ANNEXATION OF TEXAS TO THE UNITED STATES.

In our paper of yesterday we viewed this subject its relations towards the general interests of the U nited States: we now propose to consider it as it beat upon the state of Louisiana. It is not without besit: tion that we enter upon this delicate subject. Impor tant considerations, differing in their nature, rendthe subject complicated to such a degree that it would to discuss it as it deserves, require both a large space and longer meditation. We shall bazard the utterance of our opinion, which is based on convi on, and, without pretending to impose it upon or readers, we merely present it as a means of forming induction on a subject like this, and that the examp of the Floridas can throw no light on the effects to

The territory of Texas, vast as it is, well water and fruitful, is inferior to Louisiana in some respecamong which internal navigation holds the first ran' The mighty river, which passes through the latte places it on an equal footing with the most extensi and the richest countries in the world, and its name rous branches are so many veins by which our pro-ductions are circulated. It is not thus with Texas however well watered that territory may be, its rive and this circumstance alone paralyses in a great mer-sure its resources. This advantage brings to Louis ana a mass of emigration, augmenting every year, at ; in this respect she has nothing to apprehend from

The soil of Texas is adapted to the culture of the cane, but her territory is not settled, and in fact, po sesses no means of establishing a system of indust which could injure Louisians by its rivalry; partice larly when we reflect what a length of years it requied for our planters to arrive at any thing like a sati factory result. A soil susceptible of the cane culture is not the only thing necessary to success: such a . is not wanting in Florida, and it has never given at § disturbance to Louisiana. It will be the same thing i Texas. A great planting industry can arise only in country abounding in capital: it will never leave country in which it has grown up, to take root in desert, where a thousand unforseen causes may : rest it progress. But an obstacle of a very differen nature arises against the idea of rapid prosperity ( disturb the planters of this state, which is the difficuty of procuring hands sufficient to carry on the raisin of sugar cans, even on a small scale. The inhab-tants of the slave states will not dispose of their except at exorbitant prices, while the demand for their is so great, and daily increasing by the measures take by the nations of Europe and by America herself suppress the slave trade. To what cause are we to attribute this wonderful ninoscess which characterizes the government of the United States; and which places it the equal of the proudest powers? It doubtless arises in the first place from the wisdom of our institutions, and from that spirit of liberalisms which actuates the great body of the nt of normalism which actuates the great body or the nation. It is this which enlightens them to their real wants and inserests, and forms the elements of the greatness and prosperity of the country. The excellence of our institutions arises naturally from the happy system of economy which does not establish the ublic expenses upon the revenue, but the revenue pon the expenditures. It is thus, the people, whose tributions are nearly about what is necessary, enjoy the fruits of their industry; and are encouraged to yield up all their energies in the prosecution of works which enrich the country, and serve as the substantial basis

of its splendour and power.

A tariff, which is acrupulously founded upon the reources of anation, that is, a traiff which will give the greaten activity possible to the exporting and importing trade, is the chief source of the prosperity of a country, let its form of government be what it may.—

And, when the equilibrium is perfectly established between these two branches of commerce, to imagine hat a reduction ad infinitum, upon the amount of dut on foreign produce, will inevitably result in a greater sum of happiness for the bedy of the people, one must be influenced by the strongest political anomaly which ever entered the head of a legislator, a philosopher of statesman. This snormaly is more palpable in such a country as the United States, which is susceptible of producing ell products, by the fertility of the soil as well as the variety of the climate; and whose inhabit. ants are endowed with such an indomitable spirit of observation and perseverance which makes them capable of undertaking every enterprize with success. t would be to destroy all that nature had done for her, and murder the rising industry of the population, to

admit gratuitously or too liberally, foreign produce.
In a word, the United States government lacks nothing as regards either form or administration; but it is not thus with the territorial industry. Many years of assidious labor are required to develope and improve our agricultural resources. It is only gradually that mechanics and the liberal arts are perfected.— Agriculture itself, which seems the domain of the first settler, draws its greatest riches from the experience rather than from the genius or activity of the cultiva

We shall now proceed to speak of manufactures and it is necessary to premise, that in order for them to obtain the importance desired, a still greater lapse of time is required, by reason of the population, which is not sufficiently dense; and when labor, as a natural consequence, is at too high a price. When we take this into consideration, and the high value of several articles indispensable to manufacturing establishments once be convinced that an inconsiderate reduction the tariff will have the effect of blasting the agricultu ral and manufacturing interests; and will retard for a long time, the period when these two important bran-ches of public industry will be able to sustain a competition with foreign products, and find an advantageous market wherever we may establish commercial rela-

It is easy to see, from the arguments which have been used, and which, in our opinion, are conclusive, that the government of the United States, even if it had no need of a revenue proportioned to the expenditures necessary for the increase of the mavy, for fortificanecessary for the increase of the navy, for fortifications, to recruit the army, and to provide for all internal improvements of national importance, ought to reflect seriously before it touches the tariff. It is then after mature reflection, and we ardently hope it may so eventuate, on the destiny of each individual state, and having scrupulously examined what ought to be done, to obtain such a result, that we can decide in this matter; while we sincerely believe, that at this time, any reduction of the tariff would be premature, and rather tend to arcest the progress of American industry, than to relieve the people by diminishing the amount of duties on importation.

Whatever may be the predence and honesty which the councils of the nation may possess, results must be produced from the preposed reduction, injurious to the welfare and prosperity of source than one section of the union.

Aware of all the difficulties which it offers, we have refrained from entering into minute particulars, for fear of accuming a burden which we could not bear; here we have treated the question superficially and in a general manner, leaving the details to the wisdom of Congress. We have, nevertheless, however brief we have been, left some marks on a read that is difficult to travel, which may of use to those who, from their official station, will be obliged to travel over the whole route.-The enlightened press of other states will aid us in our endeavors to enlighten the members of the govern-ment in relation to the real wants of the country.— Identified in a manner with these wants, it ab raise its voice on a measure, which, if adopted with precipitation, may compromit forever the brilliant destinies of the American republic.
