"There will be a railroad over the passes and down the Yukon to the foot of the White Horse rapids before midsummer next. This enterprise is partly responsible for my visit to New York. It will be an overhead trolley, chiefly for freight, and will simplify the trip to Dawson City to such an extent that we shall carry goods down the Yukon instead of up the river from St. Michaels. On my first trip to that port, early in June, I shall carry lumber for barges which will be taken to the Upper Yukon. After the railroad is built our boats will rarely descend below Fort Yukon. The barges will be floated or pushed down stream from the end of the carrying trolley and towed back. We shall be able to make several of these trips per month. There will be no fear of provisions running short

"Will the building of that freight trolley be an expensive undertaking?" was asked.

"On the contrary, it will be very inexpensive," replied Capt. Irving. "Remember, it will not carry passengers. The system employed so successfully for transporting ore and coal will be used. The packages will not exceed 100 or 200 pounds, and it will be carried on an overhead wire, propelled by a series of endique cables. Elevations and steep grades are not factors in this method of transportation. The trees along the route will serve to support the

"A large storehouse can be erected at the terminus and the goods shipped through all ordinary winter weather. This will do away with the hardships of the trip. Any man can walk over the Chilkat pass if he is unincumbered. Twenty miles of climbing from Dyea takes him over that obstacle. Then the lakes and river do the rest. We will undertake to deliver his supplies ahead of his arrival."

HIS RACE BLEACHING OUT. Gaines, of Georgia, Make

Startling Predictions. Bishop Gaines, of Georgia, the portliest, broadest and most deeply-colored of all the bishops of the colored church, has become the prophet of a startling creed, which he has evolved and embodied in book form as his contribution to the literature of his race. His book, which is not yet out of the press, is the frankest, may be the bravest, that has yet appeared on the subject, and it is assuredly the most sensational.

In presenting his view of the situation he has not minced words, nor has he dodged conclusions as he sees them. he result is something that may cause the fastidious of the white race to shiver. NOVEL HOUSE POAT VOYAGE.

Chaples M. Beyden Will Flore to New Orleans by Canal and Myor.

the lake at the foot of Thirty-eighth street amilted the cultivalty of passenpers on the lilingia Central trains at Chicago the other afternoon, In appearance it is a diminutive tugboat, without smoke funnels of any kind. It has what seems a good-sized cabin perched upon its solitary deck, and upon examination it is seen to be about 16 feet long by seven feet wide. It tilte over somewhat on its stern, after the fashion of a shooting-the-chutes boat when striking the water. But this is because it is laden with provisions for a five months' voyage, and its master left edibles stacked high in one big heap, not having the time to properly distribute them about the "centers of gravity" of his Mttle vessel.

The master, builder and designer of this queer house on water is Charles M. Boyden, of 3811 Lake avenue, who intends to use it on a pleasure trip by water from Chicago to New Orleans. His route will lie through the Chicago river and the Illinois & Michigan canal to the Illinois river and the Mississippi. He completed his self-imposed task the other day. When the boat was hauled to the water's edge and launched he had the satisfaction of seeing that it floated in first-class fashion. It was then named the Snap Shot and gotten

in readiness for the voyage. The tugboat Hinshaw will tow the Snap Shot to Lamont. Thence to La Salle the voyage will be made by sail and oar. Then the current of the Illinois river will be utilized, and the same agency will be trusted to carry the craft to the crescent city at the end of the 1,500-mile trip.

Dogs and guns and fishing tackle have been provided. Bert Bowen, of 206 Oakwoods boulevard, accompanies Mr. Boyden. Fresh meat is to be found on hunting trips, and it will be cooked on board. February 1 New Orleans is expected to be reached. The return trip will be by rail.

NEW AIRSHIP DESIGNED. Charles A. Kuenzel, of Hoboken, N. J.,

Will Use Petroleum. The Aerial Navigation company, or-

ganized for the manufacture of flying machines, filed articles of incorporation in the Hudson county, N. J., clerk's office the other day. The machines are the invention of Charles A. Kuenzel, of Hoboken. who said:

"I have worked on this theory of a practical airship for 18 years. Five years ago in one of the public parks of Philadelphia I tried a working model. It was not large enough to satisfy me as a 'trial horse,' so I have had a larger one made—one that can carry five men, provisions, etc. Next month it will be tried from the Guttenburg race track. The parts have been constructed in two different machine shops in widely separated localities in order to preserve the necessary secrecy.

"All I care to say now is that the balloon is 135 feet long and 40 feet in diameter, with a capacity of 250,000 cubic feet of gas. The ship is 60 feet long and 20 feet in diameter. The engine and all the running parts, steering gear, etc., are made of aluminum. Or gallon of petroleum a day will suffice to run the engine and about 40 gallons can be carried—enough to last for a month without replenishing the fuel.

