MAPPY AMID YELLOW JACK.

Noung Wife of a Sea Captain Passe Her Honeymoon on a Plague Ship.

Mrs. Hattie Reid, just arrived at Baltimore after a voyage from Santos, Brawil, is not likely to forget the trip, which was her honeymoon journey. Her husband is J. W. Reid, captain of the British bark Severn, which sailed from an English port several months ago for South America. Before leaving home the captain got married, and induced his young wife to accompany him on the woyage. At one of the South American ports the Severn took on board a death-dealing passenger in the shape of yellow jack. The disease did not fully manifest itself until the versel was again at sea. On her arrival at Santos, Brazil, a number of her crew were down with the fever, and it was found necessary to leave four men in hospital there. Capt. Reid urged his wife to leave the Severn there and take another ressel for England, but the plucky young woman refused to do so, declaring that if her husband should be taken down there would be no one to nurse him. Early in April the Severn left Santos, and from that time until she arrived off the Virginia coast she was not free from fever, five of her crew dying on the voyage. Mrs. Reid gave considerable attention to the sick men, but neither she nor her husband were attacked. The bridal tour on a plague ship was not ended at Baltimore, Mrs. Reid deciding to remain on board until the Severn returns to England.

LARGEST FLAG IN THE WORLD.

Has Been Made by a New York Broker to Float Over Morro Castle When Blanco Surrenders.

The Stars and Stripes in the shape of the largest flag in the world will float over Morro Castle, Havana, when Blanco surrenders. The immense flag designed for this duty is already prepared and may be seen draped at the front of an empty storeroom at 147 Fulbon street, New York city. A patriotic Wall street man has had the great flag made.

It measures 120 feet in length and 43 1-3 feet in width, and it is believed that it breaks the record for size. It is so big that special bunting was made for it in Boston. The bunting measured 42 inches across in the rough. Made up in the flag, allowing for seams, each stripe measures 40 inches. It took a full piece of forty yards for each stripe, except when they run into the Jack. The Jack measures 40 feet in length

and covers the space of seven stripes.
The stars are not very large. From bint to point each star measures 14 inches. They are arranged in alternating rows of seven and eight, according to army regulations. The flag will cost \$290. Big as it is it can be packed in a large traveling trunk and will not weigh more than 200 or 250 pounds.

CUBA'S GOVERNMENT.

State Department and Attorney General Hard at Work.

United States to Manage Affairs Until Island is Able to Take Care of Itself-A Governor General Probable.

The state department and the attorney-general, by direction of the president, are working hard in the preparation of a form of government icc Cuba after the Spaniards are driven from the island. In this connection, a careful study

has been made of the government Great Britain gave Egypt for the purpose of ascertaining whether any part of it will apply, temporarily or permanently, to Cuba, with a view always to the ultimate absolute freedom of the island.

The administration does not believe that Cuba, without assistance, can immediately, after peace is declared, organize and put into effect a stable government, and the president believes it to be his duty to help these people in their efforts. To properly prepare for this emer-

gency, a careful study of the Spanish system of government from the highest to the lowest degree in Cuba, is being made, and the same attention is being paid to the primitive rules and laws of the so-called republic of Cuba. The object of this research is to endeavor to eliminate all that is objectionable and to adopt all that will be useful.

It is understood to be the intention of the president to place a military governor in each province in Cube, who will be subordinate to a governor-general of the island.

It is possible that the president may ask aid from congress in establishing a stable form of government in Cuba, but as a matter of detail, has not been decided upon.

As soon as the attempt is made to establish a government in Cuba a corps of engineers will be put to work to construct railroads, telegraph lines, telephones, to survey for water works for cities, or place in order those which now exist, and to institute a complete modern system of sewage in Havana and other large cities. Everything possible to aid Cuba to recover from its devastated condition and become a producing nation will be done by this government, and every effort is now being made to have a complete plan for these operations ready to be put into effect as soon as peace is declared.

NEW ONE-POUNDER RIFLE.

Will Fire 180 Shots Per Minute-Could Annihilate any Torpedo Boat Affort.

RUNS INTO AN ICEBERG.

Atlantic Steamer Centrics Has on St citing Experience on the Atlantic.

A thrilling story of a collision at sea with a monster iceberg and a narrow escape from foundering, as a result of the damage sustained, was told by the officers of the four-masted Leyland liner Cestrian, which arrived at Boston the other morning with a gaping hole in her Her 28 frightened passengers never

expected to reach their destination, and to the stanchness of the ship can alone be attributed their safe arrival. The Cestrian, one of the largest freighters afloat, left Liverpool May 22, and completed the passage in less than nine days. On the night of May 27, when the ship was steaming ahead at reduced speed, she suddenly crashed into an iceberg. The first intimation of the close proximity of the berg, which towered fully 70 feet out of the water, was on hearing an echo, which was thought to be a sailing vessel on the starboard tack blowing one blast of her horn, but which proved subsequetly to be the heavy swashing of the seas against the ragged sides of the iceberg.

The officers and crew were cool and collected, and when Capt. Trant gave the order to swing out over the sides all the lifeboats on board, in order to have them in readiness to slip into the water, the command was obeyed without hesitation, and the entire ship's company of over 100 were all ready to leave the ship at a moment's notice. An investigation showed that the

force of the collision twisted the stem around on the port side a distance of some 20 feet and shoved her port anchor and hawsepipe in between, flattening the bow like a paneake and forcing high in the air the topgallant forecastle.
