Pennsylvania.—"I am now satisfied that the choice are more than equal that the vote of Pennsylvania will be given for Mr. Adams and Mr. Rush." So says a distinguished citizen of that state, who has long mingled in its politics, and thoroughly understands its population; who is not himself an office-seeker, and who some six weeks ago held a contrary opinion as to the probable result of the vote of that state. This opinion, confirmed to us from many other sources, and justified, as we apprehend, by the many signal and acknowledged changes that have occurred in the sentiments of individuals and communities of Pennsylvania, respecting the character and policy—if he should be elected—of Gen. Jackson, cannot but give energy to the friends of the good cause in this state, and induce them to every exertion in its behalf. We have been over-crowded; let us show when the struggle comes, that we are not over-matched. The same confidence; the same dashing bets; the same assurance, from the Chief that "the election was already matter of history," were heard at the last election; and Mr. Crawford was pronounced irresistible by the very men that now pronounce, with no other or better foundation in truth, General Jackson to be so. It is only marvellous that the prophets, whom the result of that election so entirely discredited, should venture forth so soon, and, with such unabashed assurance, again to claim the public attention and confidence; and it is still more remarkable that men of reflection and steadiness should be found willing to listen to and confide in such vain boasting and false prophecies.

How far however these same individuals can reconcile it to their notions of self respect, veracity and value of personal character, to indulge, as many of them notoriously do, in statements and predictions, uttered with all the apparent zeal and sincerity of truth—which, nevertheless, they know not to be true—in a matter worthy of their consideration, and which, whether they consider or not, those who hear and remember, will consider, and henceforth appreciate their authors and propagators accordingly.

Mean time let each and every friend of the Administration use his unremitting efforts to insure success, as though the result depended upon his individual efforts, and then we must succeed.

Non Consumption of the South.—The resolutions which have been entered into by the citizens of South Carolina and Georgia, to avoid the consumption of articles, the produce or manufacture of Kentucky, and other States friendly to the Tariff, seem to be put in practice, so far with persevering firmness. The following instance of it, we copy from a late Charleston Mercury:—Nat. Intel. Extract of a letter from a gentleman near Camden.
 "You may be, perhaps amused to hear that, some days back, a wagon from Kentucky, loaded with bacon, arrived at Camden. No inducement could prevail upon the inhabitants to purchase a single pound of it. They were told they could have it at four cents, if they would take it. They would not take it upon any terms. The wagoners said they should be taxed, if they were

compelled to take their bacon back. They were told it could not be helped. They then showed all the way to the Springs, and offered their bacon to Mr. C. who would not purchase upon any terms."

Extract from a letter dated Charleston, September 24.
 "The stock of rice in market just now is barely sufficient to supply the West India demand and prices thereof, too high to attempt shipments at present. The present crop of this article will be more abundant than for many former years; Cotton, upwards will exceed that of the best of the season, and during the remainder of the season, sales, 9 to 10 cents. Our exports for the year ending to-day is estimated at 25,000 bales, but it will be ascertained more exactly in a few days."

From the N. Y. Evening Post of Oct. 6. LAURET FROM FRANCE.
 By the packet ship France, capt. Funk from Havre, whence she sailed on the 3th of Sept. Paris papers have been received to the 4th of that month.
 It is now to be very certain that the Russians have met with greater resistance than they expected in the attempt to reduce the fortified cities north of the Balkan mountains. Varna has been reinforced by additional troops from Constantinople, and Shumla yet remains in the hands of the Turks. An article from Odessa of the 13th August, says the decisive attack on Shumla was not intended to be made until the 22nd, when the emperor expected a reinforcement of 85,000 men. Whether there be any truth in this report or not, it shows the idea entertained of the strength of the place. An article of an earlier date the 10th of August, says that the avowal of the Czar at that place on the 8th had given rise to various rumours. One of these was, that a truce of three weeks had been concluded between the two armies, and this was generally believed. The Turkish army concentrated at Shumla, is said to amount to between 120,000 and 140,000 men, and daily reinforcements continue to arrive. It is added that that town and its outposts which are extended three German miles, are defended by 1,100 pieces of cannon, and that Hussein Pacha had succeeded in exciting their religious fanaticism, and with it their courage and intrepidity, to the highest pitch.

Accounts from Corfu say, that Ibrahim Pacha was still in the Morea and showed no disposition to quit it. He had been supplied with provisions from Zante and Egypt. The Albanians part of his army had deserted, and had succeeded in detaching from his cause their countrymen who held one of the fortresses of Lepanto. It is said that the English and French admirals have threatened to blockade Alexandria if the Morea be not evacuated in one month.
 Letters from Lisbon to the 20th of August, represent the country in the greatest confusion and disorder. Registers have been opened at the various prisons for the insertion of the names of such as came to speak to the prisoners. In this way the arrested are deprived of the consolation of being visited by their friends, who are themselves deterred by the dread of imprisonment.

VIENNA, Aug. 25.
 It was rumoured yesterday, that the Russians had taken Varna.
 Accounts from Constantinople, to the 10th of Aug. state that the Grand Vizier was about to depart for Adrianople, accompanied by the commissioners who made the convention of Ackerman. The object was said to be, to treat for peace.

IONIAN ISLES, July 23.
 We have received intelligence that 25 vessels from Alexandria, laden with provisions and troops have arrived at Navarino. Ibrahim Pacha is it stated, has sent troops into the interior of the Morea to cut the grain and carry off cattle, and that they have carried devastation every where and massacred some Greeks. On the receipt of this news the English and French Vice Admirals set out on the 19th, with all the vessels under their command, for Navarino.

Extract of a letter from Leghorn, dated July 22d, 1828.
 The crops of grain throughout Italy are short. It is estimated that nine millions of bushels of grain will be required for Tuscany alone. "The supplies have heretofore been received from Odessa, but the Russian armies will require all there, and if even the war was brought to a close, there will not be a supply more than sufficient for the year, and the new crop cannot come forward before the spring. Other large armies are collecting with a view no doubt to check the strides of Nicholas."
