**NEW-YORK, March 19.**  
**THE CASE OF STEPHENSON.**—The following particulars our readers will be interested to know, in addition to the details we have already given. After it was known that Stephenson had arrived at Savannah, an express was sent off to that city, furnished with all the documents which might be necessary as the basis of those legal proceedings best calculated to recover the large sums of money, which the creditors of the House of R.nington, Stephenson & Co. presumed whether correctly or not, the fugitive had taken with him. The first express left this city on Thursday of last week and Mr. Wilson the cashier of the bankrupt house, who arrived here from London on Friday, followed on to Savannah on Sunday. Scarcely however had these measures been taken by the merchants who had been charged with the business by their correspondents in London, when the British Consul and themselves were informed, that Stephenson, so far from being in Savannah, was on board a pilot boat lying at anchor off the Battery.  
About half past three in the afternoon of Monday, a Mr. Graham, who, we understand, is a legal gentleman, entered the Police Office, and, approaching Mr. Hopson, who was the only magistrate then presiding, stated that two persons, who accompanied him, wished for a private interview, as they had something of importance to communicate. Mr. G. then retired from the Office, and the two individuals observed to the Justice, that they had Mr. Stephenson under their care, and desired to know if he would commit him to prison. This, Mr. Hopson refused to do, and distinctly stated that neither he nor any other person in the city of New York, could hold Mr. Stephenson in custody, unless a process had been issued. Mr. Hays, Jun. at this time came into the office, and the magistrate having informed him of the circumstance, Hays retired in company with the applicants. This statement contains the whole of this transaction that appeared before the Police. Subsequently, the high constable, in company with the British Consul, boarded the pilot boat, took Mr. Stephenson to the Consulate, from thence to Mr. Goadhue's, where he partook of some refreshments, afterwards he was taken to the house of Mr. Hays in Lispenard street, where he remained for the night, It was last evening rumored that a Bri-

tish sloop of war had been discovered cruising off the Hook on Tuesday night, and we understand that a messenger has been sent to Albany with despatches to the Executive, founded upon this rumor. A mass of documentary evidence was despatched by Mr. Patterson to Governor Forsyth, of Georgia. Last evening, at six o'clock, the counsel of Stephenson, Messrs. M. C. Patterson, P. H. May, W. Wyley, W. M. Price, and A. S. Garr, held a consultation, the result of which we are not at present at liberty to mention.

Before we close this article it may be well to state that when Mr. Wilson the accredited messenger from London arrived in this city, he furnished a statement from his memoranda of the property belonging to Remington, Stephenson & Co. which was found to be deficient, immediately after the absconding of Stephenson. It will be seen that this account differs from the statements in the English Journals. It is as follows—

**Foreign Intelligence.**  
**GREECE.**  
So far back as the month of September the Hydra Corvette, capt. in Sacchini, with five or six brigs, furnished with papers signed by Count Capo d'Istria, was sent to sea with instructions to detain and carry into Egina all neutral vessels laden with corn bound to Constantinople. In October the number of their Greek cruisers was increased to ten. No declaration, official or unofficial, was made by Count Capo d'Istria to warn the neutral ships. The French Vice-Admiral Rigny, who left Poros on the 24th November, had not the slightest information on the subject.

**POLAND.**—An article contained in the German mail alludes to the conspiracy discovered in Poland, but in cautious terms. It states that it has been suppressed. We have learned, however, from private, but authentic sources, that the conspiracy was of a most serious nature, and that its ramifications extended far beyond Poland itself. It is certain that the Emperor strongly distrusted the fidelity of his Polish troops, so much so indeed, that although a very large body of them were actually under orders to march against the Turks, they were hastily recalled, symptoms of dissatisfaction being manifested among them of a kind so serious as to lead to the apprehension, that instead of allies they would be found enemies.

The French Revenue for the year just expired was nearly a million and a quarter sterling over that of 1827. Paris is about to be lighted with gas, and a preparatory experiment was last week made on a small scale.

M. Soult, son of the Marshall Duke of Delamatia, has been appointed a Knight of the Legion of Honour. This young officer forms part of the staff corps, and serves as Lieutenant with the army of the Morca.

**FRANCE.**—A very interesting inquiry is at the present moment going on in France, the great object of which seems to be to ascertain whether it is most expedient for the interests of the country to encourage the growth of the sugar required for home consumption in colonies belonging to France, to obtain it from the settlements of other states, or promote the establishments already undertaken for its manufacture from the beet root. With this view a number of experienced persons have been called up to Paris, among whom are colonists from Guadaloupe, old settlers in St. Domingo, traders to the island of Cuba, refiners, &c. several of whom have already undergone examinations before a commission specially appointed by the government, and it would seem that the inquiry will not be completed for some time so great is the anxiety on the part of the present ministry to pursue the inquiry. In the progress of the business a very interesting fact has been elicited respecting the manufacture of sugar from the beet root, and results

obtained which could only have been done by experience, and not scientific researches. Mr. Morel de Vinde, a peer of France has made repeated trials on the beet root, and contends that its cultivation will improve. French agriculture more than that of any other kind of vegetable. He asserts that the general adoption of this plant will render France independent of foreign supplies of sugar, and that it is, besides, the best food for fattening cattle.
