### NOTICIA OFICIAL

ESTRANDEARIA.

Publicamos los cinco documentos oficiales que siguen a continuación, y que corresponden: oficio de remisión del general Santa Anna, acompañando una carta del general español Barradas, al Escmo. Sr. presidente; cuyo contenido es sumamente interesante: oficio del mismo Sr. Santa Anna sobre una solicitud de dos españoles que deseán permanecer en el país; y el oficio del expresado general en general, participando aviso de Pueblo-Viejo. Estos documentos y otros que se han retardado, llegaron anoche más ocho, y el gobierno ha dispuesto su publicación inmediatamente.

Número 1.

Ejército de operaciones.—Escmo Sr.— El brigadier español prisionero D. Isidro Barradas, me ha suplicado haga llegar á manos de S. E. el general presidente, el adjunto plego que remitió á V. E. para que se digne presentarlo al digno jefe de la Unión.

Dios y libertad. Cuartel general en Pueblo-Viejo, setiembre 19 de 1829.— Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.—Sr. secretario de estado y del despacho de guerra y marina.

Número 2.

Escmo. Sr.—Csiguiente á la capitulación que se celebrado con el Escmo. Sr general D. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, me embarco en este punto para el de Nueva-Orleans, como puerto más próximo y que ofrece la ventaja de proporcionar transportes y víveres con mayor celeridad, para reembocar las tropas de mi mando con destino á sus cuarteles de la Habana.

Los medios de subsistencia que dejo á mi tropa, alcanzarán exactamente para un mes; y no pudiendo asegurar el tiempo fijo en que podré regresar, si, como no espero, llegase el caso de verse apurada la situación, he de depender de la generosidad de V. E. se sirva comunicar las órdenes necesarias para que las autoridades de los campamentos á que han sido destinadas de tanta; subvencionen lo que necesitaran. En la seguridad de que las autoridades de la isla de Cuba, pagaran á la vista las leyes que se giren á su cargo, de los desembolsos que se hagan en el país á mis tropas.

La ilustración del siglo y la buena hospitalidad, demandan este auxilio, á lo que no dudo se prestará honradez de V. E.

A esta fecha estará V. E. informado de la conducta que se observado, así como la división de mi mando, en el territorio que he ocupado. Cuando se ha tratado de pelear, he combatido como un soldado, respetando á los rendidos y al habitante inerte; y cuando las circunstancias me han obligado, he capitulado con honor, fiando en la buena fe con que sabrá cumplir la generosidad mexicana, de que voy recibiendo ya las pruebas mas inequívocas.

Dios guarde á V. E. muchos años, Tampico de Tamaulipas, 18 de setiembre de 1829.—Isidro Barradas.—Escmo. Sr. Dn. Vicente Guerrero, presidente del Gobierno mexicano.

Habana, 30 de Octubre.

Carta particular.  
La indignación y el odio del partido realista contra el general Barradas, es cada dia mayor; no les habia metido en la cuba, que la reconquista de Méjico, estaba hecha con los 3,600 hombres (a) Los mas desesperados e inconsolables, son las familias que habian mandado sus parientes voluntariamente, casi todos han perecido. (b) No se permite á nadie hablar del resultado de la expedición, por que la policía anda muy activa. (c) Los generales Vives y Laborde, como el teniente Pinillos, están locos de contento, (d) por haber sacrificado al brigadier Barradas (e) y conseguido sus miras.

En que vaya ocurriendo lo participare á V. E. sin demora.

Lo incluyen á V. E. el prospecto del Español que va á publicarse nuevamente en la Nueva-Orleans desde el primero de diciembre próximo; lealo V. con cuidado, y sobre todo, el artículo editorial. Uno de los editores, ó el único, llegó ayer á bordo de la escuadra del Sr. La borde.

(a) Con esto dan á conocer los talentos y conocimientos que hay entre los que componen el partido realista, es decir, el que desea la esclavitud de los pueblos.

(b) Bien merecida les está la suerte que les ha cabido, á ver si sale de la tapatía en que están.

(c) Así se conserva la ignorancia y despotismo, en lo que tienen grande interés las autoridades de la Habana.

(d) Con tal derrota harán valer las autoridades de la Habana, con su amo Fernando 7º las razones que habian tenido para oponerse á la expedición; con lo que aseguran mas sus plazas, que es lo que desean, para continuar sus intrigas y manejos.

(e) Solo la ineptitud e ignorancia de Barradas, podia aconsejar semejante expedición.

UNITED MEXICAN STATES.—The Editors of the *Correo* have published in an extra the following documents which they give as original.

To his excellency the secretary of state for the War and Navy department.

Excellent Sir,

The Spanish prisoner Brigadier general Don Isidro Barradas solicits me to transmit to his Excellency the President the following letter, which I send you for that purpose.

