FRANCE.

Paris, Nov. 28. "The whole attention of this country is now turned to the momentous question of the possibility and even probability of war. The government, after making every effort in its power consistent with French honor, to avoid a struggle, the consequence of which no human eye can foresee, will certainly set to work, in the event of unavoidable hostilities, with the greatest energy. Nor do we doubt that in case of a dedelensive war, an appeal, frank and firm, of Philip I. to the French nation, would be instantly followed by an enormous development of fora war of that nature would be extremely popular. However, in several of our best informed political circles there is still a doubt that a general war will take place; those who frequent them humbly conceive that even in the delicate affair of Belgium, there does not appear the slightest ground for a foreign interference. BELGIUM.

The National Congress was engaged during its sittings on the 23d and 24th of November in discussing a proposal made by M. C. Roden buch, "to declare all the members of the family of Orange Nassau forever excluded from the throne of Belgium. The Orange family seem to have had a small party in the Congress; but the only grounds taken openly against the proposal were, that as no privilege could be admitted in any person or family, to possess such power, no exclusion should be pronounced; and that it was worse than unnervasary, while the differences with Holland remained unadjusted, and might occasion a rupture of the armistice. The proposal was carried, however, on the 24th

by a vote of 161 to 28.

The Dutch prisoners in Brussels insisted upon being considered only in the light of hostages. In a debate on this subject M. Raiken said: If that government is unjust, that is no reason why we should follow its example. The weak ness which has characterised the organization of our moveable forces is now displaying its results. The occupation of our territory by the Dutch army, the left bank of the Escaut invaded and instantly abandoned, the garrison of Maestricht reinforced and provisioned. Venloo threatened, and probably now retaken, the city of Antwer still trembling under the cannon of the citadel and the enemies frigates; such are the facts which loudly denounce a temporising system and halt measures, which only tend to compromise the glory of our triumphs and the success of our mi-morable revolution.

ENGLAND,

DISTURBANCES AMONG THE LABOURERS. -- In twelve of fourteen counties the labourers continue to commit much mischief, and ever seemed to proceed systematically, in the destruction of by machines, burnings &c. At the special sessions held in November, for East Kem, Sir E. Knatchsons were put upon trial, and a great number committed, for destroying threshing machines and similar offences. The sentences passed excited astonishment by their severity—one man was transported for life, many others for some years, and the rest to imprisonment for longer or shorter periods. Sir E. K. Said that the lenity s lown to former offenders: had produced a bad effect. At Maidstone several persons had been committed at the latest dates, on a charge of arson. At Stamford a band of machine breakers had been dispersed by an armed force and 20 committed. Formidable parties of them had risen in figuringdon, and destroyed considerable property. Fifty were captured in one day. Simunts are published of riots in Berkshire, Cornwall and other counties, which it was no-

cessary to call in the military to quell.

Circulars have been addressed by Lord Melbourne, Secretary for home affairs, to the Lord Lieutenants and Magistracy of counties, pering Lieutenants and Magistracy of counties, urging them on behalf of his Majesty, to take such measures as may be effectual to suppress tumults and disorders. A proclamation was issued by the King on the 23d November, stating that great disorders prevailed in the counties of Wilts, Kent, Sussex, Surrey, Harts and Berka, and commanding all Justices of the Peace and other officers in their counties, to use their utmost efforts to bring the offenders to justice. A reward of £50 is offered to every person by whom an offender is discovered and brought to conviction: and £500 for discovering an incendiary Special Commissioners have been appointed to hold offices in Southampton and Wilts.
