NEW ORLEANS SATURDAY, JUNE 30, 1829.

The negro-wench named Phoebe, who murdered her mistress Madame Leonard, on Tuesday last, was yesterday condemned to be hung. The execution will take place on Friday next.

Three persons named Farmer, Dickson and Ford, were arrested on Wednesday afternoon, accused of having severely beaten with a stick two men, one of whom, from the consequences of the blows he had received, has since died at the Hospital. From the depositions made at the Mayor's office the accused have been sent to prison to stand their trial in the Criminal Court.

Another Patriot of the Revolution gone!—Col. ALLEN McLANE, Collector of the Port of Wilmington, and the honoured father of our Minister to England, died at Wilmington about sunset on Friday, in the 83d year of his age.

The deceased was born on the 6th of August, 1746. He joined the army at the commencement of the Revolution, full of ardour and patriotic sentiment, which he illustrated by deeds of intrepidity, and enterprise and talents, that secured to him the regard of his compatriots, and the particular confidence and esteem of the Commander-in-Chief.

Through along life he preserved unsullied the bright reputation required in his revolutionary career, and as his days were long and prosperous, so his last moments were tranquil and full of hope.

If to such men, we owe much for their actual achievements in the time of our national struggles for independence, do we not owe yet more to the abiding influence of their political and moral example upon present and succeeding generations?

From the New-York American. Launch.—The ship Erie, intended as a regular packet between this port and Havre, to be commanded by Capt. James Funck, will be launched this afternoon at half past four o'clock, from C. Bergh & Co's Yard.

Specie.—The Albany Daily Advertiser states that several boxes of specie were brought to this city, on Saturday last, from Schenectady, to which place they were brought from the West, in canal boats—and then asks the question—“Are the southern banks pressing their western brethren?”

An association has been formed in Alabama, for suppressing abuses in electioneering. The members have pledged themselves not to vote for any person for any office, who will ride through the country to electioneer for himself, and treat with spiritous liquors to procure votes.

MINISTERS TO LONDON AND PARIS. We understand, that our Ministers will probably sail about the 1st of July. The intention of the Government is to send out Messrs McLane and Rives in the same vessel—the Constellation. She is now at Norfolk, and ordered to be put in immediate readiness for that service.—Richmond Enquirer.

British Debt.—We some time since noticed the generous donation of 60 sterling made by a gentleman in London towards the reduction of the National Debt. A friend of ours has made a calculation to show of how far this sum would go towards its liquidation. The debt is 900,000,000. The average interest paid is said to be about 4 per cent.

The interest per annum is 40,000,000. 0s. 0d. per day is 109,589. 0s. 10d. per hour is 4,566. 4s. 2d. per minute is 76. 0s. 0d. per second is 1. 5s. 4d.

So that the donation would not pay the interest for five seconds of time—not long enough for the commissioner to write a receipt for the money, but allowing him barely time to say, “please to accept His Majesty's thanks.”—Portsmouth Adv.

From the New Haven Advertiser. Three British vessels arrived a few months since at Montevideo bound on three several exploring expeditions.—England has gained great profit as well as reputation from her frequent and timely voyages of discovery. Her ships have almost invariably been the first to visit and examine the mysterious lands the merchant ship falls upon in her adventurous voyage. Her Admiralty is ever on the alert, to trace out the new channels of trade indicated by some half told discovery and her ships are hastened forth to procure charts of the new coasts and a detail of products to assist the enterprising navigator in a

England has acquired by this policy vast colonial possessions yielding immense resources, which she controls to the undivided benefit of her traders. Her empire in the East, her trade with Canton (no longer however exclusive) the stopping and watering places at St. Helena and Good Hope which render her independent of the caprice of other governments, have all been acquired, if not by original discovery at least, by adopting the knowledge of other nations and perfecting it by the well directed employment of her navy on exploring expeditions. By constant attention she has succeeded in converting to her own emolument the commercial advantages which follow in the track of Dutch and Portuguese enterprise. She has perfected their exploring system, and acquired to herself praise from the man of traffic and the man of science, from the speculator and regular practical merchant.

We have been led to these remarks by observing that England with a perfect and consistent quietness has determined to survey for herself the new island in the South Sea, which, as discovered by our hardy Stonington seamen, we had considered as our own peculiar field of exertion.

But whether achieved by us or by the English, we delight to trace the progress towards a more perfect knowledge of “this Globe we inhabit.” There are infinite mysteries in Nature which torture the curious and impatient yet to be solved. There seems now to be some chance of obtaining information of the character of the regions round the poles—whether water or land—whether admitting approach or repelling the foot of the investigator—and with the aid of the chemist at home of the nature of magnetism, electricity and light the disclosures of which seem reserved for the Ultima Thule of the very point of Poles.

[From the Charleston Patriot.] The New York Legislature has been industrious at its late session, and if the quality of its legislation is any way equal to its quantity, it must be able to stand a parallel with any assemblage of collective wisdom in the world. 365 acts! one for every day in the year, have been passed in this body. But when we recollect that the absurd bank scheme, submitted by Judge Forman, has become part and parcel of the law designed for the security of the good people of that state, and the commercial benefit of its great metropolis, we do not think that intelligence is always in exact proportion with zeal and industry in public bodies.

The Barbadoes Globe of the 23d March, notifies that the American Consul at St. Bartholomew's, Mr. Harrison, had received orders from his Government, to send home to the United States, all American seamen who had been thrown ashore at that place by privateers, in a distressed and destitute condition—and a like course is recommended by the Antigua Free Press to the British Government towards the destitute Seamen of that nation, lest they should be represented as Americans, be sent to the United States by the American Consul—and at so distant date—be found fighting under the flag of a nation whose rapidly increasing power renders it probable that she may at no very distant date, dispute with us the empire of the sea.

THE CATHOLIC QUESTION.—It is fifty years since the Catholic Question was first agitated in the English House of Commons. It was brought forward by the late Mr. Fox on the 18th of March 1779, and was passed by a large majority on the 18th March, 1829, being precisely half a century.

Steam Engine.—We were yesterday very much gratified with the exhibition of a steam engine the work of Philip Ten Eyck, a young gentleman, whom we are proud to claim as a native of our city. This engine is on a very small scale, but perfect in all its parts, and is, with a slight variation, similar in principle with that of the engine of the steamboat North America. It will make, when under a full head of steam, 350 revolutions in the minute and its friction is so trifling, that the engine can be put in motion by merely blowing through the steam pipe. Mr. Ten Eyck has been brought up to the profession of Medicine, but has always exhibited a taste for mechanics, and we are well satisfied that with ordinary perseverance he will acquire an eminence as a mechanist that will be creditable to himself and an honor to his country.

How to AVOID BAD DEBTS. In Carver, Mass. Mr. E.—carriers on a furnace on a large scale, employs about thirty men, but furnishes no spirits. He is a merchant, and refuses to trade at all in ardent spirits. When interrogated by a friend, why he did not as formerly sell spiritous liquors, he

In looking over my books, I find that when I subtract the run bill from the account against poor debtors they owe me nothing.” Capt. N. E.—of Middleborough, gave me a similar account: all bad debts, he said, were against the rum drinking population.—Vt. Chron.
