PASSAGE SET THE ALLEGIANY:—The following account of the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh railroad and canal, is given by a gentleimen who passed over them last May." This is perhaps the greatest triumph over natural obstacles that has been achieved in this country.

last May." This is perhaps the greatest triumph over natural obstacles that has been achieved in this country:

"The whole distance is 393 miles. It crosses the Schuykill by a viaduct of 1045 feet long, and 41 feet wide, and 30 feet above the water. It then ascends an inclined, plane of 5809 feet by a stationary engine; and descends another of 1720 feet to Columbia on the Susquelanna, where it joins the main division of the Feansylvania canal, 81 miles from Philadelphia; which canal passes through Harrisburg, and follows the Junisto branch of the Susquelanna. The cost of the raitroad was three and a half millions. Its greatest altitude above the waters of the Delaware is 355 feet. The next is the canal 172 miles long, baving 18 dense, 83 seeducts, and 111 locks, to near the Alleghary mountain, which is ascended by five inclined planes of nearly a mile in length each, and descended by five mores. I passed a tunnel through solid rock 670 feet, and having four extensive visiducts. At Johns town on the Connemaugh, it meets the canal, which is 104 miles long to Titaburgh, and has 64 locks, 10 dams, 2 tunnels, 16 squeducts, 64 culverts, 162 bridges, and passes through a tunnel, perforating a bill 250 feet high. It appears from account that cars are drawn by horses over the Alleghany part of the road, except at the inclined planes. I have no notes of the time required to pass the whole distance, nor of the speed on any part of it."

AN ACT

To grant certain privileges to the town of Harrison-turgh.