"Unlike Prof. Andree, we are able to renew our supply of gas as fast as it leaks and the balloon loses its proper buoyancy. The entire weight of the whole affair will not exceed 1,500 pounds. The balloon proper cost \$9,000 to construct. It will support 4,000 pounds besides the weight of the craft,"

LIBEL IN AN EPITAPH. Novel Cause of a Damage Suit at

Dresden, Tenn. Memphis lawyers have brought suit in Dresden, Weakly county, Tenn., for damages for defamation of character alleged to be contained in an epitaph cut in a tombstone. Such a cause of action is probably unparalleled; nevertheless the wording on this tombstone is such as is seldom seen in a grave-

The parties reside near Martin, Weakly county. In December, 1896, L. B. Cate was shot and killed by Bill Penick. Penick was tried on the charge of murder and was defended by the same lawyers now acting for him in this civil suit. He was acquitted on the plea of self-defense.

The parents of the deceased thought to honor his memory by erecting a suitable tombstone over his grave and by having cut in the marble a legend setting forth the circumstances of his taking off. The following is the epitaph:

L. B., son of J. C. and L. J. Cate, born April 10, 1870. Married Millie Freeman December 21, 1887; was shot and killed by Bull Penick December 11, 1885; caused by Penick swearing a lie on Cate's wife. Aged 20 years, 3 months and 1 day.

********************* It is alleged by Penick that this was exposed to public gaze in the yard of the tombetone-maker for quite awhile before it was erected over the grave of deceased Cate. The complainant sues both the sculptor and the father of the deceased for \$10,000 damages.

TRADE WITH SWITZERLAND

We Are Sending Canned Meats, Btcycles and California Dried Fruits. Consul Ridgeley, at Geneva, Switzerland, in a report to the state department, says that during the first six months of this year there was a considerable revival of exportations to the United States, especially in watches. In June there was great anxiety to get the goods in before the tariff bill went into effect. At present, however, the manufacturers are not satisfied with the outlook, exports to this country not only falling off, but business in general is dull. There have not been as many American visitors as usual. and those who have been in Switzerland have made comparatively small and insignificant purchases.

There has been a very large increase in the number of bicycles imported from the United States, and some American makes have taken a strong hold here. An increase in the importation of United States canned meats is also noted. One of the interesting features of the report is that announcing the importation of 2,000 boxes of California dried fruits.

KISS CAUSES A STRIKE

Osculatory Offender Dismissed a the Other Men Walk Out. Because he kissed or attempted to kiss one of the fair English lassies employed in the dusting department of the Newcastle (Pa.) tin plate works Richard Kissinger was discharged. He is a member of the patent machine tinners' union, which is affiliated with the Federation of Labor.

Stealing a kiss was not sufficient excuse for discharging a workman, the officials of the union said, and they demanded Kissinger's reinstatement. This was refused and a strike was ordered. About 200 men and boys are out.

The company does not claim the girl objected to the kissing, but Kissinger says the superintendent of the mill wanted to get rid of him and took this means of doing it. The girl says he did not kiss her, but even if he did the offense was not serious enough to cause

suspension of work. The strikers say they will not return until Kissinger is reinstated. If new men are hired there will be trouble, they say.

OUEEN'S LETTERS TO TENNYSON Reveal Her Bitter Hostility to the

Home Rule Pelicy.
A copyrighted cablegram from London to the New York Post says: No little talk has been aroused in political circles over passages on Lord Tennyson's biography, which nearly all the reviewers purposely or accidentally overlook. These passages, in letters between Lord Tennyson and the queen, furnish the first direct evidence of the queen's bitter and active hostility to the home rule policy of her then constitutional advisers, and quite upset the notion that the queen has become the

mere echo of her ministers' views. It is a well known fact that the letters are now published by the deliberate wish of her majesty. This lends peculiar interest and importance to the disclosure, suggesting either her belief that Irish home rule is dead beyond recall, though Mr. John Morley has again nailed the home rule colors to the liberal mast, or else her fixed determination to withhold her acceptance of any such constitutional change.

MEAT PRODUCTS OF URUGUAY. Jerked Beef and Beef Extract Ex-

ported in Large Quantities. Consul Schramm, of Montevideo, has sent to the department an elaborate report upon the meat products of Uruguay. The principal meat product is tasajo (jerked beef), which is exported to Cuba, Brazil and the Wast Indies. Fifty per cent. of the nourishing qualities of the beef is extract of tasajo. About 200,000 head of cattle were slaughtered for the manufacture of a beef extract, to say nothing of the large number killed for tasajo. The consul says the extract possesses no nourab-ing qualities whatever and is at most a attong stimulant, all the nourishing rocess of manufacture by chamicals.


