Graves of Confederate and Union  
Soldiers.

During the war between the States,  
one hundred and sixty-two Confederate  
prisoners died in the military  
prison at Ship Island, and were there  
buried. In 1868, permission was given  
by the War Department of the United  
States to the Ladies' Benevolent As-  
sociation of New Orleans to remove  
the remains of Confederate soldiers  
buried in the neighborhood of New  
Orleans and a magnificent tomb sub-  
sequently was built in Greenwood cem-  
etery. The War Department is de-  
sirous of ascertaining whether the  
bodies from Ship Island were brought  
to this city and also whether the re-  
mains of Union soldiers buried at  
Ship Island were also brought to this  
city and reinterred in the Chatmette  
National Cemetery. Mrs. W. J. Behan,  
the President of the Ladies' Confeder-  
ate Memorial Association, having been  
written to for information on the sub-  
ject, has communicated the request to  
Mr. W. O. Hart of the Louisiana His-  
torical Society. It is hoped that any  
one who knows any particulars of the  
inquiries herein mentioned will com-  
municate with either of them, so that the  
War Department may be fully ad-  
vised in the premises.
