ing was excited 1 st year, in consequence of a disagreement between Mr. Caldwell manager of the American theatre and Herr Cline who had entered into an engagement with him as a ropedancer in consequence of a breach of contract on the part of Cline, Mr. Caldwell first took the field and commenced a suit against him; this Cline met by a cross suit and by some means, and by force of management contrived to have his aust brought on first; and obtained, contrary to all expectation a verdict for \$1000 against which Mr. Caldwell appealed—and the vertice of the Court below was reversed. The suit brought by Caldwell was not brought on for hearing, till one year after the suit of Cline; and notwithstanding the strength and clearness of the evidence in support of Caldwell's claim to damage, the opposite counsel, supported to r certain extent by the judge, opposed Cline's judgment to it, and the jury not agreeing was dismissed—it was unfortunate for Mr. Caldwell that his appeal to the supreme court had not been decided previous to the trial of his suit against Cline, as then a judgment of an inferior court could not have affected in any way, his just right of action. It is now, however, settled, and there can be no doubt that Caldwell will ultimately obtain redress a gainst Cline for a breach of contract. It is hard enough for a manager dealing liberally with his actors, and guaranteeing large sums for the amasement of the public, to be subjected to the inconvenieries occasioned by the temporary succease of a Rope-dancer; yet no sooner was the judgment of the court below promulgated, than it was hailed as a triumph on the part of Cline; and two papers unfriendly to Caldwell having published the verdict in this city; no pains were self untried, to introduce a garbled statement of the unreaction to almost all the editors in the Union, by whom the subject was brought before the public to the great satisfaction of Cline, and, to a set tin degree, to the injury of Caldwell.
