TURKISH STANDARDS .- The great standard, won by the King of Poland from the infidels in 1683, at the affair of Kalemberg, is about eight feet in breadth, a green and crimson stuff, and golden tissue mixed, with a device in Arabesque characters, which may be thus translated. "There is no other God but, God and Mahomet is his prophet." At the four corners of this standard are also written the names of Albuquer and Omar, who were to successors of Mahomet. The ball on the top of the staff (about the size of a man's joined first) is of brass gilt. This standard was sent by the King of Poland to the Pope, who has suspended it from the roof of St. Peter's by the side of a nother taken from the Infidels at the battle of Chotzen, some years ago. The banner named by the Turks " Basarac" is carefully preserved in the Seraglio, in a case built into the wall de the right hand side as you enter the chamber; in which is the Grand Seignior's summer bed; the Turks believe that this standard was rent from Heaven to Mahomet when making war on the Giaours, or Christian Princess, as an infallible pledge of victory. NATIONAL ASTRONOMY OF THE

GREEKS AND TURKS. Greece, its islands, and the western art of Asia Minor, have from the earest ages, been the principal scene of the great strugle between the eastern ind western worlds. Between the European and Asiatic, even under the same latitude, there exists a marked difference in feelings, manners, and charactor. That this difference is independent of climate and of country, and attributable to long established habits, and a system of education transmitted Greek at Selencia on the Tigris, at Palmyra, Antioch, and the Egyptian Alexandria, continued to be still a Greek: while the Arab in Andalusia and Grenada was still an Arab, and the Turk in L Europe has retained all the feelings, manners, and customs, of his oriental ancestors. It is not wonderful therefore, that two races, so inherently different from each other, sould where limitary be engaged in perpetual warfare. I'he great struggle has, in general, been in the vicinity or those narrow seas that separate Europe from Asia. It has now Sept 19 continued, with strange vicissitudes, for more than six and-twenty centuries, and longer too if we add well founded traditions to historical records; and yet there appears no sign of an approaching termination.—By a curious inversion of their relative positions, the Europeans are on the banks of the Ganges, on the shores of the Caspian; and the Asiaties on the banks of the Danube, and the shores of the Adriatic .- Murray's Family Libary.
