COMMERCIAL.

From WILIE'S New-Orleans Price Corrent December 18, 1830. GENERAL REMARKS .- On Sunday Monday, and Tuesday last, the weather was up usually wet, and suspended, generally, all out-door business. On Wednesday it became clear, with frost, and the transactions of the day very limited. Thursday, another frost, weather clear and cool, and large sales made in cutton, at a further decline on last week's quotations; and on vesterday forencen, whilst making our enquiry. we found the demand good for this article, which leads us to believe that a fair business has been done. There has arrived since, up to yesterday

morning, twenty one Steamhoats, seven of which are from the Ohio river, three from St. Louis, and eleven from the Interior and Mississippi .-The reported rise in the Ohio gives our market a peculiar feature, and renders every article of estern produce now on hand, very uncertain as to its true value, it being expected that in a few days all the large Steamboats, so long delayed, will arrive with full cargoes, and glut the market with traders, anxious to sell. On the other hand, should the river fall, and close by ice very thing from that quarter will suddenly rise far beyond the ordinary rates. These circumstances make it hazardous in giving quotations that we would wish to be considered as correct, as many may ulter while we are writing, and working off the present sheet. The Mississippi here is still at the lowest stage.

COTTON.-Arrived since Friday morning 10th inst. up to yesterday morning, from the In-10,792 bales. Cleared in the same time, for Liverpool 4634 bales, Havre 1163, Providence, 806, New-York 133, Philadelphia 81, Baltimore 31; in all 6146; making a further increase in the stock of 3944 bales. The principal sales since our last, on account of bad weather, was made on Thursday, amounting to full 4000 bales, at a decline on last week's prices, and altogether, at fairly two cents lower than at the opening of the market; and purchasers still hold out for a further reduction, which many think will be submitted to. Of the 4000 bales sold, 2000 were Mississippi, at 94 cents; the balance at an average of about 94 cents, nearly all for the English market.
