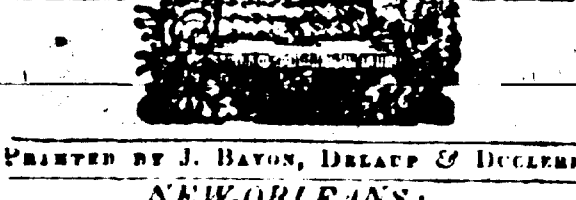

Turkish censors, enamelled and adorned with diamonds; rings, with solitaires of all kinds especially very rare turquoises; richly enamelled tobacco pipes of rare wood, with mouth pieces of amber, set in with diamonds; cups of Chinese porcelain; a large quantity of aloes wood; many tobacco pouches from Cachemere, embroidered with gold; silver, and pearls; a large quantity of the best Tumbeki; tobacco of Shiraz, morocco portfolios, embroidered with gold; English watches, with chains, and set in beautiful brilliants; a great quantity of stuffs from Aleppo and Broussa, embroidered with gold and silver; Indian muslins, richly embroidered; several Angola shawls of all colours; handkerchiefs for the head richly embroidered with gold and pearls; kalemkars from Constantinople, or pocket handkerchiefs of painted muslin of extraordinary beauty; several sabres of the finest quality; many richly ornamented guns and pistols, of Constantinople manufacture; carpets from Marsh Ushach, and splendid sofa cushions; 200 very rare talismans, mostly as necklaces and bracelets; a great quantity of ground Mocha coffee, in hermetically closed vessels, Turkish ladies' boots, adorned with pearls and jewels confectionary and sherbet from India, Egypt, and the Seraglio; an immense quantity of ambrs and Oriental incense, otto of roses of the finest quality, in beautiful crystal bottles. Halil Pasha will distribute the above presents according to his discretion, after having first delivered the following presents to the Emperor and Empress; a sabre of extraordinary beauty, and richly ornamented; a saddle, with saddle cloth and bridle, both adorned with jewels; a little box, ornamented with solitaires of extraordinary size; a comb, with large solitaires; a complete set of furniture for the toilet, adorned with costly pearls; Cachemere shawls, of the greatest worth; plans, embroidered with the finest pearls; which are the chief of these rich presents. Besides which there are a great number of valuable articles for the court, the ministers, and the household of the Empress.
