Orders have been issued from Washington which require the dicensing of all boats of any size or class propelled by power or sail. Boats of this class will be required An register and there will then be issued to them a "license to navi-

Preparations have been completed for the 'icensing of vessels in the eighth naval district, which comprises the states of Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arkunsas, Tennessee and Texas and the gulf coast of Florida from Tampa bay west.

The district is divided into three sections. The first section covers waters from Tampa bay to and inearling Mobile harbor, with headquarters at the naval station. Pensacola. Fla. The second section covers the waters from Mobile bay to Sabine Pass, Tex., with headquarters at No. 215 Godehaux biulding, covers the waters from Sabine Pass. Tex., to the Rio Grande river, with headquarters at the branch hydrographic office, Galveston, Tex. Boat owners within these dis-

section commander, and app'ication should state the name of the vessel, the flag under which it calls, the home port, owner's name, master's name, to whom chartered, points between which it operates, the number of men in its crew. carrying capacity of passengers and freight, length, beam and draft of doat, type and power of engine and manufacturer's number, fuel used and fuel capacity, speed and cruising range, armament if any, and statement as to signaling apparatus warried.

A statement fully covering these points must accompany applications for licenses, which, if properly prepaid, will obviate much delay and inconvenience.

Owners will also be required to state whether they will carry, gratis, between points in the eighth maval district, inspectors from the dicensing office.

Licenses may be issued to cover any and all waters within the eighth naval district.

Applicants must state the nature of the trade in which they are engaged and present satisfactory evitheir boats that may prove detrimental to the public.

There will be no charge made for glass and prominently displayed.

A reasonable length of time will be allowed the owners of vessels to procure the necessary licenes. after which time vessels found without licenses X'il and decollowed the privilege of navigating in the waters of the eighth naval district.
