sh command from outside of the CD directory, the DWE program cannot unmount the CD drive.

The DWE Launchpad window opens.

4. Click Install.

The Software License Agreement window opens.

- 5. After you read the product license, select I accept the terms in the license agreement.
- 6. Click Next. The Product installation and install type window opens.
- 7. Select whether you want to install the **Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition** or the **Data Warehouse Standard Edition**.
- 8. Select whether you want to install DWE on a client or on a server.

Note: The remaining steps assume that you are installing the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition. The installation windows in the DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition might differ. You can install the server or the client on both the Data Warehouse Enterprise and Standard Editions. Also, the installation windows might differ depending on your operating system.

- 9. Click Next. The Product components available for install window opens.
- 10. By default, all of the product components are selected. If you do not want to install a product component, clear the corresponding check box.
- 11. Click Next. The Install media location window opens.
- 12. Perform one of the following steps:
  - If you want to install all of the installation media for the product components in one location, select **Set a single media location for all products** and specify the location.
  - If you want to specify a different location for each product component's installation media, select **Set media locations individually**, and enter the installation media location for each product component.

**Note:** This step only defines the media drive location. You can specify the install directory locations on the next window.

13. Specify the location where you want the product components installed, and click **Next**.

If you are installing DB2 UDB, the DB2 Instance Owner Information window opens. Continue with step 14.

- If you are installing DWE on UNIX or Linux and you are not installing DB2 UDB, the Summary window opens. Continue with step 22 on page 22.
- 14. In the DB2 Instance Owner Information window, enter a user name and password. For more information about specifying user names and passwords, see the *Quick Beginnings for DB2 Servers Guide*.
- 15. In the **Instance Name** field, type the group name to which the instance owner belongs.
- 16. AIX only: Select whether you want to create a 32-bit or a 64-bit instance.

- **18**. On the Administrative User Information window, complete the following fields:
  - a. In the Administrative User field, type the name of the administrative user.
  - b. In the **Password** and **Confirm Password** fields, type the administrative user's password.
  - c. In the **Administrative Group Name** field, type the group name to which the administrative user belongs.
  - d. Click Next. The Fenced User Information window opens.
- 19. On the Fenced User Information window, complete the following fields:
  - a. In the Fenced User field, type the name of the fenced user.
  - b. In the **Password** and **Confirm Password** fields, type the fenced user's password.
  - c. In the **Fenced Group Name** field, type the group name to which the fenced user belongs.
  - d. Click Next. The Port number window opens.
- 20. In the **Instance Port Number** field, type the port number for the DB2 Information Center.

If you want to host the DB2 Information Center from a remote system and access DB2 documentation from this remote system, then you must change the values for the DB2\_DOCHOST and DB2\_DOCPORT variables. You can find instructions for changing these variables by searching for the topic "Setting the location for accessing the DB2 Information Center" at the following link: http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/db2help/index.jsp.

- 21. Click Next. The Summary window opens.
- 22. Review the Summary window. This window lists the DWE product components that you are about to install as well as their installation locations. To continue, click **Next**. The DWE installer prompts you to insert product CDs as necessary. After the final product is installed, a window opens that states that the DWE installation is complete.
  - Linux only: The DWE installer prompts you to insert product CDs as necessary. After the final product is installed, a window opens that states that the DWE installation is complete.
  - AIX and Solaris only: The Installer extraction location window opens. Some of the installation CDs contain a compressed file that must be extracted. Select the location where you want the installation disk images extracted. The directory that you specify must have at least 2GB of free space. Click Next. The DWE installer prompts you to insert product CDs as

necessary. After the final product is installed, a window opens that states that the DWE installation is complete.

## **Installing DB2 Alphablox or DB2 Office Connect**

After installing the other DWE product components, you can install DB2 Alphablox or DB2 Office Connect.

To install DB2 Alphablox:

- 1. Insert the DB2 Alphablox CD into your CD drive.
- 2. Look in the install\_guide directory on the CD for the *DB2 Alphablox Installation Guide* in your language, and follow the installation directions in that book.

To install DB2 Office Connect: 

- 1. Insert the DB2 Office Connect CD into your CD drive.
- 2. Open a Web browser.
- 3. Open the InstallNotes\\locale\\WebEditionInstall.html document on the CD where locale is the language locale of the computer. For example, English is en, Spanish is es, French is fr, and so on.
- 4. Follow the installation instructions in the document.

# Chapter 6. Uninstalling DB2 Data Warehouse Editions

This section describes how to uninstall the DWE Standard Edition and the DWE Enterprise Edition from your system. If you installed DB2 Data Warehouse Base Edition, you must uninstall the components manually according to instructions supplied with each component..

