Mr. Downs on the part of the majority of the same Committee made the following REPORT:

When in 1842, it was found that many of the Banks of the State were insolvent and that the interest of the State and of its citizens required that the solvent Banks should be separated from the insolvent, and that the latter ought to be placed in a course of final settlement, it was found that is insolvency of Banks had not been contemplated by preceding Legislatures, there was no process of law provided by which their bank-ruptcy should be ascertained and declared, and their liquidation carried into effect. To supply this omission, the "Act to provide for the liquidation of Banks," approved March 14th, 1842, was passed. It was necessarily defective in some respects, as all legislation on a new subject must be, but as subsequently amended it has answered the

It would violate that principle adopted in the bill of last session, that as the State without having received the benefit of their proceeds, is responsible for the payment of the Bonds, and the loss must fail principally on her, and as the eventual loss of the Bank will depend much on the management of its affairs, so as to realise the greatest possible amount from the assets it ought to remain with the State.

But the necessity is proved not only by the fact of the application, but by the facts disclosed by the reports of the Board of Currency and of the State Treasurer, that on the 31st of December last her specie was only \$341,234 66-100 against immediate liabilities under the amount of \$329,193 62-100, and that the whole of her other assets under this heat (consisting of \$42,463 17 in short paper and \$98,418 24 in other assets) exceeds her liabilities only \$162,972 45, and that 1,750,000 of her Bonds fall due on the 1st of November, 1844.


