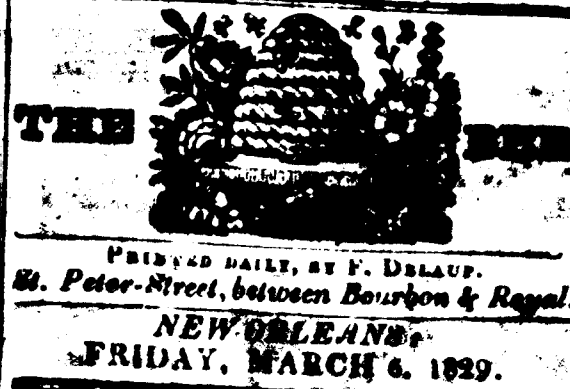

LATEST FROM FRANCE.
PARIS, Jan. 5.—A letter from Patras says, that city has been restored to the Greeks; who, according to their ancient habitations. These unhappy men, who have borne inconceivable sufferings with a resignation and an energy worthy of ancient times, expressed the most lively joy in returning to their domestic abodes.

The Greeks are divided in two factions—the one rejoicing at the presence of the French, whom they consider as their deliverers, while the other fear that the French, and the other party to the treaty of July 6th, will impose upon them a government, possessing too much of the absolute character of the government of Europe.

MASSACRE AT CRETE.—A dispatch from Constantinople, dated the 25th inst., states that the Turkish army of the island of Crete with the blood of the Christians. The Mahomedans, persuaded that when they should be no Greeks in the country there will be no reason for separating it from the Ottoman dominion, have commenced the project of exterminating this race of people within a few days, massacred from one thousand to three hundred people in the city of Candia alone. Scarcely a sufficient number of Christians were left to drag the carcasses of their countrymen to the sea. That being done the unhappy wretches who had been spared were assassinated. At Suda, at Spina Longo, at Ictimo, all who were not Mahomedans, were put to the sword. It is said that this horrible massacre was perpetrated in consequence of a secret order of the Grand Seigneur, who has formed the project of expatriating Christianity throughout his empire.

The same article says, that the Muscovites here now brand the vulnerable points of Turkey, as the blockade, continental revolts, matches may be expected to take place in the capital of the Turkish Empire, as they first months of the year 1890 will prove.

RECONSTRUCTION.—An article from Corfu, December 12 says that Reddish Pacha, of Janina, having been led to Constantinople, to advise on the measures of preparing the Grecian Provinces a reconstruction had broken out in his territory. At Etroha, Acarnania, the mountainous country of Euboea and Plochia as far as Oehris, are in arms. The Albanian Mahomedans have united themselves to the malcontents. It is thought that this movement may have important consequences.

Extract of a private letter of the 29th ult. from Constantinople.—"The English Consul is continuing to adhere to his motto—'Every thing or nothing.'"

A letter from Gibraltar states, that on the 5th of December the blockade of Cadiz was still continued.—The Moorish government does not agree to the demands of Britain, and the town remains in perfect tranquillity, notwithstanding the menacing attitude of the British squadron.

HAYES, Jan. 2.—The American packet ship Edward Benfle arrived in our port six days from New York. This is the most rapid passage which has been made by the packets during the seven years in which they have been running. The Orozime only has furnished the example of a voyage equally short.

M. de la Ferronayre, French Minister of Foreign Affairs, was attacked with apoplexy while sitting in council with the King at the Tuilleries. He will be compelled by his illness, the papers say, to resign his seat.

BELIN, Dec. 19.—It is asserted with confidence, that our government is disposed to act the part of mediator, and will profit by the winter to make a serious attempt to accommodate the differences between Russia and the Porte. It is well understood that England will second all the efforts of our intervention.

reinforced, the patrols multiplied, instruction have been given to the commanders, and the troops of the garrison spend the nights under arms in their barracks. Some regiments have suddenly changed their barracks, because the government had not full confidence in them. They speak also of serious events having taken place among the troops which kept guard at the palace of Quetz. The Gazette of today contains the following bulletin:—

"December 19th, 11 o'clock.—Having examined to-day the fractured limb of his Majesty, we have had the satisfaction to see that the bone has united, and that the member, has now no infirmity. His Majesty will continue to keep his bed for some days, that he may be able to rise with full confidence. Notwithstanding this, the doors of his chamber are always shut to all the world except the royal family, the ministers, and the surgeons.

Late & interesting from Buenos Ayres.

(Continued from our last.)
Then follows a note from Julian Segundo de Angore, President of the Assembly, to General D. Juan Lavalle, Provisional Governor and Captain General of the Province, as named by the people in Assembly this day, giving an account of the proceedings thereon. That in consequence of a movement of the worthy first division of the army to sustain the rights of the people, violated by the Administration which had that day finished; and that in proceeding to the election of a Governor interim a part of the people wished that each citizen should sign his name, and persons were appointed to take the names; that this had continued until 81 citizens had signed, viz: 79 for General Lavalle for General Alvarez, and 1 for Senor Lopez. It was, however, found impossible from the immense concourse of people to conclude this operation within 24 hours; it was then urged that time was precious and that the citizens ought to group themselves in maintaining public order. A proposition was then made that those who wished that General Lavalle should be Governor interim should hold up their hats in the right hand, and immediately the whole of the people did so with loud acclamations; none were held up either for General Alvarez or Senor Lopez. General Lavalle was then declared duly elected as provisional Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres.

A decree of General Lavalle, provisional Governor of the province, dated 9th December appointed Adoral Brown to the command of the civil and military Government of the Province, during his (Lavalle's) absence in the country.

In the afternoon of 10th Dec. a bulletin was published, containing a hearty despatch from General Lavalle to the Delegate Governor (Admiral Brown), announcing the defeat of Col. Dorrego's force on the 11th, and some further observations from an individual who was in the battle, that Dorrego and Rosas had upon the same horses which they had rode in the action, were closely pursued, &c.

The Delegate Governor had received an official dispatch that Col. Don Manuel Dorrego has fallen into the power of one of the pursuing parties of Senor General Lavalle.—[Gazeta Mercantile Dec. 18].

Imprisonment for Debt.—Of 991 persons imprisoned in the Debtor's Jail at Boston, during the year 1889, only 74, or about 7 1/2 per cent, were discharged by actual payment of debt and cost. Of the whole number, 25 were females. The aggregate commitments to the same Jail in the last nine years, in 1873, 1874, 1875, 1876, 1877, 1878, 1879, in which the expense of trials and commitments had been insured by creditors, besides all the vexations and trouble experienced, without deriving the least possible advantage.

Fast Sailing Vessels.—The Baltimoreans are justly proud of their naval architecture, and of the speed of the superior swiftness of their vessels. It has lately been stated in their public papers, that the schooner Yellow performed her passage from Cape Horn in 64 days to the Cape, and 67 to Baltimore, and the Christian in 78 days to Baltimore. We have received from a friend the following statement of the ship Herald of Gloucester, (built in Salem) which may be gratifying to some of our excellent mechanics.—Captain Pearson of the Herald, states that he left San Pedro, May 31 1888, and was on the 31st degrees in 59 days, and arrived at Gloucester 14th August, after a passage of 45 days. Captain P. further, states, that owing to calms for nine days of his passage he made only the same distance as he did the 24 hours previous, and had the Herald been bound to Baltimore, the calms would probably to some degree have been avoided, and rendered his passage in all probability to New York which Baltimore can boast of.
