The state of society in Mexico may be partially carned from a publication made in a journal of that city, on the 12th of February by its commandant-gene ral, Gabriel Valencio. This gentleman tenders his ro signation, in announcing the arrest of a certain Colone Juan Yanez and others of the same rank, who had murdered the Swiss consulat Mexico, and been guilty of various assassinations in that city and Puebla-wh had been equally celebrated for the robbery of the #il ver ingote at Viscenia, of the diligence near Santa ver ingots at viscenia, of the diligence near Santa Cruz, and of the convent of San Jose de Gracia. These discoveries were made by Colonel Olazabal, who was impediately poisoned by the bandits. These crimes being telerated or unpunished by the general government yelencio resigned his command, rather than become another victim—as he said that the government protected the most infamous assassins in preference a conscientious magistrate.

I therefore made an effort, I vinquished all difficulties and forcing a march during three days and nights, I arrived here at the dawn of day—not having with me more than 10c saying men in attacked the enemy, who defended himself with firmness in the houses that served for barracks. My very respectable clief,—yesterday at 3 p m, we commeaced an attack on the rebel columns, below the habitation of Agua dulce. The surprize occasioned them by our ambuscade was such that they did not perceive us till they were in our power. They fired a few pistol shots; but so very badly directed that they only wounded one horse. We charged them in the plain for the distance of two leagues and a half; and pursued them as if they were savage horses (mestance). They forgot they carried muskets and pistola, with which they had learned to direct their fires. Thrty-two dead were found on the field of battle; and we took 4 prisoners. Among the slain were colonel Grant, majorgeneral Morris, a captain and a lieutenant of artitlery. The fact is that our troops pursued them with poised lance, which was sufficient to achieve all.
