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1.0 Introduction

This Program Directory is intended for the system programmer responsible for program installation and maintenance. It contains information concerning the material and procedures associated with the installation of IBM Fault Analyzer for z/OS. This publication refers to IBM Fault Analyzer for z/OS as Fault Analyzer.

The Program Directory contains the following sections:

This Program Directory is intended for standalone installs. Do not use this Program Directory if you are installing Fault Analyzer with a SystemPac, ServerPac or CBPDO. When using these offerings, use the jobs and documentation supplied with the offering. This documentation may point you to specific sections of the Program Directory as required.

1.1 Fault Analyzer Description

Fault Analyzer, which is part of the z/OS Problem Determination and Deployment Tools family of products, is targeted at application programmer abend analysis, but has a secondary use by CICS systems programmers for analysing CICS system failures.

Application development

As an application development tool, Fault Analyzer helps customers become more productive by reducing the time it takes to find the cause of problems leading to abnormal termination in application programs. This is done by identifying the point of failure, and providing relevant information related to this - all presented in an easily understood report.

Many different execution environments are supported, such as batch, CICS, IMS, DB2 and WebSphere, and programming languages like COBOL, PL/I, C and assembler. This is all done by the one and the same analysis engine, which is invoked by different exits depending on the type of environment in which the abend occurs. Or, if no abend has occurred, but a snap-shot of the execution environment is desired, then a program can perform a non-disruptive call to Fault Analyzer at any point in time.

The initial abend analysis takes place in real time, prior to the termination of the abending task. This produces an analysis report with the job output on the JES spool, and also creates an entry in a fault history file. The fault entry can later be used for viewing a copy of the real-time report, or for batch or interactive re-analysis. The latter is particularly useful if a compiler listing or side file was not available during real-time analysis, since by providing this during re-analysis, the offending source line of code can still be determined. Interactive reanalysis, using the ISPF interface, provides further advantages over that of batch re-analysis, as the user is able to perform a wide range of functions against the fault, such as viewing storage not otherwise presented in the report and optionally formatting it in accordance with unique data area mapping provided by the user.

A range of options and user exits are available to allow installations to tailor Fault Analyzer to their particular needs. However, emphasis is always placed on the ability to perform the task of diagnosing application problems without the need for users to have in-depth knowledge of these tailoring options.

CICS system dump analysis

As a CICS system dump analysis tool, Fault Analyzer is rapidly becoming the diagnostic tool of choice. This is due to the intuitive and comprehensive interactive analysis capability which eliminates the need for users to know and remember complex commands.

2.0 Program Materials

An IBM program is identified by a program number and a feature number. The program number for Fault Analyzer is 5655-M20 and its feature number is 5802.

Basic Machine-Readable Materials are materials that are supplied under the base license and feature numbers, and are required for the use of the product. Optional Machine-Readable Materials are orderable under separate feature numbers, and are not required for the product to function.

The program announcement material describes the features supported by Fault Analyzer. Ask your IBM representative for this information if you have not already received a copy.

2.1 Basic Machine-Readable Material

The distribution medium for this program is magnetic tape or downloadable files. It is installed using SMP/E, and is in SMP/E RELFILE format. See 6.0, "Installation Instructions" on page 16 for more information about how to install the program.

5.0 Installation Requirements and Considerations

The following sections identify the system requirements for installing and activating Fault Analyzer. The following terminology is used:

- Driving system: the system used to install the program.
- Target system: the system on which the program is installed.

In many cases, the same system can be used as both a driving system and a target system. However, you may want to set up a clone of your system to use as a target system by making a separate IPL-able copy of the running system. The clone should include copies of all system libraries that SMP/E updates, copies of the SMP/E CSI data sets that describe the system libraries, and your PARMLIB and PROCLIB.

Some cases where two systems should be used include the following:

- When installing a new level of a product that is already installed, the new
 product will delete the old one. By installing onto a separate target system, you
 can test the new product while still keeping the old one in production.
- When installing a product that shares libraries or load modules with other
 products, the installation can disrupt the other products. Installing onto a test
 system or clone will allow you to assess these impacts without disrupting your
 production system.

