## CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

By shooting himself in the head in his room, 730 Dauphine street, Hans Reich, 24, attempted suicide Monday night. He was taken to the Charity Hospital, where it is reported he is in a serious condition. According to the police, Reich, who is a watchman employed at the Cosmopolitan Hotel, became despondent over a love affair and determined to end his life.

When Sheriff R. E. Oden of Oberlin attempted to enter the cell in which Leonard Hill, a negro under sentence of death, was confined, Hill picked up a heavy window weight and threatened to kill the officer if he entered, and the sheriff (thereupon) shot the negro in the foot subduing him.

New Orleans railroads received sudden orders Thursday to rush all spare passenger equipment North East and West for the handling of National Guard, and selective drafts to the various cantonments and encampments in the South. Trains of these empty coaches will leave this section Friday and Saturday for distant destinations, to return South again at an early date with thousands of the boys in khaki. The orders for these coaches caused a cancellation of practically all excursion trains running out of New Orleans.

George Doyle, one of the leaders in the Operative Plasterers and Cement Finishers' International Association, Local No. 93, wishes to raise a battalion here of French-speaking negro men who will "serve France as she may see fit." Doyle lives at 2327 Miro street. His offer

was made to Emile F. Genoyer, consul general of France in New Orleans, as a sequel to the celebration held in Mayor Behrman's parlor Thursday in honor of the birthday of General Lafayette.

A. H. Borden, manager of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Bureau, was appointed assistant general manager of the Association of Commerce Thursday by Walter Parker, general manager, who was authorized to employ an assistant official at a meeting of the Board of Directors earlier in the day. Mr. Borden has been connected with the Association of Commerce for nearly seven years.

The Victory bread campaign was begun in earnest in New Orleans Wednesday. And, now, to be patriotic the Victory Commission says you must use a one-fourth or one-fifth proportion of cottonseed flour in your bread to liberate the necessary one-fifth of wheat Mr. Hoover considers essential to the Allies' success, and you will be doing a home service by introducing a new food, rich in protein and vitamin, the elements essential to maintain a health standard and which the high cost of living makes prohibitive if it is endeavored to obtain them through the use of meat, milk and eggs.

About one hundred persons attended the opening luncheon of the Pan-American Club at its new headquarters, 216 St. Charles street. Wednesday noon when addresses were made by J. L. Munoz, acting president; P. L. Luigi, new Venezuelan consul here; Samuel Weil, Julie Wolfson, Andrew Martinez, Walter Parker and Lynn H. Dinkins, organizer of the organization.

Two boys were injured and several others had narrow escapes when a stolen automobile ran into a ditch in Poydras Plantation, St. Bernard parish, Thursday morning. Leonard Bixton, 218 St. Peter street, received severe wounds of the face and head and Charles Randal, Jr., 1025 Ursuline street, was injured about the body and right leg. The boys were taken to Charity Hospital.
