It has been supposed that lands extending more than 10 acres from the river could not extending more than 10 acres from the river could not, be reclaimed: this has been proved erronecus. A simple rotary wheel propelled by a small engine of only 6 horse power, has been found more than adequate te reclaim 100 acres; and it has been placed 45 arto reclaim 100 acres; and it has been placed 45 arpents from the river—all the intermediate space being thoroughly drained and rendered aroble; althous for the engine was used, the whole land was covered some two or three inches with water.

The ongine has been occasionally in use for only a few months; yet so great have been its beneficial effects, that the land reclaimed this year bears now a vary aromising cape of super capes and corn. The

very promising crop of sugar canes and com. The engine and the work of construction cost about 1900 dollars; the crop of the present year alone has been valued by a moderate estimate at \$25,000: so great is the difference in one year between the cost and profit, altho should we add to the former the cost of cutting lown the trees etc. the proportion would be but slightly

The engine is capable of drawing off 90,000 cubic feet of water in one hour, when required; and altho the plantation had been saturated or almost inundated with heavy rains for two or three days, a few hours sufficed to draw off the water, and render the soil perfectly dry under foot. With pleasure and surplice we personally witnessed the operations of the engine, and its effects—particularly as we had been credibly informed the charles of the state. had been as badly conditioned as the swamp lands rearward of New Orleans.

This simple fact—which can be wimesed by any gentleman who chooses to visit the Lizardi plantation below the English Turn—proves that all the inundated lands in Louisiana can as easily be reclaimed by the same system of canalling and an engine: for that plantation was as bed as any other in the state. ART. 5. He shall give to the mayor and to the council plans and projects of levelling of quays, levees, stevets, side walks and intersections of streets, whenever he shall be required so to do, and give also the necessary explanations.

ART. 6. He shall make all other plans and estimates of works from him required, and within the delay to him prescribed, except for good reason.

ART. 7. He shall direct and superintend the constructions and repairs of the wharves and levees, and inform the mayor and the council whenever it also heaven the mayor and the council whenever it also become necessary to repair those already existing, or to build new ones.

ART. 8. He shall be bound to keep his office at so the plans, drawings and documents by him drafted or prepared by ore ler or request of the mayor or of the council, shall belon go to the municipality.