God and Liberty.—Head Quarters of Nuevo Viejo, Sept. 19th. 1829.

ANTONIO LOPEZ DE SANTA ANNA.

Nº 2

To his Excellency Don Vicente Guerrero President of the Mexican Government.

Excellent Sir,

Conformably to the capitulation I signed with his excellency Gen. Don Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, I will here embark for New-Orleans as being the nearest place and as the one which offers me the more promptly procuring of transports and of provisions for the re-embarkment of the troops under my orders and to conduct them to Havana, their place of destination.

The means of subsistence which I shall leave my troops will suffice for one month, but as I cannot foresee the exact moment of my return, and as it might, much to my regret, happen that they would become short of necessities, I would in that case beg of your Excellency that you should give orders to the authorities of the place where they are quartered to allow whatever may be necessary, under the guarantee of the Government of the Island of Cuba who will pay at sight bills drawn on them for the expenses incurred by my troops in this country. The civilization and hospitality of the age claim this generosity, and I have no doubt that your Excellency will hasten to satisfy my request.

Your Excellency is without doubt acquainted with the conduct I have shown and also of that of the division under my command. When it was necessary to combat I fought as a soldier and respected the vanquished and also the inoffensive citizen, and when circumstances obliged me to capitulate I did so with honor confiding in the good faith and generosity with which the Mexicans will no doubt fulfill the conditions which I stipulated. Already have I experienced most unequivocal proofs of that generosity. May god preserve your Excellency for many years.

From the Atakapas Gazette.

We are authorized and requested to announce General JOHN B. DAWSON, of West Feliciana, as a candidate for Governor of the State of Louisiana, at the next election. Without pledging ourselves to support his pretensions, we would observe that we consider the General a good patriot, an honest man—and one whose zeal in the discharge of his public duties entitle him to high consideration. When all the candidates are before the people we intend giving an opinion as to the qualifications and pretensions of each.

From Lisbon papers of the 19th August, and letters as late as the 9th ultimo, we learn that Don Miguel had been proclaimed and acknowledged at Damaro, in the East Indies, in November last, and that an officer had been despatched thence to carry this intelligence to the Captain General of the Portuguese East Indian possessions, at Goa.

The Portuguese army has been considerably reduced. The Court of Spain having resolved to acknowledge Don Miguel as King of Portugal, credentials had been sent to the Count de Figueira, at Madrid, who was to present himself as his Most Faithful Majesty's Envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary. New preparations were making at Lisbon for the reduction of Terceira. Don Miguel is said to shew great activity and resolution. He attends in person the sittings of the courts of justice and visits the various departments, the arsenals, navy-yards, &c. It is added that he walks abroad, generally without attendants, and that his count is distinguished by decorum and order. Anec-

dotes are related of his generosity and confidence. It is well to hear both sides of a question of character. We merely state what we find written.

The Ohio State Journal says—“However strong may be the wishes of Mr. Clay to remain in a private station, the indications that he will be called by the public voice, to repair the evils which the present administration are bringing upon the country, as well as to fix the foreign national interest connected with the American System of Internal Improvements and Domestic Manufactures upon a firm and solid basis, are too unequivocal to admit of a doubt, and if his valuable life be spared, nothing short of a miracle can prevent his succeeding the present incumbent, on the 4th of March, 1833.”

*Simple Method of Preserving Fruits.*—When the fruit has been well plucked, and is not too ripe, it is placed in common bottles, which must be entirely filled. The bottles to be corked, and then to be placed upright in a vessel filled with water, which is to be heated gradually, until it requires a temperature which the hand can bear. This degree of heat is to be kept up half an hour, the bottles are then to be withdrawn one, and are to be filled to within an inch of the cork with boiling water; they are then to be hermetically sealed, and should be placed on one side, so that the cork is kept wet, to prevent the fruit from fermenting or becoming mouldy. The bottles are to be turned once or twice a week during the first and second months, and once or twice afterwards in each succeeding month. Fruit heated in this manner will keep more than two years. The heat should not be strong enough to burst the fruit.—Biblioth. Physico-Econom.

*PROTESTANTISM IN FRANCE.*—We understand that Baron Cuvier, Director of the affairs of the Protestant Church in France, has obtained permission of the Government for the establishment of 20 new pastors, some of whom will exercise their ministry in a great number of churches, the extent of which render the duty excessively laborious to the present pastors. The others are to duty at Oratories, in places where the number of Protestants has greatly increased. The creation of six new oratories gives an official existence to the churches in those places, and secures to their ministers a pecuniary allowance from the State. These churches are established at St. Etienne (Loire), Clermont Ferrand (Puy de Dome), Dijon (Cote d'Or), and St. Die (Vosges). The places of pastors are distributed among the consistories where the deficiency of ministers presented the greatest inconveniences, including the consistories of the Rhone, the Ardeche, the Drôme, and the Upper Alps.
