## HARD-LUCK STORIES.

Fifty Prospectors Return from Klondike After Discouraging Search for Gold.

Fifty prospectors who left Seattle. Wash., last spring for Alaska, by way of Copper river, have arrived in that city on their way to their eastern homes, with hard-luck stories and no gold. A. H. Hostetter, of Lagrange, Ind., was with 200 men that crossed Tasmunia lake and reached the Konsinu river. He said:

"Of the many hundreds that landed at the foot of the Valdea glacier, only one party had been in further than the Konsinu, and they returned half starved, having lost their outfits in the rapids. It was reported that seven lives had been lost in the rapids, but the report had not been confirmed."

The most discouraging story is told by A. C. Johnson, of St. Louis. He said about 800 men have been turned back and are waiting at Valdez for some means of getting out of the country. Some have no money and will have to remain there until the government sends help. They will not starve, for tons of provisions have been abandoned. It is impossible to sell outfits.

"The ether drunkard is quarrelsome and untruthful. His condition of mind resembles that of people afflicted with certain nervous diseases. He suffers from gastric troubles and nervous prostration. He becomes the slave of his passion, like the opium smoker, and the cures of the passion are rare. It is impossible to save a person afflicted with this malady except on the condition of his renouncing completely the ether habit, and this seldom happens. As a rule, an etheromaniac is never cured except by the impossibility of satisfying his passion. There is no ether remedy but confinement and the closest guarding at all times."

Like the morphinomaniaes, the slaves of ether may become addicted to their vice after certain maladies. Sometimes, when a patient suffers from headache, a handkerchief steeped in ether is put under his nose. (Relief comes quickly, After a few inhalations great freshness in the face and in the respiratory organs is felt. The dose is doubled in order to double the agreeable sensation, with the result that a delicious ecstac; is experienced, and gradually the habit is acquired and continues until at last an everdose results in death.

The origin of this singular vice i obscure. Some say that the Irish peasants began to drink ether in 1840, at th time when Father Matthew was preach ing the crusade against alcohol. Oth ers accuse the doctors of having pre-

## DOUBTS JONAH STORY.

A Theological Student Is Refused Ordination by the New York Prosbytery.

Jonah is in more trouble. Incidentally he has involved the New York Presbytery. Union Theological seminary. and William B. Bebb, says the New York correspondent of the Chicago Tribune. The question at issue is whether or not Jonah was swallowed by the whale. Mr. Bebb thinks he wasn't Therefore the presbytery refuses to license Mr. Bebb as a minister, and has appointed a committee to lead the erring Mr. Bebb to see that the prophet did actually have the alleged submarine experience.

Mr. Bebb studied at Union, was graduated, and went before the presbytery for examination as to fitness for the ministry. He declared he had doubts about the inspiration of the Bible from an historical standpoint, while he had confidence in its inspiration on religious matters. The presbytery asked for specific instances in which the Bible might be wrong. Bebb assailed Jonah. He evinced a due want of reverence for the whale, and thought it doubtful whether the fish had done what the Scriptures alleged he did.

The presbytery rejected him by 25 to 24 votes. Rev. Malcolm Shaw, of the West End church; Rev. Dr. Isaac M. Gregory, and Eider Francis Booth were appointed a committee to lead the young man to see his error. They hope to succeed later.

GOOD FOR COALING STATION. Nearly 2,700 Miles West of

A special from Honolulu says: The United States posseses an island sultable for a coaling and even for a naval station in the Pacific, nearly 2,700 miles west of Honolulu and in the very doorway of Manila.

It is known as Marcus of Weeks and is 2,700 miles from Hawaii, more than half way to the Philippines.

The island belongs to Capt. Foster, commander of a sailing vessel plying between the orient and San Francisco. They found it while out cruising and took possession. It was at that time unclaimed and unoccupied. By consent of James G. Blaine, then secretary of state, the American flag was hoisted over the island and still remains there, the same being safetioned by Great Britain, France and all the powers.

The island is in 24.4 north and 154.2 east. It is about five miles long and is densely covered with trees and shrubbery. It has a white, sandy beach and near the center is a knoll rising about 200 feet above the sea.

It is near the track of vessels from Honolulu to Yokohama and has been offered to the United States for a coaling station.

## RELIC OF FORT SUMTER

Section of Flagstaff Which Floated the Stars and Stripes When the Garrison Struck Its Colors.

In Gen. Corbin's office at the war department is a section of the flagstaff from which floated the stars and stripes ever Fort Sumter when the garrison stationed there struck its colors, April 14. 1861, and left the fort in possission of the confederates. The staff was of yellow pine and the piece in Gen. Cor bin's office is about one foot long and nearly the same size in diameter. It is bound with a brass hoop half an inch wide to prevent splitting, and where it is cracked the wood looks new, and 38 years' time has not made any ravages upon it. Maj. Robert Anderson was in command of the fort when it surrendered, and with his own hands hauled down the colors, but four years later, after he had won his spurs and ranked as a major general, he raised the flag on the same staff from which he had lowered it four years earlier. After the ceremonies attending the flag rasing were concluded the staff was divided into sections, and one sent to the war department, where it has since remained and is highly prized.
