Observation is made in the report that freight shipments were considerably hampered through the congestion [of freight and loading facilities in the port of New York and also through the inadequate equipment and shortage of tabor in the French ports. The congestion in New York is attributed to the unusual number of vessels from the ports in Europe, from South Anserican and Pacific coast points, which made the question of berthing all incoming vessels in New York a matter of much delay and difficulty. Even after, coming to a pier in New York, the report states, vessels have sometimes remained idle a week before sufficint equipment could be secured to load them.
