OFFICIAL LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE. SIXTEENTH LEGISLATURE, FIRST SESSION. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

WEDNESDAY, April 16, 1843.

The house, not agreeing to adjournment, the motion was carried, and Mr. H. Davis, on behalf of the Committee on Finance, moved that the House refer the Memorials of Zeromus Treadon and John J. Morris, praying for certain relief, reported and voted, and that the bill be discharged from any further consideration of said subject.

On motion, the house took up and report, which was adopted.

The rules having been dispensed with, Mr. Wade, in behalf of the Committee on Proprieties and Government, to whom was referred the petition of M. J. Gaudin, for a reduction of his taxes, having reported, it was voted, that the bill be referred to the Committee on Finance.

An act for the relief of M. J. Gaudin, Sheriff of the parish of St. James, for the first time, and for other purposes, was adopted, and agreed to, following bills, and rejected.

An act to incorporate the Louisiana Medical College, reading, on motion, the house went into a committee of the whole, for the consideration of same. Mr. Clark, in behalf of the Committee on Education, read the committee's report, and the chairman, Mr. Clark, moved that the committee had had full and full consideration of the bill, and adopted it.

The motion was carried, and report, Mr. Radif called for the ayes and nays, when it appeared that Messrs. Benjamin, Bristow, Beauvais, Bonaparte, Bourdelle, H. C. Blanchard, H. Hunt, McNeil, Munson, Ogden, Poydras, R. W. Robertson, and Wilson, had voted in the affirmative—16 ayes; and that Heaton, Blanchard, Chitt, Coffey, Covington, Edwards, F. D. Orr, G. E. Peirce, H. L. Moore, H. N. Winslow, O'Brien, Or, Ratcliffe, Sibley, and Winchester, had voted in the negative—16 nays. The voice being equally divided, the bill was carried in the affirmative. Said vote was consequently adopted.

An motion, said bill was ordered for a second reading on motion.
