The wife of the deceased is given the usufruct of one-half the estate belonging to her late husband, and later it is to be divided as follows: to France Louise and Helen M. Fabacher, daughters of Louis B. Fabacher, and grand-daughters of the deceased, one-eighth of his half interest; and to the nine children of the deceased, the remainder of his interest.

INJUNCTION REFUSED BY KING

Plea of Prescription Upheld in Mulling vs. Clara Jones et Als. The application of Mrs. Adele Maloney and Mrs. Agnes M. Leyland, of Gulfport, Miss., for an injunction to prevent the sale of their \$5,000 interest in certain New Orleans property, under a confession of judgment filed in 1912, was refused yesterday in Judge Fred D. King's division of the civil district court.

It was alleged by the two women that their property was to be sold under a confession of judgment that had been obtained under certain stated conditions that they claimed to constitute a fraud on the court. The document in question was filed more than five years ago, while the property to be sold was seized under a writ on the first of June. The title of the suit under which proceedings were had was Ed Mulling vs. Clara Jones et als, the et als being the two plaintiffs in the counter proceedings that were instituted Tuesday.

The trial of Louis Herskovitz alias Hershey, charged with trying to secure military information at the Algiers Naval station, has been postponed until next Monday. If he has not obtained an attorney by next Monday the court will appoint one to represent him.
