The election of a State Printer took place, yesterday morning. The members of both bodies of the legislature, though in number, met in the hall of representatives, and proceeded to elect Messrs. J. Gibson, of the Anti-Slavery party, of the Mechanics, and J. Bayon, of the Free Soil candidates. The first ballot gave the following results:

Gibson, 27; Bayon, 26; Pow, 10—No election.

J. Bayon, having obtained the majority required by law, was elected State Printer for the term of one year.

The mail, due on Tuesday last, was received yesterday. Our sequence of dates is not very regular. The New-York passenger of the 2d ultimo; Baltimore of the 25th; we had no Washington paper, (the Intelligencer) of the 2d instant. It contains no report of congressional proceedings; the lower house having had a recess of three days.

From the Alexandria Gazette we learn that the steam ferryboat, the Cygnet, cut through by the action of the ice, on the Potowmac river, sank in six fathoms of water. The intelligence mentions that no lives were lost. The passengers, it would seem, were very numerous.

Whereas, the existing tariff laws of the United States have produced much dissatisfaction and discontent in a portion of the union—inasmuch as it is said that the duties assessed and collected on many articles of foreign manufacture, give a greater protection to the domestic manufacturer, than to enable him successfully to compete with the foreigner; and whereas, we, the representatives of the people of Pennsylvania, of opinion that the preservation and perpetuation of the union is of paramount importance, and being anxious to transmit to posterity in all their purity the invaluable blessings inherited from our fathers; as also considering the great importance of abstaining from shedding the blood of our fellowmen; a practicable remedy can be applied, passed, and will be, a proper and just modification of the tariff laws, shall be as follows:

By the next session of the house of representatives, that our negotiators and members of congress are requested to use all possible exertions to have the following bill introduced, so far as practicable, to reduce the duties assessed and collected on all articles of domestic manufacture, and also equalize their operation throughout the union.

The Charlotte Courier, gives the following striking extract, from some observations of Mr. Garrison, of the anti-slavery party, respecting the "odious test oath," prescribed by the ordinance:

The commissioners will probably be early enough for, and Baltimore cliques fitted out with Dutch armament may be got ready for sea in a very short time. Such a measure as this could hardly have been counted on by the commissioners at London, but it is so natural and feasible that the probability of its adoption is evident, and may have given rise to the recent alarm.

Ministerial Mistake.—An immense Treasury Document, (says a letter writer from Washington,) was this morning laid on the table of the members of congress.

On examining, the document was found to be a very exact and particular statement of the monies received, for various purposes, at each Custom House in the United States, during the year, forming a stout volume.

No entry of the total amount was made, or any resolution offered, at the last session, which was adopted by the treasury officers to prepare and have printed a statement of the Custom House monies of last year. By some slip of the pen, the year became war, and hence the cumbersome undated document.

**Commercial.**

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 16.

(IN THE BENGAL, AT HOME.)

Respected friends.—The arrival in our cotton market was only temporary, the demand was suspended, and with it, the price, which was what they had been.

The sales of cotton were not more than 12,630 bags, of which 11,960 are American, weighing of 3660 Uplands, 5439 Alabama and Mobile, 1840 New Orleans and 6000 Island of the whole 3000 Americans were taken on speculation. Import, 467.

Throughout the whole of the present week the market has been excessively flat. The coercive measures resorted to by France and England in order to effect a settlement with Holland, of the long pending Belgian question, excited apprehension that this may in the end lead to war, and under this feeling the buyers of cotton are disposed to keep aloof from the market, until such time as the cause of the dispute is removed.

Such a state of foot the sales of the week, with a quotation of the average, which are however, under present circumstances, in some degree nominal.
