Una revolucion que ha de trar-torara a un edificio que se levanta sobre las ruinas de algunos millares de filitios, necesita de la fuerza de un Sanson, y en el sistema federal, no hay un cuerpo tan robusto que pueda decir: "Ese soy yo." No escante ciertamente. Y si alguna vez puede formarse, es con mucha prevencion y mucho tino, uniendo a las tendencias heterogeneas, y generalizandolas a la perfeccion de un solo punto, para que el camino directo de cada uno quien pensaba dirigirse al alamo. Lo primero que se necesita para una empresa semejante es, que el caudillo principal sea un hombre cuyas proezas sean tan reinarcables, que sean conocidas de toda la nacion, y que por ellas haya adquirido una fama singular de valiente, de provido, de sabio, de desinteresado, y sobre todo, de patriota. Si falta esta clase de prestigio, nunca podra pasar de una asonada, y su termino sera fatal para los empresarios. Tales debian ser los elementos que estaban en el orden hubieran edificado los promovedores del centralismo, y aun asi es muy creible el mal logro de sus planes. Cuanto peor sera, pura, el escrito, careciendo de estas y otras cualidades necesarias?—A los mexicanos ya no es facil meterlos en revoluciones sangrientas, tanto por estar ya cansados de la guerra, como porque falta el resorte poderoso que se tocaba con fruto para emprenderla, a saber: la seguridad de la independencia por el medio de desarmar las espadas contra los gachupines.—Con este pretexto se podia honestar a otras miras, y todo podia pasar. Generalmente se prestaban gusto a esta clase de locos, y en un momento cual un golpe electrico, se despertaba el espirito publico de la republica entera. Mas ahora que ni este apoyo tienen a su favor esos señores, es menester compadecernos, y que la gravedad nacional los cubra de los infortunios que los amagan.—Al fin son mexicanos, y puede muy bien suceder que hayan estado, animados acaso de los mejores sentimientos. Meta cada uno la mano en su pecho, y sin duda hallara que en el curso de su vida, ha cometido mil extravios de esta clase. Lo que principalmente importa es dejarlos aislados, y no secundar sus temeridades. En un momento de juicio volverán ellos mismos sobre sus pasos.

LETTRAS sobre la Havana a ocho dias vienes de enero por SIMON CUCULLU.

The U. S. ship Delaware, of 74 guns, last from the Mediterranean, anchored in Hampton Roads on the 1st inst. after a passage of 47 days from Port Mahon. Left U. S. ship Lexington, Capt. (JUNTER, at that place from Smyrna—all well. From an officer of the Lexington, who returned in the Delaware, we learn that the Russian, French and English squadrons were at Vourla. The British frigate Blonde, was at Constantinople on the 16th Oct. with all her armament on board—a courtesy not heretofore accorded to any armed vessel. The following were passengers in the Delaware, from the Mediterranean: Captain DOWNER, late of the Java; RICHARD M'CALL, U. S. Navy Agent, at Gibraltar; Purser PERRY, late of sloop of war Fairfeld; Sailing Master F. W. MOORE and Midshipman B. S. SLYE.

COBBETT, announcing his intention of giving a series of political lectures, thus recommends himself to the public:—"With regard to the mode of conducting the lectures, it will be that which is pursued in other cases. Far from me be the ambition to shine as what the Irish call an orator. I have the most thorough contempt for speech making, having observed throughout my life that the most valuable speech-makers are the greatest fools. Canning gave us a specimen of the portion of sense connected with speech-making. Pitt laid the foundation of our ruin by the means of noise, and what are called eloquent speeches. Plain talk is all that I aim at, conveying truth in a clear and intelligent manner. I should not like, indeed, to stand up and stammer like a poor thing protected by law from the contempt of my hearers; and indeed, I should despise my audience if they would endure it; for, I am for no eloquence, no "intense eloquence," plain matter in plain words, addressed to plain understanders: those are the things that I aim at. I choose this mode, at his time, because it is more quick in its effect upon the public; and because, also, the times are such as to require this quickness of communication. The Collective will meet as tardily as possible; it will avoid, to the last possible moment, touching upon the state of the country; when it does touch upon it, it will do it in a manner the least likely to imply acknowledgement of error; it will postpone, it will procrastinate, it will endeavour to do without seeming to do; but, postpone delay, procrastinate and shuffle as it may please, it must do SOMETHING before it separate again, and that something must of necessary attract the serious attention of every man of property in the country. It will, therefore, be of great advantage for me to be at this crisis, ever active on my post. Things will arise in which I can take a part at once. If, for instance, I had had lectures on foot at the time when PENN'S BILL was passing, I much question whether the Bill would ever have passed. The nonsense of RICARDO, and of HENRY, and BARRING, would have been exposed before it took its effect. CANNING never would have had an opportunity of calling upon the House for a vote in order to set the question at rest for ever. We shall see absurdities full as gross broached in a few months from this day, and it will be greatly useful to be strangle those absurdities in their birth. If I had been lecturing at the time when the last Small-note Bill was passed, or at the time when Mr. Goulburn was asserting that there would be more five-pound notes in consequence of the disappearance of the ones; if I had been lecturing when Canning was putting forth the ridiculous balderdash about every man having a bit of gold in his pocket and a fowl in his pot; and when Huskisson was talking about the forty-eight hours and the barter; if I had been lecturing at those times, those monstrous absurdities would have been crushed upon the spot; for, besides the audience, who shall do me the honor to hear the lectures, there will be, I dare say, the publication of them in the newspapers; or in some of them at any rate."

