Pennsylvania has not rechartered that bank; for for she never before incorporated it; and could not charter a national bank: and Congress has refused to recharter. The subject does not therefore come with-in the purview of party politics, nor of the present and contemplated administration of the general govern-ment—else we ourselves should consider it as a party question.

But it is now one exclusively ofstate policy; and we

must therefore sincerely and strengously discountenance the attempts of both our evening confreres to render it not only a topic of general policy, but of party politics. Yesterday we replied to our friend of the Post and Union on the pesuliar merits of the question , basing them chiefly on the acknowledged or alleged right of any state by her reserved sovereignty to legis-late on her banking and insurance transactions, as on her internal and educational improvements, and on her civil and penal codes, within her own jurisdiction, as her special policy might dictate. Heavens! can political madness go farther? What! shall we denounce or prevent efficient facilines for the commercial transactions of our merchants—for the palpable advantages of our planters—and for the what might this system of cut throating lead? We have in New Orleans banks empowered to establish agen-cies or branches in other states—and even the Union bank, now a dep sitory of the general government revenues—has demanded such a privilege. Can we expect that Pennsylvania will tolerate an agency of one ef our banks, if we denounce a branch of one of he'r's? The same policy that we mete to others, will be me ted us; and the benefits if not be the credit of our local banks would be materially endangered by such a system of fele de se.

If it is for the advantage of any state to charter a bank of her own for her special purposes, why should that state or that bank be denounced? and if it by for the benefit of any state to admit an agency of a distant of foreign banking or insurance company within her li-mits, is the subject to be considered a bone of conten-tion between party polititions? Forbid it justice and