Attention: The DWE uninstall program is not selective. The uninstall program removes all DWE product components, except for DB2 Alphablox or DB2 Office Connect. If you installed a DWE product component before installing DWE, that product component is removed as well. For example, if you installed DB2 before installing DWE, the DWE uninstall will remove DB2 and all of its components.

#### To uninstall DWE:

- 1. Insert the DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition Integrated Install CD into your CD drive.
- 2. Go to the drive that contains the CD to locate the installation setup file for your operating system.
  - Windows only: Double-click **setup.bat** to open the Launchpad window.
  - UNIX and Linux only: Open the DWE Launchpad by typing the following at a command prompt:

/cd-location/setup.sh

where *cd-location* is the name of the directory where you mounted the CD. The Launchpad window opens.

- 3. Click **Uninstall**. A window opens that displays a list of product components that will be uninstalled.
- 4. Click **Next**. The uninstall procedure begins. After the final product component is removed, a window opens stating that the DWE uninstall is complete.

# Appendix A. Error messages

This appendix contains error messages that can occur during DWE installation and removal, and the location of log files.

- DWE0002E: Please fill in a value for *fieldname*.

  A required field on the window does not contain any data. You must enter information for that field.
- DWE0003E: The password fields do not match.
   The passwords you typed in the Password and Confirm Password fields do not match. Retype the passwords in both fields and click Next.
- DWE0004E: The string specified for *fieldname* is too long. It may be no longer than *number* characters.
  - Retype the information for the specified field name within the character limitation.
- DWE0005E: User names, passwords, and group names may be alphanumeric and also contain only the following special characters: @, #, \$, and \_. You tried to use an illegal character in a user name, password or group name field. Retype the information in the field using only alphanumeric characters and the special characters listed in the message. Then click **Next**.
- DWE0006E: The following are reserved words and may not be used as user names or group names: USERS, ADMINS, GUESTS, PUBLIC, LOCAL, or any SQL reserved word.
  - You tried to use a reserved word in a user name, password or group name field. Retype the information ensuring you do not use any of the listed reserved words. Then click **Next**.
- DWE0007E: User and group names may not start with any of the following: IBM, SQL, or SYS
  - You tried to type a user or group name using *IBM*, *SQL*, or *SYS*. Retype the information without a combination of those characters and click **Next**.
- DWE0008E: The Port number must be a numeric value.

  You tried to use an alphabetic character in the **Instance Port Number** field.

  Retype the information for the field using only numeric characters.
- DWE0009E: One or more of the DB2 components are already installed on your system at a lower level than FixPak 7. In order to use this install program to install the remaining products, FixPak 7 must be manually applied. FixPak 7 can be obtained from the following website: http://www.ibm.com/software/data/db2/udb/support.html
  - Exit the DWE installation and download FixPak 7 from the Web site listed in the message. After you have applied FixPak 7, restart the DWE installation.
- DWE0010W: One or more of the DB2 components are already installed on your system at a higher level than FixPak 7. In order to use this install program to install the remaining products, you must obtain full refresh images of the other products at your current FixPak level. Would you like to continue with the DWE install program?
  - Exit the DWE installation and download the latest fix packs from the product component support sites. Restart the DWE installation. When you get this message again, click **Yes** to continue with DWE installation. On the window

where you specify the location for the install media, make sure that you indicate the directory where you downloaded the product component fix packs.

• DWE0011E: This component is a prerequisite to the rest of the components. At this time, the install program will quit. Check the product install log for errors.

An installation for a product component that is required failed. You cannot continue with DWE installation until you have resolved the problem. Check the product component install log.

• DWE0012E: No components were uninstalled because the processing to stop DB2 was not successful.

Uninstall could not proceed because DB2 services did not stop running.

• DWE0013E: Please select at least one Information Integrator component.

You have indicated that you want to install DB2 Information Integrator Relational Wrappers, but you did not select any components. Select at least one of the following component check boxes:

- II ODBC Support
- II Oracle Support
- II SQL Server Support
- II Sybase Support
- II Teradata Support
- II Custom Support
- DWE0014E: Please select at least one Intelligent Miner component.

You have indicated that you want to install DB2 Intelligent Miner, but you did not select any components. Select at least one of the following component check boxes:

- DB2 Intelligent Miner Scoring V8.2
- DB2 Intelligent Miner Modeling V8.2
- DB2 Intelligent Miner Visualization V8.2
- DWE0015E: No components are selected for install.

