New-York, September 30. The ship France, from Havre, brings us papers from Paris to the 25th ult. There is no confirmation in them, nor contradiction, of the rumored victory of the Russians in the vicinity of Constantinople. The Constitutionnel, however, of 23d, reasons upon it as an undoubted fact; and adds, "the next advices will probably be, of the more important fact, of the occupation of Constantinople."

Viewing a map of North America, and the local situation of its present inhabitants, every person must be struck with the propriety of making the Rio Grande del Norte (the Great River of the North) the limit between the United States and the Spanish Provinces.

RUSSIA AND ENGLAND.—The Nuremberg Correspondent, in a letter from Constantinople, announces that admiral Malcolm was at Vourla near Smyrna, with the greater part of the English fleet, and that he had received orders from M. Gordon to proceed to the Dardanelles.

Lieut. Constantine Smith, of the Maine Corps, charged with the death of the late Lieut. Dourne, of the same corps, in a duel, has been tried at the present session of the Superior Court of Law for Norfolk County, and unanimously acquitted by the verdict of a most intelligent jury.

From Buenos Ayres.—Intelligence has been received at Baltimore from Buenos Ayres, by the arrival of that place of the schooner Virginia, which sailed on the 14th August. Gen. Lavalle continued at the head of the government, and affairs remained in pretty much the same posture as they were at the sailing of the Two Marys, which brought the last previous accounts.