5.1 Driving System Requirements

This section describes the environment of the driving system required to install Fault Analyzer.

The driving system can run in any hardware environment that supports the required software.

5.2 Target System Requirements

This section describes the environment of the target system required to install and use Fault Analyzer.

Fault Analyzer installs in the z/OS (Z038) SREL.

5.2.1 Machine Requirements

The target system can run in any hardware environment that supports the required software.

5.2.2 Programming Requirements

5.2.2.1 Installation Requisites

An installation requisite is defined as a product that is required and must be present or one that is not required but should be present on the system for the successful installation of this product.

A mandatory installation requisite identifies products that are required, without exception, or this product will not install on your system. This includes products specified as PREs or REQs.

A conditional installation requisite identifies products that are **not** required for successful install but may resolve such things as certain warning messages at installation time. They include products that are specified as IF REQs.

Fault Analyzer has no conditional installation requisites.

5.2.2.2 Operational Requisites

An operational requisite is defined as a product that is required and **must** be present or a product that is not required but **should** be present on the system in order for this product to operate all or some of its functions.

A mandatory operational requisite identifies products that are required, without exception, or this product **will not operate** its basic function unless the requisite is met. This includes products specified as PREs or REQs.

Fault Analyzer has no mandatory operational requisites.

A conditional operational requisite identifies products that are **not required** for the basic function but are needed at run time for this product to utilize specific functions. They may include products specified as IF REQs.

5.2.2.3 Toleration/Coexistence Requisites

A toleration/coexistence requisite is defined as a product which must be present on a sharing system. These systems can be other systems in a multisystem environment (not necessarily sysplex), a shared DASD environment (such as test and production), or systems that reuse the same DASD at different time intervals.

Fault Analyzer has no toleration/coexistence requisites.

5.2.2.4 Incompatibility (Negative) Requisites

A negative requisite identifies products which must not be installed on the same system as this product.

Fault Analyzer has no negative requisites.

5.2.3 DASD Storage Requirements

Fault Analyzer libraries can reside on all supported DASD types.

Figure 11 lists the total space required for each type of library.

Notes:

- 1. IBM recommends use of system determined block sizes for efficient DASD utilization for all non-RECFM U data sets. For RECFM U data sets, IBM recommends a block size of 32760, which is the most efficient from a performance and DASD utilization perspective.
- 2. Abbreviations used for the data set type are:
 - U Unique data set, allocated by this product and used only by this product. To determine the correct storage needed for this data set, this table provides all required information; no other tables (or Program Directories) need to be referenced for the data set size.
 - S Shared data set, allocated by this product and used by this product and others. To determine the correct storage needed for this data set, the storage size given in this table needs to be added to other tables (perhaps in other Program Directories). If the data set already exists, it must have enough free space to accommodate the storage size given in this table.
 - Ε Existing shared data set, used by this product and others. This data set is NOT allocated by this product. To determine the correct storage needed for this data set, the storage size given in this table needs to be added to other tables (perhaps in other program directories). This existing data set must have enough free space to accommodate the storage size given in this table.

If you currently have a previous release of this product installed in these libraries, the installation of this release will delete the old one and reclaim the space used by the old release and any service that had been installed. You can determine whether or not these libraries have enough space by deleting

the old release with a dummy function, compressing the libraries, and comparing the space requirements with the free space in the libraries.

For more information on the names and sizes of the required data sets, please refer to 6.1.7, "Allocate SMP/E Target and Distribution Libraries" on page 19.

- 3. All target and distribution libraries listed have the following attributes:
 - The default name of the data set may be changed.
 - The default block size of the data set may be changed.
 - The data set may be merged with another data set that has equivalent characteristics.
 - The data sets SIDIALPA and SIDILPA1 must be PDS but all others may be either a PDS or a PDSE.
- 4. All target libraries listed have the following attributes:
 - The data set may be SMS-managed.
 - It is not required for the data set to be SMS-managed.
 - It is not required for the data set to reside on the IPL volume.
 - The values in the "Member Type" column are not necessarily the actual SMP/E element types identified in the SMPMCS.
- 5. All target libraries listed which contain load modules have the following attributes:
 - The data set SIDIALPA must be in the LPA but none of the others are required to be.
 - The data sets SIDIMOD1 and SIDIAUTH must be in the LNKLST but none of the others are required to be.
 - The data set SIDIAUTH must be APF authorized but none of the others are required to be.
- 6. PTFs for Fault Analyzer are large and can cause space problems. Therefore, we have increased the sizes of the Target and Distribution Libraries above the standard sizing guidelines to reduce additional extent problems.

