The attention of the public is called to the law of this State, relative to Physicians, Apothecaries, and Practitioners of Midwifery.

Not long since a list of names was published in some of the daily papers of this city, purporting to contain the names of those Physicians, Apothecaries and Practitioners of Midwifery, who had been licenced by the Eastern Medical Board, to practise their several professions, according to a law passed by the Legislature of this State in 1840, entitled "an actrelative to the Medical Board of the Eastern District of the State of Louisians." This list was signed by order of the Board, by Mr. Bertrand, Secretary, and at the same time, a warning was given to all those who had not complied with the law, by appearing before the said Board and obtaining from them a license. Thirty days were allowed to the delinquents to amend their ways; after that the law would expend its full vengence upon their devoted heads. laimed residence at Alexandria, and obtained from he Western Board a legal licence to practice in the

the Western Board a legal licence to practice in the State.

Shortly afterwards my name appeared in the Picayune newspaper, by order of Mr. Bertrand, as a legally licensed Physician of the State. I was soon after waited upon by Mr. Bertrand, who wished to obtain from me my licence, in order to lay it before the Eastern Board. I declined giving it to him; and very soon arother request was made to me, to the same effect, by Mr. Bertrand, through a messenger, when I again flechined to comply with his request. Not knowing what the Eastern Board could want with my licence, or what members of that Board had such curiosity to see a license granted by the Western Board, (which was no new thing under the sum I called on Mr. Bertrand, and with considerable difficulty learned from him and Mr. Massey, another members of the Board who was present, the name of the gentleman who in particular manifested so much anaxiety to see my licence. They will also in their turn be exposed to prosecution for transcending and abosing the power given them by the law.

Those persons who are prosecuted will, we are certain, have the constitutionality of the law fairly tested, by carrying it to the highest tribunal, if necessary.

The editors of the Medical Journal says, it is proposed to amend the present law, by aboushing the Western Medical Board, and subjecting all practitioners who do not then obtain a license from the Board in this city to impressment. This is indeed a proposition worthy of the darker ages, when chains any prisons accomplished what reason and sound argument was unable to effect. Such a proposition is disgraceful in the extreme, and will meet with the detestation and contempt of all reflecting minds.

Those gentlemen must be short-sighted indeed, ever to suppose that the public will be so blind as not to preceive the achishness that actuates those would be law makers. WASHINGTON, August 27, 14th

I learn that the Cabinet council was held yesterday on the subject of our relations with Mexico, and expensity in reference to the recent demonstrations of the Santa Anna party; and that it was determined to take no further steps, diplomatic or belingerent, in regard to Mexico, until the result of the revolution shall be known.

The flects are to remain mactive, and Gen. Taylor is to continue to menace an envasion, until the Santa Anna government shall be established.

If uplomacy should then fait, the war at to be commenced in earnest.

Persons unconnected with the navy, but who are acquainted with the topography and hylography of the Mexican coast, are to be employed, and have already been consulted in reference to some efficient navial operations.

Some have imagined that the Government is in league with Santa Anna; that he, in fair, goes to Mexico as an agent or alley of the United States, to conquer or buy a peace, at a cheaper rate than we are takely to obtain it ourselves. I discrebit it entirely. The Union has repeatedly denied that this Government was connected with the Mexican faction and I do not see how, with any propriety, it could be so connected.
