It was a well timed demonstration on the part of Mr Huskisson of his ability to serve the Duke, and the inability of the Duke to dispense with his services. We are much mistaken, too, if this is not going the right way to work.

Paris, June 20.—We find in the Semaphore of Marseilles:—"The English steamer George IV. has received orders to proceed to Algiers with the utmost dispatch. It is said to be charged with an important mission, relating to the expedition."

The 17th regiment of chasseurs will make the campaign on foot. On the 6th, when the fleet was still at Palma, a great number of dead horses were thrown into the sea; the few remaining were to be employed in the artillery service.—The point at which the French army landed, was mounted with batteries; a map recently published marks five; there must have been a greater number, as Sidi Ferrach may be considered the mercantile port of the Algerine capital: an attack on that side striking the Regency to the heart; it is therefore probable that the most powerful means of defence were directed on that point.
