The horrors of the real scene repri sented by rhis beautiful combination of mechanicism and painting, have been often described. Their effect on the author of the mighty mischief, he has himself recorded in forcible language The following passage descriptive of it, are from Scott's Life of Napoleon.

"On the 14th of Sept. 1813, while the rear guard of the Russians were in the act of evacuating Moscow, Napoleon reached the hill called the Mount of Salvation, because it is there where the nutives kneel and cross themselves at first sight of the Holy City. Moscow seemed lordly and striking as ever, with copper domes glittering in the sun; its palaces of eastern architecture mingled with trees, and surrounded with gar dens; and its Kremblin, a huge triangu larmass of towers, something between a palace and a castle, which rose like a citad lout of the general mass of groves and buildings. But not a chimn-y sent np a smoke, not a man appeared on the battlements, or at the gates. After waiting two hours, he received from some French inhabitants, who had hidden themselves during the evacuation, the strange intelligence that Moscow was desented by its population. The tidings that a population of two hundred and fifty thousand persons had left their native city was incredible.
