ROSS OF LIVERPOOL.—The interments reported by

the Board for the day ending yesterday at noon, show

44 of which were yellow fever.

In consequence of an untimely and cruel

loss of the *Saint Patrick's Cemetery*, the interments

which took place in that cemetery on the 8th and 15th instant were not reported, they numbered only 4, of which I was from yellow fever. This reduces the actual mortality for yesterday, to 40, of which 34 were from yellow fever.

REPORT OF THE CHARITY HOSPITAL.—During the

24 hours ending yesterday evening at 6 o'clock:

Admissions 31, of which 31 yellow fever.

Discharges 6, " 3 do.

Deaths 7, all of yellow fever.

Number of patients remaining in the hospital, 367.

We regret to perceive that the yellow fever is on

the increase. The number of deaths reported yesterday is larger than on any previous day of the season.
