# Audit hits Freeman-Wilson

## Agency says grants by former attorney general broke law

INDIANAPOLIS - State auditors say Indiana's former attorney general broke the law when she issued more than \$700,000 in grants last year without approval from the governor and two state agencies.

Auditors also uncovered sloppy or nonexistent record keeping and lax oversight of the grants and other spending during Karen Freeman-Wilson's 11month tenure, The Indianapolis Star reported Wednesday.

O'Bannon Frank Gov. appointed Freeman-Wilson, a Democrat from Lake County, to the post in February 2000. She left office in January, after losing the November election to
