The first provides, "that from and after the first day of January next, it shall not be lawful to grant a licence to drive a dray, cart, truck or other vehicle for the transportation of any goods, wares, merchandize, firewood, or things whatever, within the city, until the persons to whom such licence be granted, do give good freehold security, in the sum of five hundred dollars, to meet any claim that may arise against any dray, cart, truck, &c. for neglect to pay the licence; for any infraction of the city ordinances, or the laws of the State, or for the non-delivery or damage of any goods, wares, merchandize, or other articls entrusted to them.

Against this it is alledged, that the existing regulations afford ample security for the performance of all duties required of the class of persons therein mentioned; that the requirement of free hold security to the amount of 500 dollars, is onerous and oppressive-intended to destroy fair competition, and secure a monopoly to a few wealthy indivduals, to the exclusion of the

industrious poor, Section 7th, provides: "that it shall be the duty of all cartinen and draymen, when requested, to leave all other employments whatever, to attend to carting flour, salt, sugar, or any other merchandise or other thing subject to damage, under the penalty of \$10.

This is thought to be alike unnecessary and unreasonable. We do not wish to be understood as expressing any opinion upon the merits of either. We in fact have none. We possess scarcely any information on the subject, and we do not intend to write about matters of which we know ourselves to be ignorant. The object is to engage in the discussion, those who are most interested in the proposed regulations, and to elicit information from such persons as undoubtedly possess it.
