For years past the owners of property have been threatened with suits to destroy their titles, and in many part instances individuals who wished to sell or mortgage their property have been obliged to yield to the demands of these hunters after bad titles. No reasonable person can complain of counsel who are engaged by parties to prosecute or defend any suir; but most certainly our fellow citizens have just cause of complaint against members of the har who seek after suits to disturb the titles of owners of property, and who make use of their talents and professional reputation to stare doubts in order to force people at least to give up something rather than be sued. Against such men our community should express their just indignation. We have been inform ed that Edward Livingston has sent instructions to his lawyers in this city to commence suit for the recovery of very valuable property which was sold at the suit of the United States some years since, to pay the debt which he then owed to the general government. It is now desired to recover back this land, on the ground that some irregularity took place in the manner of selling, &c.

If our information is gorrect we are certainly surprised that Edward Livingston should avail himself of petty istegularities to disturb the titles of a large number of citizens He cannot expect success shall attend such suits, and his only object is prohably to force the proprietors to pay some thing. 
