On the 13th inst. the schooner Leo, Capt Raines, bringing an account of the defeat of the principal body of those who had taken up arms to resist the usurpation of Lavalle, and of the execution of another of the Chiefs opposed to the present Government. Molina with 500 of his men has been routed by Suarez, one of Lavalle's Colonels, who killed 300 and took 131 prisoners with 1500 horses. Of the five provinces which had taken part against Buenou-Ayres, it was rumoured that Santa-Fe had made proposals of peace.
