Shipwreck—The John Adams, Aderton, from New-Orleans for the port with 925 bales cotton, 5000 pigs lead, 15 bales twine, and 5 bales mchandise, went ashore on Fire Island, Monday morning last, at 4 o'clock.

Washington, January 27.

The Tariff—Contrary to the indication in the report held out by the proceeding Congress, it appears that the subject of a revision of the Tariff will be seriously agitated at the present session of Congress.

The bill proposes to modify, from and after the 30th day of June next, the duties on iron, in bolts, hemp, molasses, sail-duck, manufacturers of wool, all cotton cloths whatsoever, wool, unmanufactured, clothing ready made, cotton bagging, coffee, teas, Woollen carpeting, shot, flax, salt, and some other articles.

PARIS CHIT-CHAT

Paris, Dec. 1.—There is still much excitement in the political circles, and it is fully believed that some attempt will be made to modify the charter. The King talks of taking up his residence for some time at St. Cloud, from which it is inferred that he intends to make some attempt upon the liberties of the people, and is determined to be away from the capital for safety during its execution.

The Duke de Guiche, who was for some time in the British army, is endeavouring to form establishments for improving the breed of horses in France. He is likely to succeed.—Several English blood stallions and Arabian mares have been already imported for crossing with French-bred horses and mares.

A new debutante, Mlle. Amboise, has appeared at the Opéra House as a dancer. She is very clever and is likely to become a great favorite.

The Théâtre were pretty well attended during the month of November. The receipts for the month of the 13, exclusive of the Grand Opera, were 226,000 francs. The regular Theatre (Theatre Français) received of this amount only 32,000; whilst the Vaudeville had 75,355.

It is said to be the intention of the Royal Family to exclude the public from the gardens of the Tuilleries, and convert them into private ones for use of the Palace, and to lay out the Champs Elysées as public gardens, on a plan similar to those of the Tuilleries, Luxembourg, &c.

Brussels, Nov. 20. The audit of Brussels is, that our Princess's marriage is not to take place for a year, and a half, her amorous being considered too young to take upon him the cares of housekeeping, and in the meantime, it is intended to send H. R. H. on his travels.
