At last we have received positive accounts of the Italian insurgents. As soon as it was known that Francis d'Est had crossed the Po, with his troops, in order to reduce its ancient capital, the guards and the national troops rallied under the command of the brave General Zucchi, who marched to meet the lenemy. The Duke, not-withstanding the essistance of several hundred Austrians, disguised as soldiers of the Duke's and of a squadron of Hungarians transformed into dragoous, could not withstand the patriots, and was obliged to throw himself upon Carpi. Every thing, at the departure of the courier, in-dicated that the town of Carpi would seize this epportunity to avenge itself of the unjust detena of Menotti, to whom the inhabitants were much devetal. The whole population ran to arms, and then the plan had been agreed upon to keep up a partizan war in the mountainous part of the country, in case of an invasion by the Ametrians.

It appears that the new revolution in Spain progresses rapidly. Since the 28th of February Don Salvador Mansanares, overruns the unity, supported by the inhabitants, and is oined by a great number of Spaniards and soldiers of the line; on his entry into the town of Barois, his column of troops was overwhelmed with joyful acclamations. The commander in f the camp, had despatched a column to meet the most advanced of the patriots, but they were completely routed. General Mansanares is now engaged in a manœuvre of which the above action of the 28th, will serve as a basis, and at the time the letter bringing this intelligence was despatched, the holy names of 'independence and liberty' resounded from the mouth of the Ebro to the Guadiana.




