RESCUE OF HAWAII'S CHIEF.—George W. Hanes,

on Saturday last was brought before the Recorder, to

answer to three distinct charges of forgery and swindling.

The first charge was for having, on the 1st of June,

check drawn by Converse & Co., on the City Bank, for

\$500, with a view and intent to defraud City Bank of

the same.

The second charge for forging and uttering an
