## E. GASSIE AGAIN LOSES IN COURT

## Have You a Tussore Suit Yet?



William C. Mullin, charged by Emile Gassie, Citizens' league agent, with having assaulted him with intent to kill a few weeks ago, was released in the First City Criminal court yesterday morning following a hearing before Judge Fisher. It was Gassie's word against that of Mullin and two saloonmen, and Mullin established an alibi.

Gassie swore positively that Mullin and another man followed him around for a couple of hours the day before the attack on him. On the night of the attack, he declared, Mullin stopped him and asked him for a light, and then assaulted him on the right side, while the other man closed in on the left. He was positive that Mullin was the man who committed the deed.

Frank J. Coster, who operates a saloon at 1031 Magazine street, and John J. Coster, his brother and a partner in the enterprise, testified that at the time of the alleged assault Mullin was in their saloon. Gassie asserted in his evidence that he believed he was assaulted on account of information furnished the police about liquor law violations.
