The journal shall continue to be published under the same title by Messrs. G. BAXON, DAWER & DECKER, who have made arrangements in order that the paper be delivered as usual to such subscribers who have paid in advance, or to those who have not given notice to discontinue their subscription—the new Editors fully impressed with the importance of the responsibility they have taken upon themselves, will use new exertions, by improving the typographical part of their paper, as well as by a more particular attention to the English side of it, which had in some manner been neglected—to deserve a continuation of past favors, they have ordered from the North a complete assortment of the newest types, which will enable them in about two months to enlarge the size of their paper, and print it on six columns.

In a commercial city of such importance as New Orleans, the principal object of the editor of a commercial paper is to render himself as useful as possible to merchants—with this view, the editors having observed that, but one evening paper was published in this city, have concluded to make their's an evening paper, as soon as they will receive the types to enable them to enlarge its size. By publishing in the evening, the paper will contain a shipping list of all the arrivals and departures of the day and night previous, which is undoubtedly very advantageous to merchants; as it will not in the least impair the political and literary part.

The Bee not being formerly entirely devoted to commercial interests, the former editors had not availed themselves of all the advantages of their extended correspondence with the northern cities, France, England, Mexico, etc. but hereafter nothing shall be neglected, insofar that lead, and that correspondence added to the best papers of the principal commercial cities, will afford to the editors the means of giving correct intelligence of such transactions in foreign markets as might be interesting to the merchants of New Orleans.

Such are the principal changes and improvements intended by the new proprietors of this paper, which has never pretended to enter in competition against its powerful rivals, but by the moderation and liberality of its principles, and on that account has deserved the patronage of the public. The editorial part of the Bee being still confined to the same person, the independent principles which have always been advocated in its columns during the greatest heat of political discussions, shall continue to be the motto of the Editors, but as faithful sentinels of the public and of our sacred institutions—they will never hesitate upon all necessary occasions, to take an independent stand in favor of the rights of the people—they will not be the less ready to scrutinize at all times the official conduct of any public officer who might be wanting in the performance of his duties.