The following figures describe the target and distribution libraries required to install Fault Analyzer. The storage requirements of Fault Analyzer must be added to the storage required by other programs having data in the same library.

Note: The data in these tables should be used when determining which libraries can be merged into common data sets. In addition, since some ALIAS names may not be unique, ensure that no naming conflicts will be introduced before merging libraries.

5.3 FMIDs Deleted

Installing Fault Analyzer may result in the deletion of other FMIDs. To see what FMIDs will be deleted, examine the ++VER statement in the product's SMPMCS.

If you do not wish to delete these FMIDs at this time, you must install Fault Analyzer into separate SMP/E target and distribution zones.

Note: These FMIDs will not automatically be deleted from the Global Zone. Consult the SMP/E manuals for instructions on how to do this.

5.4 Special Considerations

5.4.1 Recommended CICS maintenance

Recommended CICS maintenance applicable to your version and release of CICS is applied for the following APARS:

PQ38478 CICS/ESA® V4

PQ38479 CICS/TS

Having applied the PTF for the appropriate APAR, using the LE run-time option TERMTHDACT (TRACE, CICSDDS) will permit dump output for a CICS transaction to be directed to the CICS dump data set instead of the CESE transient data queue. This will help to reduce the number of trace table entries that are written following an abend, and therewith the risk of causing the trace table to wrap with subsequent loss of relevant diagnostic information.

5.4.2 PDSE-managed fault history files

Although you can use PDS-managed rather than PDSE-managed fault history files, it is recommended that PDSE data sets be used. This is because of their automatic space management and their superior directory integrity for shared usage. If your environment does not yet use PDSE data sets because System Managed Storage is not yet implemented in your MVS image, you may find it worth while installing the MVS APARs mentioned in information APAR II12221. APAR II12221 lists the MVS APARs required to make PDSE support available without implementing System Managed Storage.

6.0 Installation Instructions

This chapter describes the installation method and the step-by-step procedures to install and to activate the functions of Fault Analyzer.

Please note the following:

- If you want to install Fault Analyzer into its own SMP/E environment, a sample job, IDIALSMP, is provided. This job creates and initializes the SMPCSI and the SMP/E control data sets.
- Sample jobs have been provided to help perform some or all of the installation tasks. The SMP/E jobs assume that all DDDEF entries required for SMP/E execution have been defined in the appropriate zones.
- The SMP/E dialogs may be used instead of the sample jobs to accomplish the SMP/E installation steps.

6.1 Installing Fault Analyzer

6.1.1 SMP/E Considerations for Installing Fault Analyzer

This release of Fault Analyzer is installed using the SMP/E RECEIVE, APPLY, and ACCEPT commands. The SMP/E dialogs may be used to accomplish the SMP/E installation steps.

6.1.2 SMP/E Options Subentry Values

The recommended values for some SMP/E CSI subentries are shown in Figure 14. Use of values lower than these may result in failures in the installation process. DSSPACE is a subentry in the GLOBAL options entry. PEMAX is a subentry of the GENERAL entry in the GLOBAL options entry. Refer to the SMP/E manuals for instructions on updating the global zone.

6.1.3 SMP/E CALLLIBS Processing

Fault Analyzer uses the CALLLIBS function provided in SMP/E to resolve external references during installation. When Fault Analyzer is installed, ensure that DDDEFs exist for the following libraries:

- CEE.SCEELKED
- CEE.SCEESPC
- ISP.SISPLOAD

Sample iob IDIDDDEF contains DDDEFs for these libraries. Please ensure that the names used in the job match those of your system.

Note: The DDDEFs above are used only to resolve the link-edit for Fault Analyzer using CALLLIBS. These data sets are not updated during the installation of Fault Analyzer.

