### GAS LIGHTS.

The present mode of lighting the city is very objectional blo-first, because the lamps throw a glare in the middle of the streets, that rather impedes travellers in carriages and on horseback, than aids thom. And next, because upon the principle of reflection applied to distance, the present lights s nearly exhausted before it reaches the side walks. If any one will bear this in mind, and tax his memory, he will remember, that on rainy nights, when our gutters are overflowing, he has generally mistaken the gutters for the side walks, and in jumping to clear them, popped right into them. This would not be so, if the gas lamps or any other lamps, were on the side walks, instead of being suspended in air, at a distance of, 20 to 30 feet from the spot it ought to light. Place a lanip at every corner, and two in the middle of each square, and you will then light the sidewalks and the buildings; the reflection of the lamps and the reflection from the buildings combined, would give treble the light even in the middle of the streets, to what we have at present; though what we have is immediately descending from the present city lamps.
