The enemy advanced during the night as far as Rapidan bridge, on the railroad, and threw a column down as low as Raccoon Ford. Yesterday morning picket fighting began early, and was continued by the dishounted cavalry acting as sharpshooters.

Towards night Major Flournoy, with the Sixth Virginia cavairy, was ordered to make a demonstration on the enemy, but no orders were given him to fight them. Major F. formed his regiment and darted off. In a short time he had charged them three times most gailantly, driving before him a whole brigade of the enemy and capturing five prisoners, and but for the hour being late and near dark, and our own artiliary playing upon our men by mistake as they advanced, a large number of prisoners would have been secured.
