IMPORTANT NOTICE. THE public is informed that in pursuance of the acts of the Legislature, approved 10th April, 1811, and 8th March, 1819, concerning the recording of births and deaths; the office of the Recorder of births and deaths is open by the undersigned, at the office of the city marshal, in St. Ann st. between Conde and Royal.

It is useless to call the attention of the public to the wisdom of a law which secures the civil rights of citizens, and which prevents numbers of suits that may arise from the neglect of complying with the provisions of the law.

1st. The birth of all free born child, shall be declared by the father, and in the absence of the same, by all other person who shall have assisted at the birth of the child, and the act shall be drawn in presence of two witnesses.

This declaration shall be made in the Parish of Orleans, within thirty days.

2d. The death of all free person, happening in the Parish of Orleans, shall be declared within thirty days by the nearest relations of the deceased, if present, and in case of their absence, by the testamentary executor if there be one, and in case there be none, by the proprietor or the principal lessee of the house where the person died.

All persons contravening to the foregoing provisions, shall be fined from five to ten dollars. The public is hereby notified that from and after this day the provisions of the acts above recited, shall be punctually executed by the undersigned, recorder of births and deaths.
