A compliment of still more value has been bestow. ed upon our steam boat marine by the French Government, who sent a deputation across the Atlantic a few years since, expressly for the pur-pofe of examining our different mode, s and im-

rovements in this department of navigation.

Notwithstanding this, we have no in existen ce a single steam vessel of war-nor is there me of our steam boats which is at all fitted fo was service, on account of the fightest of their construction, and the thinnes of their sides The French, on the contrary have 18 or 20 steam vessels of war, and the English are now outding a considerable number. 