You may also choose to copy the jobs from the tape or product files by submitting the job below. Use either the //TAPEIN or the //FILEIN DD statement, depending on your distribution medium, and comment out or delete the other statement. Add a job card and change the lowercase parameters to uppercase values to meet your site's requirements before submitting.

In the sample above, update the statements as noted below:

If using TAPEIN:

tunit is the unit value matching the product tape.

volser is the volume serial matching the product tape.

If using FILEIN

filevol is the volume serial of the DASD device where the downloaded files reside.

OUT

icl-library-name is the name of the output data set where the sample jobs will be stored.

dasdvol is the volume serial of the DASD device where the output data set will reside.

SYSIN

xxxxIN is either TAPEIN or FILEIN depending on your input DD statement.

6.1.5 Define SMP/E Environment (Optional)

Edit and submit sample job IDIALSMP to define the SMP/E environment for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

6.1.6 Perform SMP/E RECEIVE

If you obtained Fault Analyzer as part of a CBPDO, you can use the RCVPDO job found in the CBPDO RIMLIB data set to RECEIVE the Fault Analyzer FMIDs as well as any service, HOLDDATA, or preventive service planning (PSP) information included on the CBPDO tape. For more information, refer to the documentation included with the CBPDO.

You can also choose to edit and submit sample job IDIRECEV to perform the SMP/E RECEIVE for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

6.1.7 Allocate SMP/E Target and Distribution Libraries

Edit and submit sample job IDIALLOC to allocate the SMP/E target and distribution libraries for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

6.1.8 Create DDDEF Entries

Edit and submit sample job IDIDDDEF to create DDDEF entries for the SMP/E target and distribution libraries for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

Expected Return Codes and Messages: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

6.1.9 Perform SMP/E APPLY

Edit and submit sample job IDIAPPLY to perform an SMP/E APPLY CHECK for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do not bypass the following on the APPLY CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of ERRORS and not of WARNINGS (SYSMODs that are bypassed are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Once you have taken any actions indicated by the APPLY CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the APPLY.

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E apply all requisite SYSMODs. The requisite SYSMODS might be applicable to other functions.

A BookManager version is available in IDI.SIDIBOOK(IDIUGBOO). This member may be copied via a binary file transfer to your local workstation as IDIUGBOO.BOO to be referenced by IBM Library Reader.

6.1.11 Verify the Installation of Fault Analyzer

6.1.12 Perform SMP/E ACCEPT

Edit and submit sample job IDIACCEP to perform an SMP/E ACCEPT CHECK for Fault Analyzer. Consult the instructions in the sample job for more information.

To receive the full benefit of the SMP/E Causer SYSMOD Summary Report, do not bypass the following on the ACCEPT CHECK: PRE, ID, REQ, and IFREQ. This is because the SMP/E root cause analysis identifies the cause only of ERRORS and not of **WARNINGS** (SYSMODs that are bypassed are treated as warnings, not errors, by SMP/E).

Before using SMP/E to load new distribution libraries, it is recommended that you set the ACCJCLIN indicator in the distribution zone. This will cause entries produced from JCLIN to be saved in the distribution zone whenever a SYSMOD containing inline JCLIN is ACCEPTed. For more information on the ACCJCLIN indicator, see the description of inline JCLIN in the SMP/E manuals.

Once you have taken any actions indicated by the ACCEPT CHECK, remove the CHECK operand and run the job again to perform the ACCEPT.

Note: The GROUPEXTEND operand indicates that SMP/E accept all requisite SYSMODs. The requisite SYSMODS might be applicable to other functions.

Expected Return Codes and Messages from ACCEPT CHECK: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

If PTFs containing replacement modules are being ACCEPTed, SMP/E ACCEPT processing will linkedit/bind the modules into the distribution libraries. During this processing, the Linkage Editor or Binder may issue messages documenting unresolved external references, resulting in a return code of 4 from the ACCEPT step. These messages can be ignored, because the distribution libraries are not executable and the unresolved external references will not affect the executable system libraries.

Expected Return Codes and Messages from ACCEPT if no PTFs are being installed: This job should issue a return code of zero and no error messages.

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