You did not select any DWE product components for installation. Select the check box corresponding to the product component that you want to install.

• DWE0016E: One or more of the DB2 components installed on your system are at a lower level than FixPak 7. In order to use this program to uninstall DWE, components should be installed at the FixPak 7 level.

You must perform one of the following actions:

- Ensure that all DWE product components are at the FixPak 7 level and retry.
- Uninstall the product components separately.
- DWE0017W: One or more of the DB2 components installed on your system are
  at a higher level than FixPak 7. In order to use this program to
  uninstall DWE, component should be installed at the FixPak 7 level. Would
  you like to continue with the DWE uninstall program?

If you continue, the uninstall program might fail. You must uninstall the product components separately.

 DWE0018W: You have chosen to create a 64-bit instance. Before you can use any DB2 functionality that depends on java technology in this instance, you must also install a 64-bit JDK or JRE.

After you complete the DWE installation, you must install a 64-bit Java Development Kit or Java Runtime Environment in order for DB2 to work properly.

• DWE0019W: On Linux, a CD cannot be mounted in the drive prior to starting the DWE installation. If a CD is mounted when the DWE installation is

launched, you cannot unmount the CD without first quitting the DWE installation. If the DWE installation is on a CD, the entire contents must be copied to a hard drive location, and the installation program launched from there. Press OK to continue or press Cancel to quit the install program.

If you mounted the *DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition - Integrated Install* CD in the drive before you started the DWE installation, click **Cancel** to quit the install program. Next, copy the contents of the *DB2 UDB Data Warehouse Edition - Integrated Install* CD to a hard drive location and start the DWE installation from there.

The db2wi.log file might also contain additional installation information. You can find this log in your system's temp directory.

You can check the dwe\_uninstall.log file for any problems you might have when uninstalling DWE Enterprise Edition or DWE Standard Edition.

On UNIX and Linux, in the default temp directory (usually /tmp), refer to the db2setup.log file for all DB2 products installation information. The information in this log is appended to the db2setup.his file.

See the DB2 Alphablox documentation for information about log files for DB2 Alphablox.

### **Appendix B. Troubleshooting**

This section describes restrictions and possible problems that you might encounter when you install the products in the DB2 Data Warehouse Enterprise Edition or the DB2 Data Warehouse Standard Edition.

## During installation, the DWE launchpad does not display on a UNIX or Linux system.

On UNIX and Linux systems, you must issue the command to display the launchpad exactly as instructed "Starting the installation." You cannot navigate to the CD location and enter setup.sh. From the root directory, you must issue the following command:

/cd-location/setup.sh

where *cd-location* is the name of the directory where you mounted the CD.

## DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition or DB2 UDB Workgroup Server Unlimited Edition installation for Windows fails with no error message

You might have entered the wrong password on the DB2 Instance Owner window. Restart the DWE installation and ensure that the password you enter in the **Password** and **Confirm Password** fields is the password for the ID that is listed in the **Instance Owner** field.

# Cannot install DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition on the instance-owning Windows server prior to setting up a domain server

For Windows servers, you must set up and configure an Active Directory (system setup for a domain server) before you install DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition. Otherwise, you cannot select the multipartition option.

# Cannot install DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition on additional partitioned servers (not an instance-owning server)

You must install DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition on all participating servers.

### DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition does not start after creating multipartitioned servers on Solaris and Linux

If DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition does not start on Solaris and Linux, you might need to update the .rhosts file to include the server name and instance name for each node regardless of whether all the nodes are on the same server. You must include multiple entries of the same server and instance name in the .rhosts file.

## DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition freezes without any error messages when creating a database

Unlike other operating systems, when you add partitions or nodes on Windows, you must use the db2ncrt command if you already have databases on the system. This command works on Windows only. Do not update the db2nodes.cfg file manually like you would for other operating systems. Updating this file might appear to work, but the database creation will fail.

#### DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition fails when connecting to Oracle tables

DB2 UDB Enterprise Server Edition fails when accessing Oracle tables on Oracle 9i on Linux Red Hat 8, HP, and Solaris. This is an Oracle defect. You must modify the Oracle script and build a new library file. See the documentation for federated servers about how to build a new library.

### The Data Warehouse Center fails after defining a DB2 UDB Enterprise Server **Edition Windows source**

You might see this message: DWC07180E-The warehouse server encountered an unexpected error while receiving a start response from an agent process. RC=7180 RC2=9117. You might need to create a softlink for IWH2AGNT. If there is no softlink, the warehouse server and the agent daemon might not start.
