Kansas City, always an aspiring and progressive city, is promoting a new method of adding to the city's industries.

The Kansas City plan will not only help the city grow, but will keep the people of that town from wasting their money in profitless concerns and blue sky investments.

"I estimate that 2 million dollars went out of Kansas City the last year in investments of unsafe and questionable character," said H. A. Fitch, president of the Kansas City Industrial Corporation.

The main points regarding the Kansas City Industrial Corporation are brought out in the following catechism which is being circulated among business men:

- Q. How will the stock sell and be paid for? A. Stock sells for \$10 a share. Payments may be made over a period of five years.

ONLY TO BE EXPECTED

While the reports that the Liberty loan has been oversubscribed are gratifying, it was only to be expected. Indeed any other result would have been attended with the most disastrous consequences to the United States.

The Liberty loan was not a Democratic measure, or a Republican measure. The plan was devised by the treasury department to raise money for the prosecution of the war.

The security back of the Liberty loan is the total wealth of the United States, estimated at close to 200 billion dollars, or one hundred times the amount of the present issue.

The manner in which the bond issue was distributed throughout the country, and among the various classes, has insured an equal absorption of the issue that is calculated not to disturb business conditions in any section.

It has been only a little over two months since America entered the war, but nearly one-third of the financing necessary for a year of war has been completed.

People of the United States have made a splendid response to the first call from the government for funds with which to conduct the war.

Huntington, L. L., June 16.—William Ross has an income and a section of his home all to himself, and as he gives his wife the major part of his income he does not see what reason she has to bother him.

Mrs. Ross swore to a complaint before the justice that her husband did not work and support her. The justice issued the summons and Ross explained that he did not like to work. He would rather read, so he stays up until the small hours, sleeps until about noon, and takes the afternoon recreation.

He has part of the house set off as a library into which neither she nor their nine-year-old child ever goes. Ross explained that he had an income of \$50 a month. Out of this, he said, he gave his wife \$15 a month, and has the rest for himself. The justice took a month to think it over.