PARIS CHIT-CHAT  
The Duke of Orleans, although one of the richest persons in France, is said not to exceed in his personal expenditure, and for that of his household, the amount expended in England by many a country Squire. He himself keeps an exact account of the produce of all his lands, and frequently takes an active part in the disposal of the produce. As a patron of literature, however, His Royal Highness is liberal, and frequently munificent; more than twenty French authors are now enjoying pen-

sions, or other equivalent favours from him.  
PARIS, Nov. 17.—The Duke de Rovigo (Savary) who is about to settle in Italy with his family, lately applied to the Austrian Embassy for a visa to his passport, which was made out in his name of Duc de Rovigo; but the visa was refused to him under that title. It was granted to him, however, under the title of Duc de Savary.

The only remaining male heir to the name of de Stael, died, here, on Saturday last, after many months' illness. He was an infant, twenty-three months old. His body will be conveyed to Coppet, and buried in the same tomb with the Baroness de Stael and Necker. The only persons remaining of this family, are the Duchess de Broglie, and her children, and a son by the second marriage of Madame de Stael with Mr. Roca.

An Englishman, a few days ago entered a gaming-house in the Rue Richelieu, and seized a packet of bank notes, amounting to 20,000 francs, with which he jumped out at the window into the street. He was taken almost immediately, but the notes were not found upon him.

It is reported that Victor Hugo himself means to play the part of Hernani, in his forthcoming play of that name. Seizures and legal processes are going on in all directions connected with emblems, effigies, &c. of the young Duke of Reichstadt. The authorities are doing their possible to elevate him into a consequence which he neither desires nor dreams of.

Grazianna, the Buffalo singer was cited before the Tribunal of Commerce on Saturday, with the view of getting rid of his engagement at the Italian Opera, on the pretence that he had refused to act, on a false plea of indisposition.—Grazianna, however, proved that he had not only been very ill, but that in trying to get better, (by using a number of leeches,) he had become a great deal worse. The theatre was foiled in its attempt, and cast in the expenses of the suit.

The Italian Theatre will produce in the course of a few days a new opera, the music by Carafa, called "Gli Promessi Sposi," founded on Sir Walter Scott's Bride of Lammermor.

"Marie Mignot" continues its vogue at the Vaudeville. Ten representations of this piece since the 1st instant, have produced the sum of 31,585 francs.

Baron Regnault, the celebrated historical painter and member of the Academy, died on the 12th instant. The election to fill the vacant place of the Baron in the Academy, has taken place, and the choice has fallen on Mr. Molinos.

The Count de Montlosier is about to publish memoirs of his own life. The celebrated anatomist Majendie, has just received the decoration of the Legion of Honour.

An order has just been issued by the direction of M. de la Bourdonnaye, forbidding any of the Paris theatre to represent pieces in verse, except the Francs, the Opera, the Opera Comique, and the Olean.

The wonderful Paganini is expected in Paris in the course of next month. The man and his wife Begia, who robbed an Irishman named Andrews, some time ago, of 23,000 francs, in a house of ill-fame, have been convicted and sentenced to five years imprisonment, a fine of 5000 francs, and the restitution of the lost sum.

On Sunday night, one of those persons who get a wretched livelihood by picking up rags, (thence called chiffonniers,) was arrested under suspicious circumstances; and, on searching him, 18,000 francs in bank notes were found in his crevas.

There is at present at Berlin, an animal of a most extraordinary description, the produce of a mare and a deer. It has the fore-part of a horse, while the hinder portion is that of a stag. The feet are also those of a stag. This curious nondescript has been purchased by the King, for the Royal Menagerie at Potsdam.

It is said that some Englishmen have formed a secret club at Pera, (the suburb of Constantinople,) to which several Musulmans have been admitted, with the view of exciting discontents and treasonable plots against the Sultan and bringing about a revolution.
